From the Rectory

Dear friends,

Are you looking forward to Easter? I am. I'm very excited about it. I'm full of anticipation of amazing new life, of the brightness of a new dawn, a new day; full of hope. I'm excited about the 'pilgrimages of peace' we'll be doing in our parishes on Palm Sunday, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday. I'm already imagining what will it be like to gather in darkness at 5.30am at St Martin's Church, Shipton Gorge, on Easter Sunday morning, and then walk towards the dawn and sunrise on Shipton Hill. On a pilgrimage from darkness to light, from despair to hope, from sadness to joy, from death to resurrection new life. It should be glorious, in the beauty of creation. What birds will be singing? What flowers will be smiling? What trees will be waving? What will the view be from the top? What will it be like to sing 'Morning has broken', as the warmth of sunlight powers through, and rolls back the darkness? I appreciate not everyone is excited by Easter. I appreciate that not everyone could make it to the top of Shipton Hill. I'm aware it may be pouring with rain and overcast on Easter Sunday. What then? I'm still going to try and take steps of peace for myself, committed to peace for others too.

If there is to be no hill-top-sun-rise experience, then I will be sharing in the suffering of so many people who feel oppressed and imprisoned in valleys of darkness. An objective of our pilgrimages of peace is to spend some time reflecting on what we can do to support others, praying for peace, maybe feeling helpless and powerless in those prayers, but taking steps as pilgrims of hope, to bring hope. In a recent Bible story where Jesus and his disciples had a mountain top experience of life changing radiant light, there was the temptation to remain on a high, to escape from the painful reality of real life and the needs in the valley below. In our churches we can look up to find hope, but we need to look out to build hope.

Our pilgrimages of peace will be a reminder to us that hope doesn't come on the breeze, but through our actions, in our togetherness, building communities of hope, through steps of kindness. You may not see yourself as a Christian or 'religious.' You may have had bad experiences of church. You may have no idea what church is all about. I do hope, if you can, you will be able to join a 'pilgrimage of peace.' And if you can't, then please wish us well, because we don't have the answers, we are simply exploring the mystery of divine love, through stories, liturgy and song, which remind us of

the suffering of humanity, but also lead us to the possibility of resurrection, life and love in all its fulness, and joy. What a joy to be able to explore this in the beauty and splendour of the Bride Valley & Chesil. Please have a peaceful and joyful Easter.

Pilgrimages of Peace - walking in nature, reflecting on the world: when and where to join in

There will be three walks this month! Rector Andrew has described what these are about in his letter at the start of the BVN.

The first is a **Pilgrimage of Peace on Palm Sunday**. April 13th, 2.30pm, meet at St Nicholas', Abbotsbury for a 2 mile circular including St Catherine's Chapel.

The second walk is **A Pilgrimage of Peace on Good Friday**. This Good Friday, 18th April, take part in a '*there and back walk*', although you are welcome to join at any point along the route.

Starting Point: Holy Trinity, Swyre **Time:** 10.00am

Together, we will journey:

- **10.30am:** Pause at St Mary the Virgin, Puncknowle for reflections.
- **11.30am:** Pause at St Mary's, Litton Cheney for further reflections.

The entire walk spans approximately **4 miles** and will take around **3 hours**. You might like to pause for a coffee break at **The White Horse**, a perfect moment to rest and connect with fellow walkers.

The third walk is **Easter Sunrise and Song** - this starts at Shipton Gorge church at 5.30am on Easter Sunday morning, 20th April with a walk up Shipton Hill for sunrise.

All the routes include some hilly parts and walking through fields, so please wear stout walking shoes and dress for the weather. Dogs on leads are welcome.

The Bride Valley WI

Many of our members ventured out on a cold February evening to listen to Patti, one of our members, talk us through her 'Life in Dance'.

Patti told us how she began having ballet lessons at 4 years of age, paid for by her grandfather, and how after lots of training, hours of practice and injuries she was dancing many leading roles in various ballets, Giselle being her favourite.



Patti switched to musical theatre, had singing lessons and studied jazz dance and tap.

Her journey then led her to Phantom of the Opera. This musical became Patti's life - she went all over the world with the show. Eventually becoming an integral part of a small select team that worked tirelessly with a short timetable setting up the production in foreign countries, Sweden, South Africa and Japan to name a few.

