BRIDE VALLEY CAR SERVICE



The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £1.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

BVCS simply provides door-to-door transport and cannot be responsible for assisting with clients' medical or mobility needs. Patients with complex transport needs for hospital appointments should contact the NHS Non-Emergency Patient Transport service.

FROM THE RECTORY

Do we live for our wealth and possessions, or do we live to use them for the glory of God?

One of TV's unlikely hits in recent years is *The Repair Shop* on BBC 1. The concept behind the show, which now attracts audiences of 6.7 million, is, on the face of it, a recipe for very dull TV: People bring their dilapidated old possessions and heirlooms to a barn, where a group of experts restore them. Then the owners come and get them. But there is, of course, much more to it than that.

The reason behind the show's success is that almost every item brought into the repair shop has its own very special, and often very moving, story to tell. Last night I happened to put the television on as the team were putting the finishing touches to the restoration of a clock set into the side of a beautiful wooden ship with metal sails. The clock had been given as a gift by a grandfather to his grandson when he was boy. Now, grown up and with a son of his own, the grandson returned to the barn for the big reveal.

The clock's owner was deaf and communicated through sign language. His son interpreted as his father expressed his emotion at being reunited with the clock, now restored to its former glory. He said that he could suddenly see his



grandfather more clearly in his mind, and that seeing the clock as it was when he had received it so many years ago made him feel like he had been reunited with his grandfather who died when he was just 10 years old.

We are taught, as Christians, to have a very careful relationship with material objects. The Bible teaches us not to place greater importance on material things than God; it warns us of the dangers of covetousness which leads to an unquenchable desire for more and more. Indeed, those who are called to live a life of Christian devotion as monks or nuns are required to take a vow of poverty in which they give up their personal possessions and any sense of ownership, sharing all they have with the community.

So how do we square this teaching with the very real and often very emotional relationship that many of us have with at least some of our possessions? Can we enjoy our valued possessions and still be faithful Christians? The answer is clearly yes. The key to all of this is simple: it's about our hearts. Do we live for our wealth and possessions, or do we live to use them for the glory of God? If Jesus came to you today and said, **"I have great plans for you. Come, sell everything you have and follow Me"** would you be able to part ways with your things? This is the test to see if you make possessions an idol or not.

Back to that barn and those expert craftsmen and women. What the world really needs is an equivalent barn where broken people can turn up and share openly and honestly the stories behind how we came to be broken and to acknowledge our own part in that story; a place where, having shared the story, we can then ask to be carefully, lovingly, painstakingly restored to our former glory. Imagine if we had the opportunity to be repaired, restored, recreated by our master craftsman creator, lovingly held in his hands as he removes all the dirt and stains, cracks and damage of our lives, restoring us to his original vision for us.

Well, the good news is that such a barn does exist. In fact, there is one in almost every village, town and city in the country. Churches are the repair shops where we can go to be repaired, renewed and restored by God our Creator.

If we are moved by the restoration of a clock, imagine the emotion and power of seeing human beings transformed, forgiven, and restored. Now that's a show I would love to watch!

Bridport Museum

BRIDPORT AND REFUGEES

To mark Refugee Week 2021, Chair of Bridport Museum, Professor Karen Hunt has been taking an in-depth look at Bridport's history of welcoming and supporting refugees.

During World War I the town welcomed Belgian Refugees. Many of them had lost everything and few could speak English. Bridport provided furnished accommodation, food and financial support. Many Bridport people (women, men, children; workers as well as employers) were energetic fundraisers.

Donations of food and money were given from all ranks of society including girls working in the local netting warehouses. There was even a little dog that walked around with its own donation box.

In 1914 no-one knew how long this offer of hospitality would be needed. In the end, most of the refugees were unable to return home until 1919. Despite the privations of the home front, Bridport people continued to give practical support to the Belgians living amongst them. Bridport was remembered by many of them as a beacon of kindness and generosity at a terrible time.



