From the Rectory

Dear Friends.

Love, joy, peace and hope to you all this Christmas from the Rector and all the people of the churches of the Bride Valley. We pray that wherever you are and whoever you are with on Christmas Day that you will experience some kindness and generosity and know that you are not on your own. We pray you will know the warmth of God's love for you.

If you asked me what the central message of Christmas is I might say it is 'God with us' (Hebrew: *Emmanuel*), and by that I mean 'unconditional reliable consistent love is with us' (Hebrew: *hesed*). I might also say the 'light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not and will not be able to overcome it' (John 1:5). My words of faith are taken from words in the Bible, but they are only meaningful and powerful if we *become* the central message of Christmas, and bring them alive, and make them a reality in our homes, in our villages and in our communities. What can we do and who do we need to contact or spend time with to let them know that they are not on their own, and that steadfast love is with them? How can we be a light in the darkness with those for whom Christmas exacerbates loneliness, isolation and despair?

For those who will spend Christmas in the presence of young children and get to see the wonder and pleasure in their eyes from the nativity, Santa, Christmas trees, lights and presents, Christmas can and should be a time which brings smiles and joy. But for so many people, in addition to pressures to buy presents and food, Christmas can be such a painful reminder of broken relationships, grief and separation from loved ones. Here in the rectory, we know that reality as there are likely to be adult children that we will not see or even hear from at Christmas, with a grandchild that we have never seen. That's a heartache. The emotions of Christmas can be so painful and heartbreaking that for some people keeping a distance and withdrawing is part of their coping mechanism. We may feel powerless in the face of this reality, we may feel guilt and shame, but our only hope and prayer is that it won't always be like this and that the flickering light of love is still shining in the darkness. But for some people, where death has brought separation, it will always be like this as nothing can truly replace a loved one. For some it's easier to try and just survive or avoid Christmas, struggling to find the energy

to get through the day. The warmth of our understanding presence which acknowledges the pain could bring light in their darkness, embodying 'God with us' and bring hope. May love, joy, peace and hope be with us all.

The Autumn term has flown by with so much happening at Burton School. This term we have been thinking about the values of Hope and Respect and the children have been linking our work in collective worship to homework and classwork. They have thought about how they can be respectful to others and the world around them and why Hope is such an important Christian value. In our collective worships with Rev'd Andrew, the children have been learning how to create their own prayers and blessings. Collective worship is such an important part of our school ethos and it has been great to talk with the children and see how much they value it too.

In the first half of the Autumn term, Wagtails have followed the enquiry question 'Who am I and where do I belong?'. They have thought about people and places that are important to them which has enabled them to

Our Night Sky in December 2024

The Sun will be setting at about 1700 in the middle of the month, but Venus will be prominent for another 3 hours before it also sets in the South west, followed by Saturn at about 2300. Jupiter will be visible throughout the night between Aldebaran in the V of Taurus, and the Pleiades, a

the night between Aldebaran in the V of Taurus, and the Pleiades, a wonderful close combination, perfector a photo with your I Phone, if it has the capabilities of night photography. Orion is also a favourite constellation, again visible throughout the night.

NASA launched Europa Clipper toward Jupiter on Monday. The spacecraft is expected to near Jupiter's moon Europa around April 2030. Europa is the sixthlargest moon in the Solar System and Jupiter's fourth-largest satellite. Despite its cracked and discoloured appearance, it is the smoothest solid object in the Solar System.

This frigid moon of Jupiter hides a tantalizing secret: a probable sea containing twice as much water as all of Farth's oceans combined. While the sequence icy shell is hard as rock, the interior is warmer, heated by the flexing of its iron core and stone mantle. The side of Europa that's closest to Jupiter experiences a stronger pull than the farther side, stretching the entire moon and probably causing the long cracks that run across its surface as well as heating the interior. If the liquid ocean really is there, it could make Europa an especially promising place to look for life, because liquid water is crucial for life as we know it. We also know that many forms of life including fish, exist in the depths of the deepest ocean on Earth, fed by volcanic plumes in the crust, and jets of water ejected by Europa into its atmosphere, hint at all the elements that are necessary to support life.

