From the Rectory

Dear friends,

What is your good news? Where is your good news?

The good news from me, writing on 14th July, is that I/we have survived our first year living in the rectory, and I have completed my first year as Rector of the twelve Bride Valley & Chesil churches. Moving to beautiful west Dorset has been good news for us as a family. We want to continue to live in good news. But how will we, or can anyone, manage to live in good news when at times we seem to be surrounded by bad news?

When I attended for interviews prior to being offered the role as Rector, I was asked if I had any questions at the end of the each of the two interview panels. I had one question for everyone sat around the table: what is your good news? In this context I was really asking: what is your 'Gospel'? What is at the heart of your Christian faith? Or if we take Christianity out of it, what keeps you going when all else seems lost? What is the light in the darkness for you? Where is your hope? Where is your love?

When I'm struggling, I get out into the garden to find good news. It could be new growth beyond my control which reminds me of the life-giving power of creation, or it could be my ability to pull out a 'weed' which helps me feel in control. Or I go for a run, grateful that I can run, when many others can't. Or I reflect on the love of my family and give thanks for how blessed I am. These things I consciously reinforce as good news to bring a smile to my face. For you it might be different. Whatever could be good news for you, focusing on it, engaging with it, making time for it and being grateful for it could be good for you. In positive psychology or 'happiness research' finding the good news in our lives and being grateful for it can lead us to have more optimistic and healthier lives. The simpler the good news the better.

As Rector, I'm constantly reflecting on what the 'good news' is that I could or should be promoting in our churches. Some Christians are convinced they know what the good news is, but I'm not so sure. In fact, some of the so-called 'good news' makes me uncomfortable, particularly when the starting point is one where we're all supposed to be deserving of divine punishment because we're all 'miserable offenders' or 'sinners'. That's not good news at all. This type of being 'saved' just seems like a mechanism to keep people in their place, reinforce guilt and shame, and control lives. If it was such good

news our churches would be packed. They are not. The good news for many is that they don't have to go near a church.

Increasingly I'm now thinking the question is not 'what is my good news?' or 'where is my good news?', but rather 'am I good news?' When people encounter me do they encounter good news? Not because I'm constantly full of positivity and cheerfulness (which I'm not), but because there is something that connects with their bad news to an extent where at the basic level, they know and feel the good news that they are not suffering on their own, their pain has been acknowledged, love, gentleness and kindness is present. I don't always have that, but if I did it would be the good news of compassion, the willingness to share in someone else's suffering, climb into the darkness with them, and feel their pain. It would be love in action.

Is compassion the good news at the heart of Christianity? If it is, then a question for us in the churches is: are we compassionate? Is the way we are as individuals, and the way we are as church communities good news? Maybe it's a question for us all throughout our communities, in our pubs, schools, village halls, and WhatsApp groups and Facebook pages too. Could we through our kindness and compassion, and love in action be the good news, the lights in the darkness, the hope, and the love that we all need?

The Bride Valley Book Club Review "The Garden of Evening Mists" by Tan Twan Eng

We were intrigued by this novel set in the Cameron Highlands tea plantation district of Malaysia. The narrator is Yun Ling, a Malayan but of Chinese heritage, who as a young teenager is interned in one of Japan's WW2 jungle internment camps. Her older sister is coerced into acting as a "comfort woman" for the Japanese troops. As the sole survivor of the camp, Yun Ling later works for the war crimes commission before completing her education and legal training in the UK. She returns to work as a prosecutor in Malaya but interrupts her career to become an apprentice to the mysterious ex imperial Japanese gardener, Arimoto. The time fame covered by this novel is complex - moving between traumatic memories of the camp, Yun Ling's time after the war when she works on the traditional Japanese garden close to the hill station/tea plantation where she has family connections - and finally Yun Ling as a 60+ retired judge who returns to the garden she has helped build. Many aspects of Japanese culture and Malay history are covered in this novel - the art and beauty of gardens, the communist guerilla insurgency of the 1960s, tea ceremonies, archery, the colonial legacy, the Japanese humiliation in defeat after the atom bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, a kamikaze pilot who survived by mere chance, the art of woodcut prints and how the interplay of forgetfulness and memory can conspire to both hide and reveal truths. This hardly does justice to this delicate but haunting tale. We agreed it was a rewarding book for anyone interested in Japanese culture and how war shapes the lives of those caught up in the tragedy.