We learnt how a career in dance involved hard work, dedication and upsets as well as adoration, bouquets of flowers and applause. Patti will say there have been sacrifices made but she certainly would not change her 'Life in Dance'.

It was a cold grey winter's morning when 8 intrepid WI walkers set off from the Colliton Club Car Park to Beat the Bounds of the county town. Following the tree lined walks of the early 18th century, we passed the only section of the earlier Roman Wall that survives in Dorchester, along with Thomas Hardy's statue and the Victorian Borough Gardens complete with fountain, bandstand and memorial clock. Lots of lovely snowdrops lined the way with the hope of daffodils to come.

Turning left into Bowling Alley Walks with the former hospital of Somerleigh Court on the left, you can often see nuthatches, tree creepers and grey squirrels in the Sycamore trees here. We head on into South Walks, after a quick inspection of the most recent fire remains in South Street in December 2024, there is a lovely old working Post Box next to the Cenotaph - now under Horse Chestnut trees - leading to a more gruesome area called Gallows Hill depicted by three statues by Elizabeth Frink.

We continued through Salisbury Fields past the modern- day beacon and down to the Old Tannery by the Mill Stream with a little foray out into the water meadows north of the town - no wildlife today! Back over the bridge and up Friary Hill and into Colliton Street with much history regarding the Great Fire of 1613 (one of four) and the migration of folks to Dorchester, Massachusetts, assisted by Reverend John White (1574-1648).

As the temperature was not improving, we decided take a short cut through Grey School Passage - formerly a boy's school - with a quaint garden still attached, and seek a warm cafe, for coffee and cakes of course!

A massive WELL DONE to the skittles team who have made it through to the final of the Dorset WI Skittles League. By the time you read this they will

have played the final against Wool WI. Whether they have won or lost it's been great fun visiting and playing against different WI teams. Our "Skittles for Fun" evenings continue fortnightly on a Tuesday at The White Horse, Litton Cheney. The Bride Valley Book Club

'East of the Sun' by Julia Gregson won the award of Romantic Novel of the Year in 2009. It was an easy read but had more merit as a chronicle of a particular time at the beginning of the 20th century rather than good literature. It follows the lives of several characters who are all facing personal challenges and their reactions to various situations at a time when young women from middle class families were strongly encouraged to find a husband rather than a career.

This 'Fishing Fleet' of women was an attraction to serving soldiers in the Empire who were equally encouraged to find a British wife rather than, or as well as, take a native mistress.

Schizophrenia, resentment of the British presence in India, research into disease and the environment, Ghandi's growing influence and the well-meaning but much resented English model of education are all themes which bubble to the surface but are not developed.

The novel was well-researched; railway journeys made by characters are still possible today and the novel has atmosphere. However, most of us felt that the characters were difficult to sympathise with and the ending was unsatisfactory.

Although published in 2008, it felt like a novel which might have been serialised in a woman's magazine in the 1950's.

'O Fortuna' is the famous opening to Carl Orff's *Carmina Burana*, a cantata inspired by medieval poems about life's earthier pleasures - the fickleness of Fate, the joys

There are maidens who wish they weren't, young men eager for the pleasures of the flesh, drunken gamblers led astray by an Abbot, a roasted swan, followed by a hangover and realisation that Fate will get you in the end. Improvement of the Ashes Area in Burton Bradstock Churchyard

Cilla's April Checklist - Tie in vigorous new shoots of climbers. Build supports for taller plants to train in early growth. Divide late-flowering plants & grasses. Plant summer flowering bulbs, tubers & corms. Keep sowing hardy annuals for colourful summer displays. If buying plug plants, once potted on, protect until all risk of frost has gone. Cut back over-wintered pelargoniums & use cuttings to make new plants. Plant out Mediterranean herbs e.g. rosemary & oregano in free-draining soil; sow annual herbs indoors. Remember when potting on tomato seedlings, plant deeper to encourage new roots from stems. If the soil is warm, plant maincrop potato tubers; sow beetroot, cabbages, carrots, chard, leeks, peas, radishes, spinach & lettuces outdoors; sow celery, melons, sweetcorn, runner & French beans under cover.

