From the Rectory

Dear friends,

I decided to go on a 'Prayer Run' after a day imprisoned by emails. I consulted the map, got trainers, shorts, jacket, gloves and hat on, and headed for the sea. The sun was shining. It was high tide. Chesil Beach stretched out in front of me and lured me. Running on the shingle I prayed for all those who were finding this New Year hard-going, like every step of every day was exhausting. I headed inland to find softer ground and a path which became mud and flood, and I prayed for all those looking for direction and safety, wading through grief and loss, flooded with tears. Through stiles and gates, then faced with a lake, I was back on the unforgiving beach, then comforted by a car park, until I turned north, and started up the hill. I prayed for all those who even after temporary relief were finding life an uphill struggle.

I leaned into the hill and discovered 'Labour-in-Vain' lane. My heart sank, but my determination rose, and I prayed for all those feeling undervalued and taken for granted. As I ran, 'Marco Polo' cheered me on. A robin emerged in the hedgerow, red breast forward, inspiring me on with a flurry of flight, until I reached a tree laden with orange marker buoys. I gave thanks for the guidance and prayed for victims of raging seas and tsunamis. I found the way to a path through a field of root vegetables. Were they turnips? I didn't know. But they were purple, and I remembered Advent, looked forward to Lent, and gave thanks for sacrificial love.

As I ran from field to lane, I could hear the waves pushing me forward. The sun was setting behind me. The gravitational pull of the moon was in front of me. I leaned into another hill and found myself in paradise: blue sky above, green rolling fields left and right, and I prayed for all who had died recently. I reached the brow of the hill and saw endless possibilities as the landscape extended towards Portland and beyond. I prayed for the Chesil churches and turned left. Abbotsbury Hill welcomed me into her arms. Motorists slowed to match my laboured breathing as I prayed for all those struggling with the daily grind of commuting to and from work, before I turned again, and slid, literally on snow and ice, into the Bride Valley. 'Private'. 'Private'. Notices on gateways prompted prayers for all those who felt excluded in our communities. A deer ran to my left. A high wire fence appeared on my right. I prayed for all those behind barbed wire, in prisons, in refugee camps. Then

I stopped. I found a wood, and a gate. I followed a dark wet path. A bridge over a brook. Along a snake of dead decaying leaves. Under a canopy of sleeping trees. Over another bridge. Into a snow covered clearing; until I found it. The King of Love welcomed me with outstretched arms, in this bleak mid-winter. I reached into my pocket and took out some fruit loaf. I unwrapped it, broke it and gave thanks: 'Blessed are you Lord God of all creation, through your goodness we have this bread to offer.' I chewed. My weary muscles rejoiced: 'It will become for us the bread of life.' I reached into my other pocket for the 'fruit shoot' bottle. 'Blessed are you Lord God of



all creation, through your goodness we have this wine to offer.' I drank. I was revived: 'It will become for us the cup of salvation.' I stretched out one hand to the fading sunlight in the west; the other to the moon in the east. I triangulated myself, in holy communion with creation, and I prayed for love and for joy and for peace in the Bride Valley in this New Year. Then I left the King of Love, reigning over ruins, and I ran towards the safety of darkness, and a route illuminated by puddles and shadows, reflecting on the words of a ninety-year-old from the valley below: 'You can pray as much as you want but nothing will change without humans.'

Our Night Sky in February 2025

The sun will be setting at about 1730 at the middle of the month, leaving Venus and Saturn to dominate the western sky. Saturn will set about 1900, while Venus will be brilliant until she sets at 2100. Meanwhile, Jupiter will be the next brightest object in the southern sky from Sunset until it sets



in the west at about 0200hrs followed by Mars at about 0600hrs. Orion and Taurus continue to be among the most recognisable constellations of the winter sky, and are fascinating to sweep with binoculars.

Two for two! A duo of interacting galaxies commemorates the second science anniversary of NASA's James Webb Space Telescope, which takes constant observations, including images and highly detailed data known as spectra. Its operations have led to a "parade" of_discoveries by astronomers around the world. In just two years, Webb has transformed our view of the universe, is providing insights into longstanding mysteries about the early universe and ushering in a new era of studying distant worlds. The telescope's specialization in capturing infrared light — which is beyond what our own eyes can detect — shows these galaxies, collectively known as Arp 142, locked in a slow cosmic dance. Webb's observations, which combine near- and mid-infrared light from Webb's NIRCam (Near-Infrared Camera) and MIRI (Mid-Infrared Instrument), respectively, clearly show that they are joined by a haze represented in blue that is a mix of stars and gas, a result of their mingling.

Their ongoing interaction was set in motion between 25 and 75 million years ago, when the Penguin (individually catalogued as NGC 2936) and the Egg (NGC 2937) completed their first pass. They will go on to shimmy and sway, completing several additional loops before merging into a single galaxy hundreds of millions of years from now. Do visit the NASA James Webb web site and enjoy the fabulous images it contains.

The Bride Valley Book Club

Act of Oblivion by Robert Harris.

Harris's novel is named for the Act of Parliament passed in the early days of the monarchy's restoration and Charles II's coronation. Following the English civil war, the interregnum of Cromwell and the execution of Charles I in 1642, this Act was intended to offer clemency and "oblivion" to those who had fought on Cromwell's side. The exceptions were the regicides who had signed Charles's execution warrant. The story follows the fortunes of two regicides who abandon their families and flee to Massachusetts, then a dependent British colony. They are hunted by a loyal Royalist with both personal and ideological grievances who makes it his mission to capture them alive and bring them to justice. Harris has done his research diligently and we learned much about not only this period in history but also the conflict in religious belief which dominated 17thC England and America.

