BRIDE VALLEY CAR SERVICE



The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £1.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

BVCS simply provides door-to-door transport and cannot be responsible for assisting with clients' medical or mobility needs. Patients with complex transport needs for hospital appointments should contact the NHS Non-Emergency Patient Transport service.

FROM THE RECTORY

'Take up your cross and follow Me' (Matthew 16:24; Mark 8:34; Luke 9:23)

Nowadays people interpret "cross" as some burden they must carry in their lives: a strained relationship, a thankless job, a physical illness. With self-pitying pride, they say, "That's my cross I have to carry." Such an interpretation is not what Jesus meant when He said, "Take up your cross and follow Me."

When Jesus carried His cross up Golgotha to be crucified, no one was thinking of the cross as symbolic of a burden to carry. To a person in the first-century, the cross meant one thing and one thing only: death by the most painful and humiliating means human beings could develop.

Two thousand years later, Christians view the cross as a cherished symbol of atonement, forgiveness, grace and love. But in Jesus' day, the cross represented nothing but torturous death. The Romans forced convicted criminals to carry their own crosses to the place of crucifixion, bearing a cross meant carrying their own execution device while facing ridicule along the way to death.

After each time Jesus commanded cross bearing, He said, "For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me will save it. What good is it for a man to gain the whole world, and yet lose or forfeit his very self?" (Luke 9:24-25). Although the call is tough, the reward is matchless.

Following Jesus is easy when life runs smoothly; our true commitment to Him is revealed during trials. Jesus assured us that trials will come to His followers (John 16:33). Discipleship demands sacrifice, and Jesus never hid that cost.

This year at Easter especially you may be wondering what it means to take up your cross, consider these questions:

- Are you willing to follow Jesus if it means losing some of your closest friends?
- Are you willing to follow Jesus if it means alienation from your family?
- Are you willing to follow Jesus if it means the loss of your reputation?
- Are you willing to follow Jesus if it means losing your job?

- Are you willing to follow Jesus if it means losing your life?

In some places of the world, these consequences are a reality. But notice the questions are phrased, “Are you willing?” Following Jesus doesn’t necessarily mean all these things will happen to you, but are you willing to take up your cross? If there comes a point in your life where you are faced with a choice—Jesus or the comforts of this life—which will you choose?

Commitment to Christ means taking up your cross daily, giving up your hopes, dreams, possessions, even your very life if need be for the cause of Christ. Only if you willingly take up your cross may you be called His disciple (Luke 14:27). For Christians the ultimate reward is worth the price. Jesus promises the gift of eternal life to those who follow him: “For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me will find it.” (Matthew 16:25-26).

THE BRIDE VALLEY BOOK CLUB



Our March meeting was via Zoom and seven of us managed to gather virtually to discuss the novel “Americanah” by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie. This is a substantial novel and not everyone had finished so we tried to avoid spoilers (not entirely successful on my part). I think there was broad agreement that this was a fascinating account - perhaps lightly fictionalised - which covers a great deal of ground - from Nigeria - to America - the UK and finally back to Nigeria. “Americanah” is a Nigerian term used to describe those who have lived in America and who change their behaviour on returning to their homeland. The spotlight on race, feminism, class and culture is highly focussed following the lives of Ifemulu and her boyfriend Obinze. In a close relationship since their teens they both decide to leave politically unstable Nigeria and seek to further their education. Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie is very detailed in her description of relationships, her time as a student, her visits to the hairdressers, the differences between herself as a Nigerian bonafide scholarship student in America, Afro American women and other immigrant black women she meets from African countries. Clearly one of the points she is making is that there are many versions of “black” - something which is often misunderstood. This novel does quite a bit to shake white readers out of their complacency. Most of the narrative is told from Ifemulu’s viewpoint but we also get to experience things through Obinze’s eyes living in the UK - which it seems is a second choice for him as he is unable to gain entry to the USA.