Women were at the forefront of the fundraising efforts. In 1918 the King of the Belgians awarded a medal to Tryphena Cornick in recognition of the town's generous response. She had been Bridport's Mayoress at the outbreak of the war and drew together a committee of women who undertook the practical work of fundraising and translating the money and goods given

into practical and sustained support for the refugees. She was one of only 7 women in Dorset honoured with this medal.

In the hope that lockdown will be lifted the committee have met (socially distanced in a garden) to make plans for the rest of the year.

We have 2 visits to Charles Chesshire's nursery in Symondsburry on the 19th July, one group at 2.30pm and one at 6.30pm. There will be a talk and an opportunity to wander round the nursery; we are asked to take our own mug for drinks. Please can members confirm with Cilla Jones if they are intending to go and which session they wish to attend.

We have booked LATCH for our Flower and Produce Show on Saturday 14th August. There will be a reduced schedule to allow more space for people to move around the exhibits. This is an opportunity for our members to share with others the fruits of their labour during this continuing strange time.

Jobs to do in July

Feed, water and deadhead flowers in containers regularly. Don't allow camellias and rhododendrons to dry out as it will prevent a good flower display next year.

Deadhead roses, feed them, tie in and support climbing ones. Cut back the twining shoots of wisteria to control the growth.

Plant autumn-flowering bulbs.

Harvest vegetables as soon as they are ready. Sprinkle fertiliser around the veg patch to give crops a boost. Sow vegetables for autumn harvesting e.g. beetroot, carrots and turnips. Harvest and store garlic once its foliage has turned yellow.

Plant out winter-and spring-maturing brassicas. Gather seed from herbs to store and sow next year.

Check bird baths are topped up with clean water.

THE BRIDE VALLEY BOOK CLUB



This month we read *Transcription* by Kate Atkinson.

The novel jumps between the 1940s, 1950s and the present day. It follows the career of Juliet who is recruited straight from school to work for MI5 during WW2 and subsequently becomes a producer for BBC Schools radio after the war.

Atkinson was intrigued by classified documents released showing the transcribed conversations between Nazi sympathisers during the war and their meetings with supposed Gestapo agents who were in fact from MI5. Although her conversations are fiction they are closely based on what was actually recorded. Juliet is hired to type up the conversations between a rather comic cast of fifth columnists and their MI5 handler from a bugged flat in Dolphin Square.

There is a lot of humour in the book - the section dealing with Juliet's work in Schools broadcasting is particularly good.

However the story also has a much darker side and in the end Juliet proves a very unreliable narrator.

Those who have read other books by Atkinson (her best known is 'Behind the scenes at the museum') felt that this was not her finest work, but having never read one of her books before I am keen to try another as I enjoyed it.

Our Night Sky in July 2021

Venus and Mars will be setting by 10pm after sunset, the former still brilliant, but the latter might be hard to see, despite being close to Venus.

Meanwhile, Saturn and Jupiter will be rising in the South East about this time, and will be visible in the southern sky throughout the night.

The Mars Robot, Perseverance has been carrying out yet more experiments. The growing list of “firsts” for Perseverance, NASA’s newest six-wheeled robot on the Martian surface, includes converting some of the Red Planet’s thin, carbon dioxide-rich atmosphere into oxygen. A toaster-size, experimental instrument aboard Perseverance called the Mars Oxygen In-Situ Resource Utilization Experiment ([MOXIE](#)) accomplished the task. The test took place April 20, the 60th Martian day, or sol, since the mission landed Feb. 18. . After a two-hour warmup period, MOXIE began producing oxygen at a rate of 6 grams per hour. The rate was reduced twice during the run in order to assess the status of the instrument. After an hour of operation the total oxygen produced was about 5.4 grams, enough to keep an astronaut healthy for about 10 minutes of normal activity. Mars’ atmosphere is 96% carbon dioxide and MOXIE works by separating oxygen atoms from carbon dioxide molecules, A waste product, carbon monoxide, is emitted into the Martian atmosphere. The need to provide Oxygen for rocket fuel is very important, since transporting the tons of the gas to Mars from Earth in order to return astronauts would be prohibitive. A larger version of MOXIE would weigh less to transport, and would provide the Oxygen for all the astronauts needs from Mars’ own atmosphere.