Its a long time to wait until 2030, but if the Hubble and James Webb telescopes reveal anything new, I will let you know.

Could you Write for the BVN?

We would like to extend our coverage of the Bride Valley into both more general and specific topics, and if you could contribute please let the editor know or contact your local village correspondent. Attendance Allowance: Information from HM Government

Attendance Allowance is extra money you can claim if you're over State Pension age and need help with your care needs or regular supervision. It's not means-tested, so you can claim it whatever your income or savings.

Overview: Attendance Allowance helps with extra costs if you have a disability severe enough that you need someone to help look after you. There's a different way to claim if you're nearing the end of life (for example, because you have a life-limiting illness). It's paid at 2 different rates and how much you get depends on the level of care that you need because of your disability.

You could get £72.65 or £108.55 a week to help with personal support if you're both:

- physically or mentally disabled
- State Pension age or older

It does not cover mobility needs. You could get extra Pension Credit, Housing Benefit or Council Tax Reduction if you get Attendance Allowance. You do not have to have someone caring for you in order to claim.

If you do have a carer, they could get Carer's Allowance if you have substantial caring needs.

Bride Valley Book Group Review

Our book this month was "The Stopping Places" by Damian Le Bas. Le Bas is a Romany, part of a large traveller family from the south of England. He did not have a typical traveller upbringing however: his father was a well-known artist and he won scholarships to a prestigious boarding school then St John's College, Oxford. He feels himself an outsider so to try and explore his heritage and roots he sets out to travel alone round the country living in a van and stopping at the traditional Romany halts or 'atchin tans'. This book relates his journey.

We had mixed views about it. The Romany history and language were fascinating as were his trips to France and Scotland but some of us felt the rest of the book was a bit aimless. Many of the 'atchin tans' were simply lay-

bys and didn't seem to provide much illumination about the way of life he was trying to emulate. Some members did however enjoy the description of a traditional way of life now under threat.



The Rev Dr Gary Bowness continues his tongue-in-cheek letters from Uncle Eustace



My dear Nephew Darren

So, you are excited about being invited to plan your first Carol Service. The dangers involved are only slightly less than being invited to judge the best cake made by the Ladies' Group. You seem to have no idea of the lifelong offence you will inevitably cause. In decades to come when you will either be a seasoned old clergyman - or more likely a double glazing salesman - you will be remembered as "the Curate who offended Mrs Smith."

First, you have to decide which groups are going to be represented to give the readings. If the Brownies were asked last year, then it has to be the Cubs this time. But don't forget that every third year, the Boys' Brigade must be asked, or they will take their revenge and get their flag tangled in the nave chandelier come Remembrance Sunday. If someone represents the choir, then over a four year period, all four voice parts must be called on - and if the organist

isn't asked on the fifth year, then all hymns subsequently will be played at double speed and with one verse missing. Should one person have been invited to read for two successive years, then their annual appearance thereafter will be taken as an inalienable right for the rest of their lifetime – and probably longer than that. To drop them may well invoke legal proceedings,

Then there is the batting order to be considered. Someone from the church council will take it as a deliberate slight if they are placed lower in the order than a representative of the Men's Fellowship and no self-respecting bell ringer would voluntarily follow a brass cleaner. If you do not specify where they should read from and how the readings should end, then a form of ecclesiastical inflation will happen. If the first reader speaks from the chancel step, the next one will go to the lectern; after the sanctuary and pulpit have been utilised, the final reader will probably ask you to move so he can take your place. The variations on "Here endeth", "This is the Word of the Lord", and "Thanks be to God", are endless and will increase in length as the Service progresses. The final reader will probably end with a lengthy exegesis on what he thinks the passage means, correcting whatever you said in your sermon.

I once made the mistake of not telling all readers which Bible translation to use. One, an Old Testament expert, therefore decided to read in Hebrew. Not to be outdone, another read her Gospel passage in Greek - apologising beforehand that it may not be a perfect rendering, as she was spontaneously translating it from the English. And some say Christians are not competitive.

You have two alternatives: either repeat last years' Service without any alteration, saying that it could not be improved, or design your own - and then take Christmas off.