It is several years since a project to repair or renew and replace a number of the windows in the Church, and their surrounding flaky masonry, began to be planned and organised, and the necessary funding and Diocesan permission (called a Faculty) put in place. Several people have been active behind the scenes during the period, but it has now come to a head at last, and the work should have begun by the time these words are read. The glass specialist is Dan Humphreys, who moved onto the site during March, and the repair works to the fabric will be carried out by Simon Crumbleholme's firm (which will already be familiar to some), starting in April. Apart from services,

it isn't known at this stage if the Church will be a sealed building site or open to interested visitors while the restoration takes place. Talking of services, there will certainly be the customary short penitential Litany service at 10.00am on Good Friday. A scheme for Easter decorations in Church will presumably take shape between now and then.

Please note that the walled garden in Littlebredy will be open to the public from 2.00pm-5.00pm on Easter Day and Easter Monday, and thereafter as usual on Wednesday and Sunday afternoons till September.

As "trailed" in the last edition, many of the households here will have a new ownership in April. The fresh faces in the village from the Belport team will already be recognisable to many of us: they are Will Robinson and Kick Douglas. After April, Church Walk will become their organisational hub, which means we shall say a sad farewell at that stage to Ed and Christine Mcfadden, who have contributed so much to village and local community life over the past twenty years (almost precisely). Fortunately they will not be far away afterwards – in Bridport, in fact – so we hope their links with Littlebredy will remain and we wish them well as they move away.

relive the songs of the 1940's. A little later, and for those a little older, there will be jollifications, music and food of the period – did we hear Sausage & Mash? - down at the White Horse.

On VE Day itself (8th May) as well as aligning ourselves with the national events of the day, there will be a special school church service at St Mary's (see church entry above for more details), and at lunchtime the school children will have their own street party. In the evening there will be a chiming of church bells across the nation, a lighting of beacons and lanterns of peace and we will pause in silence remembering those whose ultimate sacrifice made victory in Europe possible, an event we still celebrate and remember in 2025.

More details closer to the day, but be prepared to celebrate, and also remember.

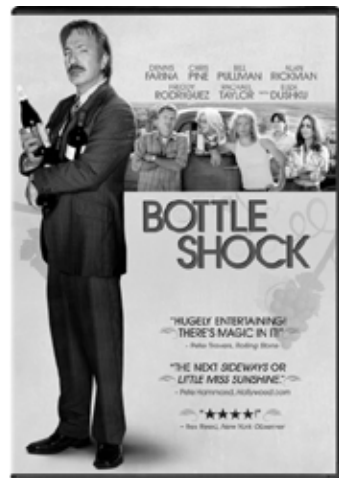

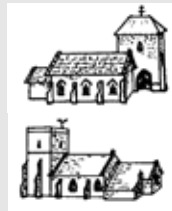

Recipe Corner

Super healthy orzo casserole

Nutritionists recommend 30 plants a week, so this recipe is a very tasty way to get started on healthier habits! If you'd like to add meat to this recipe, I recommend frying some chorizo in the same pan at the very beginning for maximum flavour.



Prep time: 15 minutes

Cook time: 35 minutes

Ingredients:

- 1 onion
- 3 garlic cloves
- 1 leek (chopped)
- 2 peppers (finely chopped, any colour)
- 2 courgettes (copped into cubes)
- 2 x 400g tins of chopped tomatoes
- 1 x 400g tin of haricot beans and their liquid (you can also use butter beans or cannellini beans)
- 120g orzo pasta
- 100g pitted olives
- 1 tsp paprika
- 1 tsp miso
- 30g of fresh basil leaves
- Juice of half a lemon
- Salt and pepper

Method:

1. Heat olive oil in a large saucepan or casserole dish (30cm diameter or similar) over medium heat. Fry the onion until softened, then add the finely chopped garlic and fry for another 30 min. If you want to add chorizo, now is a good time to do it!
2. Stir in peppers, leek, courgettes, cover with lid, reduce heat and gently cook for 5-8 minutes until softened. Add the tinned tomatoes, beans and their liquid, orzo, olives, paprika, miso, basil and a pinch

of salt and pepper and stir until all the vegetables are thoroughly coated with the sauce and the orzo is evenly dispersed.

3. Bring to boil, then lower the heat and simmer with the lid on for 10 minutes, then turn off the heat and allow to rest for another 10 minutes to allow the orzo to fully cook and absorb the stock. Remember to regularly check and stir.
4. Serve with a couple of leaves of fresh basil and a little lemon juice