While the technology demonstration is just getting started, it could pave the way for science fiction to become science fact – isolating and storing oxygen on Mars to help power rockets that could lift astronauts off the planet’s surface. Such devices also might one day provide breathable air for astronauts themselves

Meanwhile, the Mars helicopter Ingenuity made its sixth successful flight on May 22nd.

News from Portesham Surgery

For those who haven't heard, Dr Fowler is retiring as a partner at the surgery from the end of June this year. As a team we will hugely miss his calm, constant presence, his care for patients and staff alike, and his quirky sense of humour. Fortunately he will be around for several months as a locum while we settle our new GPs into their roles. Hopefully by then we might be able to have mask-less conversations (and photographs)!

We have been so lucky to recruit two salaried GPs to work with us. Dr Amy Windsor starts at the end of June and Dr Claire Lavender starts with us in September.

COVID news:

We completed our invitations to all our adult patients to have their first vaccination at the beginning of June, a huge milestone. If you are aged 18 and over, and have not yet received an invitation, it will be because we have no, or an old, mobile number so please call us to book your appointment, call 119 or use the National Booking Service online. We have evening and weekend Pfizer clinics at the Atrium most weeks and there are plenty of other local venues where you can find a convenient appointment.

You should now be invited for your second vaccination around 8 weeks after your first one so look out for the text, or call us if you haven't got a mobile and we will help you book.

By mid June the nine Mid-Dorset Primary Care Network (PCN) practices had given a first vaccination to 31,183 patients, which is 83% of those eligible (Portesham's figure is 87%). Portesham also leads the way with the second dose vaccinations where we have vaccinated 73% of those eligible (the PCN figure is 68% or 25,508 people). We are all proud to be helping the effort to help Dorset back on its feet, and hugely grateful to the volunteer marshals

who help week after week in all weathers to keep the clinics running smoothly.

New Symptoms: please be aware that the symptoms of the new (Delta) strain of the virus could easily be mistaken for a seasonal cold, ie headache, sore throat and runny nose, sometimes accompanied by muscle ache and fever. If you have these symptoms please stay at home and take a lateral flow test – you can pick these up from any pharmacy. Hospitalisations are rising, including for younger patients especially those who are unvaccinated or have only had one vaccination, so please take any symptoms seriously and keep those around you safe.

ULTRAFAST BROADBAND for Litton Cheney, Long Bredy & Kingston Russell

First we would like to thank people for supporting us in our efforts to secure this installation as soon as possible (especially those that have pretty good speeds already – those less fortunate will really benefit from an improvement).

So, let's go for a touch of brevity in this month's situation report. A new round of funding began in April, and our preferred provider, Openreach, are waiting for confirmation the funds are available from central government. We have an offer from Openreach and we are waiting for them to tell us when they require more information from us with regards to people who wish to take up the ultrafast fibre offer, and then those who have expressed an interest will be contacted by the Bride Valley Fibre Group. Who are they?

The Bride Valley Fibre Group is made up of members of Long Bredy & Kingston Russell Parish Council, Litton Cheney Parish Council and two local residents (Angus Handoll and Sally Dyke) who have already carried out an enormous amount of preparatory work on this project so that we are already well down the line once we get the green light.

We already have the support of our MP, Chris Loder, and we are actively involved with Dorset Council's Digital and Change Department. Regular discussions are ongoing, organised by Dorset Association of Parish and Town Councils. At the moment we are treading water waiting for government and Openreach to spring into action. We are told that action is imminent, but we are already well down the road in a process that would normally take between 2 to 3 years.