Saunders Richardson Wood

Not too much to report in the wood – the undergrowth has managed to find enough moisture to carry on growing and the shade from the trees is very welcome while working in it. We have tried to keep areas around the gateways and tracks clear where possible. The nettle fertiliser should be bottled and ready for sale. We intend to open the wood on Wednesday 13th August from 11.00am to midday. If you would like to come along and either help or have a walk round, that would be great. This is a members' only event but we can sign you up on the day and there is no charge to join.

Shipton Gorge Orchard

The fruit trees in the Orchard are now bearing fruit with varying degrees of success. The Beauty of Bath and Devonshire Ouarrenden both dessert apples - are normally ready July/August - the rest will be ready to pick September onwards. A little surprise was our new little tree - Strawberry Norman -- which has produced a single apple small but perfectly formed! The ragwort has been pulled up and the scything chap has been round and cut large areas of the long grass trying to avoid the patches of wildflowers which have seeded around the Orchard. We will be doing some work on Monday 4



August 11.00am to midday. All residents are welcome to come along.

We will have a stall at the **Village Fete on Saturday 9th August** and the fertiliser will be available then. We will also have a selection of old-fashioned sweets ready to be weighed and bagged. Cilla's August Checklist

Prioritise watering, looking for those plants that dry out & wilt quickly in the sun. Keep deadheading spent blooms to prolong the flowering season of your border & pot grown plants. Deadhead lavender. Sow cornflowers. Pot up any self-sown seedlings to grow on & plant out

next spring. Collect seed ready to sow in the autumn or keep until the spring.

Feed salad crops in containers with a high-nitrogen liquid fertiliser; use a high potash feed for tomatoes to encourage ripening. Continue to sow spring cabbages. Plant sprouting broccoli & protect them from the butterflies & pigeons. Prune summer raspberries as soon as all the fruit has been harvested. Harvest or pinch out basil frequently for bushier growth.

The media circus has moved on, and life has started to settle down in the village. It now seems that access to the waterfall and park may be re-opened to the public at certain times, subject to the safety checks and risk assessments required nowadays, which will be good news to everyone who enjoys the peace and tranquillity of Littlebredy.

Meanwhile, the Past Participate team have been back, this time at the head of the Valley of Stones, where they have been excavating a brick kiln. During the eighteenth century clay was excavated on the site, shaped in wooden moulds and fired in the kiln. Eventually, perhaps when the arrival of the railway to Abbotsbury brought cheap, mass-produced bricks, the kiln ceased to operate, and was demolished. A clay pipe of the type common in the 1850's found amongst the broken bricks may be a clue to the time of demolition. An unexpected bonus was the discovery nearby of a previously-unknown sarsen stone, hidden under the topsoil. Further investigation will be needed to find out whether it was once standing at the head of the valley.

Down in the village, work has been going on in the church to restore the stained-glass windows, and to repoint some of the stonework and install new guttering. For two weeks the bells were silent, to allow the builders safe access to the tower, where their predecessors have left graffiti. When the roof was retiled some years ago, a message was found on the timbers dating back to the early years of WW2, saying 'Soon got to join the army to fight Hitler'.

The last window to be restored will be the great east window, which will be taken away in August by Dan Humphries and his team to their workshop in Glastonbury. The empty window frames will be boarded up, but we will be inviting children and their families to help to brighten up the boards with artwork until the glass windows return!

Anyone who thinks that the English are a peaceful race has obviously never organised the annual pumpkin growing competition.

I find this competitive spirit a little bemusing, as for the last 25 years, the Earl of Stowe has always won first prize. That his mother, the Dowager Countess, is the judge, is, I am sure, pure coincidence. That she has arrived for the past three years with a white stick and accompanied by a golden Labrador does, however, raise doubts.

To award the Earl any prize at all does seem a little unfair, when the only time he ever gets mud on his boots is when he falls off his horse while hunting. I suspect he would be hard pressed to find where the kitchen garden is on his estate. But to give any credit to his gardening staff would be seen as bad form, so we all keep quiet.