We raised several questions during our discussion. How reliable a narrator is Ifemulu? How much of this is autobiographical? Do our sympathies for her overcome her character flaws and should we give her credit and respect for her honesty? Does she mature and grow as the book progresses? How much of a counterpoint is she to characters like her Aunt, who also moves away from Nigeria and ends up working in America as a doctor? What light does the narrative throw on the vexed issue of immigration, both legal and illegal? I found the description of Nigerian society intriguing - full of corruption and patronage and entrenched social attitudes. Those big themes of race, class, feminism and culture are certainly addressed in this novel and on these topics we thought it was thought provoking and impressive. This is the second book by this author we have read.

We plan to meet in early April - on Zoom - and hope to be able to meet in early May following the rule of six - possibly in one of our gardens weather permitting.

Our Night Sky in April 2021

By the middle of the month, Mars will still be a prominent feature in the Southern and Western sky, and the winter constellations will still be with us until they set about 2300, so make the most of them.

On the 15th, the Moon will be between the V of Taurus, and the Pleiades, which will make a very pretty sight in binoculars. Saturn and Jupiter will be greeting the early risers in the South East, but will soon be lost as dawn breaks.

Mars has been the target for three space missions last month, but by far the most audacious has been NASA's Robotic lander called Perseverance. The video of its descent through the Martian atmosphere and the subsequent lowering of the craft from the hovering rocket powered Skycrane was one of the most astonishing feats of ingenuity I have ever witnessed, and this was the second time it has been successfully attempted.

The mission is not only seeking signs of habitable conditions on Mars in the ancient past, but also searching for signs of past microbial life itself. The Mars Perseverance rover introduces a drill that can collect core samples of the most promising rocks and soils and set them aside in a "cache" on the surface of Mars. These will then be collected later in the decade by an ESA mission, and returned to Earth for closer examination.

Other tasks include testing a method for producing oxygen from the Martian atmosphere, identifying other resources (such as subsurface water), [improving landing techniques](#), and characterizing weather, dust, and other potential environmental conditions that could affect future astronauts living and working on Mars.

The Rover also carries a helicopter which will attempt to fly in the thin Martian atmosphere, and thus prove the feasibility of using airborne surveying to assist the Rover in its exploration.

I do urge you to go to the NASA web site to see some of the brilliant videos they have published. I hope to keep you up to date with some of the findings.

Dorset Libraries: It's not too late help to complete the Census 2021

The census is a survey that happens every 10 years and gives a picture of all the people and households in England and Wales. It has been happening for over 200 years.

Households were asked to take part in census 2021, the first census being run predominantly online. Census day was on 21 March 2021 and your household will have received a letter with a code enabling you to complete your form online.

If you have not already made your entry then you have until 4th May to complete the return for your household. If you have had difficulty in completing the form in any way, then Dorset Libraries can help.

They have a team of advisers who can help you to make your census return over the phone either by guiding you through the form, or completing it for you.

Phone appointments are available until 4 May 2021, and must be booked in advance by calling 01305 221028 (local call charges apply), an adviser will then call you to provide assistance.

We welcome new members to the club and hope to meet up with you, in person, before too long. Looking forward we hope to be able to hold some form of Flower and Produce Show in the summer, even if it has to be a virtual one, depending on the social distancing rules by then.

We also have speakers lined up for the autumn in the hope that we may be able to meet freely at that stage.

April can be a variable month weather-wise, even here in the Bride Valley. As I write this in March there are forecasts of snow for Easter, will we get it here? Who knows? With the temptation to get out and start planting, it is well to watch the forecast and be prepared to protect vulnerable plants.

With that said, here are the jobs you may consider doing in April:

Hostas should be divided every few years to improve their vigour, now is a good time.

Deadhead tulips to ensure they flower next year.

Tie in the vigorous new shoots of climbers.

Set up supports for taller plants ready to train in early growth.

Feed hedges with a general-purpose fertilizer.

Keep container displays watered.

Keep sowing hardy annuals for colourful summer displays. If you are buying plug plants, once you have potted them on, protect them until all risk of frost has gone.

Plant out Mediterranean herbs e.g. rosemary and oregano in free-draining soil; sow annual herbs indoors.