What can you do? If you have already indicated an interest in taking fibre broadband into your home, keep the faith and sit tight for the moment. If you have yet to declare an interest – it might be prudent to say at this point that the intent of this scheme is for it to be fully funded by the government and local council, but for it to be given the final go-ahead local residents need to get behind it, i.e. declare an interest. Even if your internet speed is adequate, you are still entitled to a voucher, the value of which will go towards the final cost of the installation. Others with poor speeds will be forever grateful – thank you.

As we start the final half term of this academic year we appreciate being back in school with our friends following lockdown and remote learning in the Spring term.

We are looking forward to celebrating the end of year with trips that staff have planned for the children. Our youngest pupils will be visiting Vurlands Farm, Key Stage 1 pupils will have a day on the beach, Lower Key Stage 2 pupils are off to Carey Outdoor Centre and our Upper Key Stage 2 pupils will be splashing around at Dorset Water Park.

After the disruption caused by Covid over the last 18 months and all trips being cancelled last summer term it feels wonderful to be able to do these things again.

As well as the extra-curricular trips the children also have new topics for this half term. 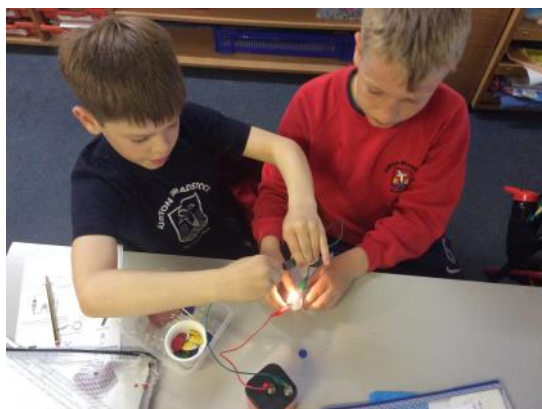

St Michael and All Angels

Anyone who heard the Church bells ringing at noon on Saturday 26th June and wondered why, may like to learn (we only heard about this too late for advance notice to be given last month) that we were taking part in a worldwide celebration.

Prior to 2002, the unmatched bells here (described in the authoritative book on the subject as “surely the most astonishing installation in Dorset”) were hung on a decaying wooden frame and chimed in the tiny belfry through a maze of pulleys, slats, ropes, wires and baler twine. The 2002 re-ordering replaced all this with a steel frame in the tower, a better combination of bells – some old, some re-tuned and some new to us – and a much tidier arrangement of chiming them through a timber construction on the belfry wall called an “Ellacombe Frame”. It is this invention which was celebrated by Churches worldwide, starting at noon in New Zealand, at the end of last month.

Apparently in 1821 The Revd Thomas Ellacombe, Rector of a parish near Bath, grew tired of his Church bells being rung – or not rung – by a team which was frequently variously “unkempt, unruly or drunk”. So he devised an arrangement by which all the bell ropes could be gathered together and the ringing handled by a trustworthy individual, and that was the forerunner of the now widespread system in St. Michael & All Angels today – which in our case is only capable of being chimed by one person anyway.

It appears I was too quick to cast aspersions on the vulpine race last month in seeking a suspect for the death of the nest-sitting swan. Thanks to Edgar Moxom, his father Don and the staff at the Abbotsbury Swannery, a post

mortem was arranged and found no trace of an attack, by a fox or anything else. The likely solution now seems to have been a heart attack of some sort – a very rare occurrence, apparently. Anyhow, the result is the same, and the male (cob) swan has now flown away, presumably to try his luck with another mate for next year. Maybe they will return: maybe not.

Also on the theme of nature notes: as we move further into summer, what a fantastic season it has been this year for bluebells and especially wild cowslips.

But oh dear, what a season it has been for dandelions everywhere as well...!



FORMER CHAIR OF BRIDPORT MUSEUM TRUST AWARDED MBE

Former Chair of Bridport Museum Trust, George Streatfeild has been awarded an MBE for his services to the food industry and the Bridport community.