Harris covers a great deal of ground: reflections on the privations of the civil war, Charles I's beheading in Whitehall, the lives of the early American colonists, the collapse of Cromwell's Commonwealth, the fortunes of the regicides' families who are left behind, and the decadence of Charles II's restoration court. Most of us enjoyed this novel and for those unfamiliar with this turbulent period in our past - it was an interesting history lesson - after all other countries waited much longer for their anti-monarchist revolutions!


Over twenty-five years, Luke Wright has built

PRINCE OF WALES

A huge thank you to all the patients who sent us cards and gifts for Christmas. The

kind messages and support from our patient community is appreciated beyond measure, so thank you.

Congratulations: Our practice Nurse Rachelle Pearce is part of a team who have been conducting a study on Hydration. The study involved improving patient's hydration in care homes and hospitals, the findings were remarkable!



There was a marked decrease in falls and urinary tract infections during the period of the study. As a result, the team won a coveted Nursing Times Award in November 2024. You can read more about the study on the website https://staywelldorset.nhs.uk/campaigns/hydration/

Infection prevention and control: Here in Dorset, we are experiencing increased levels of respiratory and gastrointestinal illnesses such as Influenza, RSV, COVID-19 and Norovirus. There are some simple things you can do to try to help protect yourself and others:

- Washing your hands with soap and warm water (don't rely on alcohol-based gels)
- If you have symptoms, stay at home to help protect others and don't visit people in hospital or care homes
- Norovirus spreads very easily so use bleach-based cleaners to disinfect surfaces
- Don't prepare food for others if you have Norovirus symptoms
- Wash bedding at 60°C, with detergent, to kill Norovirus, and handle bedding with disposable gloves

We held a weather delayed meeting on 13th December, which was well attended with a key discussion on surface water inundation during heavy downfalls. As agreed at the meeting, to fully understand where the problem areas are, can you please send any relevant information, including photos and videos, to Martine Simmonds at martinesimmondssgpc@gmail.com. This includes field run-off, drains where there are persistent problems, and any impact on properties, gardens etc. From this information we will be able to work with Highways, the Environment Agency and those impacted within the village, to look at potential solutions.

On a sad note, we accepted Christine Huxtable's resignation from the PC as Treasurer, and we thank her for many years of invaluable service. Altar Hangings and Liturgical Colours

During my time as Sacristan people have from time to time asked me about the reason for changing the altar frontal for one of a different colour. So, what is the significance of this?

Each colour is for a special season in the church's year, or a celebration.

<u>White, or sometimes Gold,</u> is for festivals of our Lord and the Blessed Virgin Mary, such as Christmas and Easter, and also for Saints (excepting Matyrs) and All Saints' Day.

<u>Red</u> is for Martyrs, and Whitsuntide as it symbolises the fire of the Holy Spirit.

<u>Purple</u> symbolises penitence and is for Advent and Lent, (although in Lent it is often the practice to leave the altar bare).

<u>Green</u>, as being the commonest colour of nature, is used for Ordinary Days which do not fall into any of the above categories.

Cilla's February Checklist - Prune shrub roses before any growth. Feed rhododendrons. Cut back ivy, Virginia creeper & overgrown hedges before birds start nesting. Clematis that flowers after June can be pruned hard back to healthy buds just above base. Trim winter-flowering jasmine & heathers once finished flowering. Remove dead stems at base & trim back to healthy buds on over-wintering fuchsias. Prune old stems from ferns. Sow hardy annuals under cover to plant out in spring. Prepare veg seed beds & warm the soil with cloches. Sow broad beans, Brussels sprouts & lettuces under cover. Continue to sprout early potatoes in warmth & light to produce strong shoots. Feed & provide fresh water birds; regularly clean feeders & bird tables/baths.

This edition will definitely look backwards and not forwards – mainly to the various enjoyable and successful celebrations of the 2024 Christmas season in Littlebredy, although they will be six weeks or so in the past when these notes are read.

A lot of work by a lot of people went into preparing the candle-lit carol service on December 22nd, in terms of Church decorations, the form of service and the hospitality offered afterwards. It was all enjoyed by a large congregation, as was the Christmas Day Communion itself, again with many candles augmenting the December daylight. Paul Cheater came up the valley to play the organ at short notice, which was also much appreciated.

Many villagers and others congregated again on Boxing Day, when the keenly contested duck race from the waterfall to the walled garden took place. One poor duck never even made it past the foot of the waterfall and was rescued from being jammed upside down in the rocks the following day, but most bobbed along to the finish, with the winning owner and trainer Alex Giulioni, a visitor. The standards were as high as ever for the best-decorated ducks too. The event raised £450 for the British Heart Foundation (nominated by last year's winner), which is the latest sum in a total of nearly \pounds 3,000 raised overall for different charities during the ten years the race has been held (plus of course the "free" defibrillator in the village hall, which has been called upon once during the period too). None of this would have been possible without the initiative and energies of Edgar and Jacqui Moxom especially, to whom enormous thanks and congratulations are due.

The flurry of snow and subsequent freeze in early January were again sufficient to make White Hill and Longlands Lane "interesting", but at least the difficulties were shorter than those caused by the November snowfall, and let us hope we have now seen the last of nasty conditions this winter.

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
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