Remember when potting on tomato seedlings, plant them deeper than they were to encourage new roots from the stems.

If the soil is warm sow beetroot, cabbages, carrots, chard, leeks, peas, radishes, spinach and lettuces outdoors;

sow celery, melons, sweetcorn, runner and French beans under cover.

News from Portesham Surgery

News these days tends to mean COVID news, but at least it is so much better news these days! Today's press conference (17th March) announced that we have now vaccinated more than 25 million people in the UK – more than half the adult population, after 100 days of the vaccination programme.

Our Invitations: at Portesham we are just about to start inviting the final group 9 of phase one of the vaccination programme, those people who are most at risk of complications and mortality from COVID-19.

So if you are aged 50 to 54 years old you should be hearing from us very soon.

Vaccine Efficacy: the excellent news from the vaccination programme so far is that after one dose of either vaccine,

Your risk of getting COVID-19 is reduced by 60%

Your risk of hospitalisation is reduced by 80%

Your risk of dying from COVID-19 is reduced by 85%

If you are unvaccinated but live with someone who is, your risk of contracting COVID-19 yourself is reduced by 30%.

Vaccine concerns: by the time you read this I hope the news stories about the risk of blood clots following the vaccine will be old news.

Reassuringly the overwhelming evidence is there is no link between the vaccine and any venous thrombo-embolic event. Statistically around the world about 3,000 people per month suffer a blood clot (leading to conditions such as deep vein thrombosis or pulmonary embolism) for a wide variety of reasons. Where we have vaccinated such a high proportion of our population it is inevitable that some of those who suffer a blood clot will have recently had their vaccine. Our own JCVI and MHRA are clear that there is no evidence of a link between these two events, and we expect the European Medicines Agency to draw these same conclusions very soon.

I have done many shifts at the COVID clinic and would like to share my feelings of gratefulness for every person who walks through the door to have their vaccination, especially now we are vaccinating younger people who are less at risk themselves from the effects of the virus. Just a look at the statistics above tells us how important it is that we all “do our bit”, as many have said as they leave after their appointment. And every person who is

wavering, but goes ahead, will help to protect the few people who cannot have the vaccination for whatever reason, so thank you.

Vaccine supply: a temporary slowdown in supply during April will we think mean no new first vaccinations for the under 50s as we will focus on the last of the most at risk patients and offering the second vaccination to everyone in groups 1 to 9. I know this may be disappointing, but it does mean that low- and middle-income countries can be prioritised for supply which will give them a chance to catch us up. It is incredibly important that we take a world-wide approach to vaccinations which will help to stop other mutations from developing and threatening us in the future. So let us cheer our neighbours on whilst we continue to consolidate our future with the second vaccinations.

Please check our website and Facebook page for more updates as we get them.

Mass Vaccination Centre booking: if you receive an invitation from us but have already booked an appointment at a mass vaccination centre, please do reply to our text (or email or ring us if you prefer) to cancel our invitation. There is a link to do this in our text and you can give a reason such as that you've already booked your appointment. This saves us having to ring long lists of patients who haven't responded to their texts, as we need to make contact with those who genuinely haven't seen the text, have an out of date mobile number or have just plain forgotten to respond! Thank you.

Other work (the real day job!)

Finally please bear with us if you can't get through by phone to the surgery. Don't forget eConsult is an easy alternative if you have access to a computer – see our website.

We have never known such pressure of work of all sorts, on top of the COVID work, but our new system of triaging all requests the same day seems to be helping and it is certainly helping us to get quick same day responses to most of your queries.

St Mary's Church Choir

Without breaking any rules, the members of St Mary's Church Choir have continued to sing together every Wednesday evening throughout lockdown. Do not be alarmed, dear reader: we have been doing so virtually, not in person! Let me explain.

At 5.45pm we log on to Zoom for a pre-recording 'social' session. It's a pleasure to catch up with one another each week and enjoy 15 minutes of banter, and we are also able to meet with BBC sound legend and two-time BAFTA winner, Michael McCarthy, who joins us from his studio in New Malden, to discuss what we are going to record.