George was Chair of Bridport Museum Trust between 2012 and 2019. It was during his tenure the Museum underwent its major £1.3 million redevelopment.

He was elected as Chair after being instrumental in securing the Sanctuary Rope and Net Collection bequest for the Museum in 2012. George and his wife Amanda were already Trustees of this important collection, from the Museum of Rope and Net Manufacture, collected and housed by Anthony and Frances Sanctuary in Uploders.

The collection includes a substantial archive relating to the town's industry, as well as rope and net making machinery. Many of the items are now on display in the Museum and were one of the main reasons for attracting Lottery funding for the redevelopment.

George said: 'Bridport Museum is one of the jewels in Bridport's crown and it was a huge privilege to Chair the Trust over such an exciting period of change. There is an amazing team of volunteers which always made involvement fun and rewarding'.

Village Assembly, Tuesday 13th July at 7 pm, - Date may change

This is an actual meeting – yes really! It will be held in the main hall of LATCH and will be the first chance in many months for “live” debate. This BVN notice is intended to serve as a reminder for local residents to please note their diaries, turn up on the day and have their say. Needless to say, last minute adjustments may be necessary dependent on Covid restrictions.

Current planning intents suggest it will be placed in tier 4 which means further development will be limited to affordable housing, community facilities and redevelopment of redundant farm buildings. 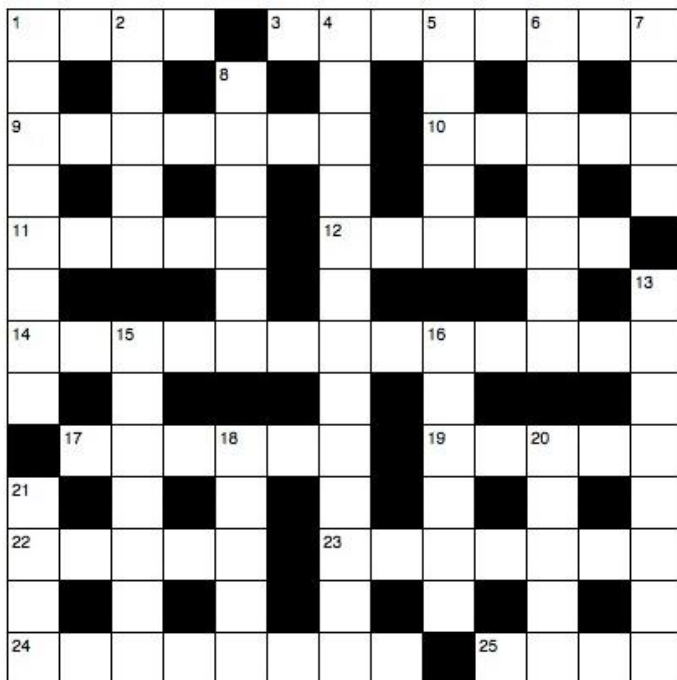

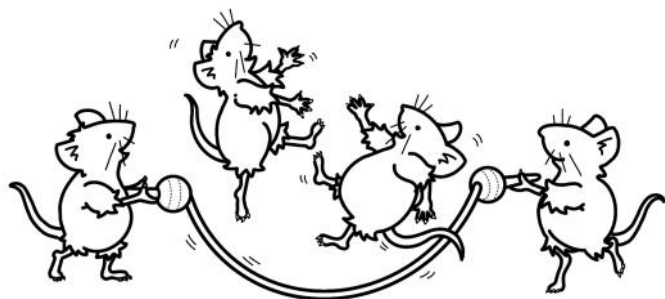

The day after we shall hopefully be hosting the Coffee Morning in the Village Hall so do pop in for some delicious home-made cakes and a chat. See you there!!

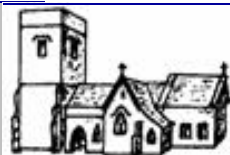