At 6pm we log out of Zoom and log on to the audio recording app called Clean Feed, using the link that Michael McCarthy has sent to us all, which we listen to through headphones. Even though we have all been ascribed our own channel, we can all hear one another to begin with, and once we are all successfully on-line, Michael turns us all down so that members of the choir are only just audible. The reason for this is that everyone's broadband speed is different, so if the volume were left up the resultant sound would be a collective (and very unpleasant!) cacophony!

In order to record the hymns, Michael uses the recordings of the many hymns that he and I, in conjunction with the late David Taylor and Wendy, recorded on the Litton Cheney organ several years ago, and which have been used by many, if not all, of the Bride Valley churches ever since.

The choir can hear the organ part very clearly, and, from the comfort of our own homes, the choir members can sing collectively into our respective devices and down the line to New Malden. Over the next couple of days, Michael synchronises the individual singers in order to make the choir cohesive and sends the results through on Saturday mornings.

We are indebted to Michael McCarthy, whose gentle and ever-patient manner, combined with his delightfully self-effacing sense of humour, ensures that our weekly choir practices are a joy from start to finish. And as their choirmaster, I can't thank the members of our choir enough for their loyalty and their willingness to prepare so thoroughly, especially in recent weeks when we have been recording a four-part Easter anthem!

Litton Cheney Parish Council – Meetings in May & July

In Memory of Steven Spurrier (1941-2021)

As you might expect, tributes have abounded following the death of Steven and our thoughts are very much with Bella and family during this heartbreaking of times. Below you will find a memory written by friend Anthony Ashwell who was Vicar in the Bride Valley and resided at The Vicarage in Litton Cheney for around ten years until 2007.

"I was so sorry to hear that Steven has died, but rejoice that he will have taken his place in that eternal Kingdom where God reigns and vines flourish many hundred fold in green valleys.

It was a privilege to have been Steven's vicar for 10 years or so. He was a humble Christian, loyal, faithful, quiet and wise. He enjoyed traditional language services and often had a couple of words to say about the vicar's homily. However, being quite a shy person, he was normally last in - first out. I was aware he was a wine supremo and first came across his work when I read an article of his on ice-wine in an in-flight magazine on my way to Canada. The article was, of course, beautifully written.

I duly obliged remembering that a local dog had earlier had an urgent job that it should do. I think I know who owned the dog.....

Steven also contributed exceedingly generously to the fete's bottle stall, from the store of free samples it was his onerous task to receive and taste. I understand that when Steven began to travel less, he was more able to find time for Church and Village. Thus he gave talks on his work, arranged and presented wine-tastings, and in due course with Bella established the Bride Valley Vineyard. This of course produces fantastic sparkling wine. How appropriate for Steven, a citizen of Heaven."

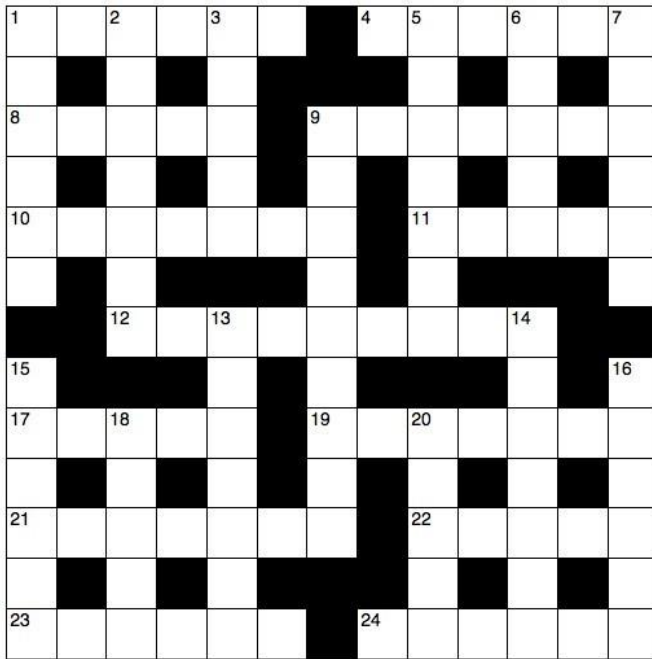

St Michael and All Angels

After several months of suspended animation in the village, it seems as if there are now a few news items ready or nearly ready to report.

However, these will have to await the next edition, as it seems important to circulate the information in the box below, which comes from IT consultant Chris Burr. Anyone wanting to contact him about what follows can reach him on littlebredy@corners.plus.com or 01342 888033. Despite the recent provision of fibre broadband into the village by BT Openreach, it appears that not everybody is yet connected up.

Littlebredy Broadband

BT Openreach have now finished running new internet broadband cables along the telegraph poles at Littlebredy. This was done using a government grant managed by Dorset Council, because the old broadband speed was below the minimum standard. This was a good outcome for the village, as Openreach initially wanted us to raise £120k to pay for the work.

Littlebredy residents and businesses can now upgrade their property from the old 'ADSL' specification (1 to 8 Mbps speed) to the new 'FTTP' specification (35 to 400 Mbps speed).

The higher speed allows proper TV streaming in HD from the likes of BBC iPlayer or Sky Catch-up using Smart TVs, set-top boxes, PCs and tablets. It provides more reliable web browsing and faster gaming and downloads.

The speed increase won't happen automatically; you have to ask a Supplier to connect your broadband and phone to the new cables under a new contract.

For more information on which postcodes are covered, which suppliers you can contact and what broadband speed you may wish to order (and what broadband not to order), please look at the village website: www.littlebredy.com/broadband

Finally, some houses suffer poor internet not only due to their broadband speed, but because they have weak or inconsistent Wi-Fi. The latest 'whole house' Wi-Fi distributes good broadband everywhere indoors. See the village web site above for more on this.

Thank you to everyone for your kindness and love shown to us. Burton really is an exceptional village. Best wishes to you all.

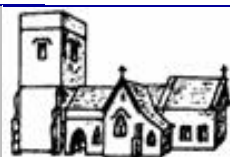

Weldmar Hospicecare to launch brand new care service to support patients at home in Dorset



Weldmar Hospicecare is launching ‘Weldmar at Home’, a new service described as the local charity’s biggest ever development in patient care, and has launched a major fundraising appeal to help finance it.

Working in partnership with Weldmar Community Nurses, the Weldmar at Home team will ensure that care is available in the home, when it is needed, to provide hands on nursing care and support to patients, regardless of diagnosis, who wish to be in their own home for the final days of their life.

To meet these wishes, individualised care packages are often required, and sadly there is frequently a shortage of carers available to provide a reliable and consistent service at short notice.

Demand is rising too, as last year alone 46% of Weldmar patients wanted this care, an increase of 11%.

Caroline Sweetland, Director of Nursing at Weldmar Hospicecare, says, “When patients are living with a terminal diagnosis, they need the reassurance that no matter where or how they want to receive care and support, it will be available.

Patients often require rapid specialist assessments and appropriate care packages being implemented within hours. For some patients this has been taking days, or even weeks, which just simply is not acceptable. The Covid-19 pandemic has made this even worse.

Many of our patients don't have the time to wait for a full package of care to be in place. In the meantime, if their health deteriorates rapidly, they are admitted to hospital instead of being able to stay in their own home. This can hopefully be avoided if an appropriate and necessary care package can be put in place quickly.

“We provide hands on care to the patients when they are in our Inpatient Unit.

Now that we are finding that many people would prefer to stay at home to die, we want to be able to extend this hands on care there too, especially in the last few weeks when it can be so tiring for families.”

“We continue to work closely with a number of other health care agencies in Dorset to fulfill our patients' wishes, but we want to be able to ensure that every patient who wants to die at home receives the level of care that they deserve, provided by a charity that they already trust, respect and feel comfortable with.”

A major fundraising appeal has been launched today by Weldmar Hospicecare to fund the new service and a team of Health Care Assistants, and donations can be made securely and easily at weld-hospice.org.uk.
