

Cover illustration: On 6th January we celebrate Epiphany – the visit of the Wise Men to the baby Jesus. But who were these Wise Men? No one knows for sure. Matthew calls them 'Magi', and that was the name of an ancient caste of a priestly kind from Persia. It wasn't until the third century that they were called kings – by a church father, Tertullian. Another church father, Origin, assumed there were three – to correspond with the gifts given. Later Christian interpretation came to understand gold as a symbol of wisdom and wealth, incense as a symbol of worship and sacrifice, and myrrh as a symbol of healing – and even embalming. Certainly, Jesus challenged and set aright the way in which the world handled all three of these things. Since the 8th century, the Magi have had the names Balthasar, Caspar and Melchior.

From the Rectory

Dear friends.

When it snowed in late November, enough for our children to go into the garden and make snow bunnies and a snow man, our seven-year-old son Arthur said to me: 'Dad, do you know Santa?' 'Yes' I replied, wondering where this was going. 'Well,' continued Arthur, 'do you think Santa gave us this snow because it's our first winter here and he wants to make our journey amazing.' I smiled and congratulated Arthur on such lovely thoughts. Not far down the road, motorists were stranded in Swyre, and others related car insurance nightmare tales of their car sliding uncontrollably into another car. One person's heaven can be another person's hell I thought. But then out of the despair and frustration presented by the snow to motorists in Swyre came compassion and hope as the local community provided shelter and a warm drink to complete strangers. Hearts were warmed and the power of Arthur's Santa was made known in the Bride Valley.

BRIDE VALLEY CAR SERVICE

The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £2.00 per journey).

Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

This Term we look forward to an action-packed term ahead! Currently planned are a Stone Age Survival Workshop, a Puppet Theatre, watching and making session for the

EV Car Charger

As many of you may now know we are delighted to confirm that our EV Car Charger is up and running at school! Readers of the BVN are most welcome to come and use the charger (out of school hours).

The charger is faster than typical domestic supply (22kw as opposed to 7kw) and is considerably cheaper (approx. 20-25% cheaper) than other local chargers. Crucially - it will be taking power directly from our own solar panels on the roof of school so when the sun is out the electric will be as renewable and local as it is possible to be! Details of the charger can be found here and it will operate via the "tap" e-charger app which can be uploaded onto your phone or use the QR code on the charger to get started.

At present we will limit and control use to only local users so if you want to use the charger - please email me your details (full name, car registration and email address) and I will add you to our closed group of users. If you know of others locally who would like to make use of the charger at weekends and during the holidays - then please do forward their details and I can add them to the group of approved users. The charger is located in the school staff car park on the side of the Victorian classroom.

LATCH Solar Panels

I'm delighted to share the news that we were successful in our bid to Low Carbon Dorset for a grant to have solar panels installed on the south facing roof of LATCH.

LCD were impressed with both the details of our bid as well as the support of local residents and the school's own Eco-committee - all of whom wrote letters of support which made clear how much of a joined-up effort the application was. Huge thanks also to the LATCH committee who worked very hard to prepare all the details and projections as well as its sub-committee who worked to identify local contractors for the project. With the grant (as well as contributions from School, LATCH, Parish Council and other local sources), installation was possible over the summer holidays - with huge thanks to those on site for the works.

As you may know, LATCH is unique as a shared site between the school and the village, and it is fantastic to see this new addition which, alongside its current heat pump, will make it completely fossil-fuel free to run for large parts of the year. There will also be financial savings for both school and LATCH which will help us put more of our money into school resources for the children. Although we are a very old school and some of our site buildings go back to the 1700's, it is wonderful to show the children that we can make these new, green, upgrades and how they are possible because of

the lovely way school, village, LATCH, governors and pupils all worked together.

Swimming Pool

Huge thanks to The Litton Trust, Litton Cheney Parish Council and local residents who have responded so generously to our Swimming Pool Restoration Fund. As I write, alongside parent and school fundraising, we have now secured enough funds to be able to proceed in the spring so that the children will be swimming in a completely refurbished pool by the start of the summer. Thank you so much again to all who have made this possible for both this current group of children at the school and all those who will attend in the years ahead. The children cheered loudly when we said we had hit our target!

Our Night Sky in January 2025

Venus will be lighting up the evening sky until about 2030, followed closely by Saturn, while Jupiter continues to dominate the night, rising just before Orion and looking uncomfortably close to the horns of Taurus the Bull. He will not be setting until about 0430hrs, leaving Mars on its own in the night sky, and setting about 0800hrs just as the Sun rises in the East.



In my last article. I described Europa, one of the coldest environments in the

Solar System. This month, we look at the other extreme of heat exploration. On a mission to "touch the Sun." NASA's Parker Solar Probe became the first spacecraft to fly through the corona – the Sun's upper atmosphere – in 2021. With every orbit bringing it closer, the probe faces brutal heat and radiation to provide humanity with unprecedented observations, visiting the only star we can study up close.

NASA's Probe will revolutionize our understanding of the Sun. The spacecraft is gradually orbiting closer to the Sun's surface than any before it - well within the orbit of Mercury. Flying into the outermost part of the Sun's atmosphere for the first time. Parker will perform its unprecedented investigations. The Solar Probe and its instruments are protected from the

Sun by a 4.5-inch-thick (11.43 cm) carbon-composite shield, which can withstand temperatures reaching nearly 2,500 degrees Fahrenheit (1,377 Celsius).

The Probe is collecting measurements and images to expand our knowledge of the origin and evolution of solar wind, while it also makes critical contributions to forecasting changes in the space environment that affect life and technology on Earth.

During its mission: -

- Parker will fly more than seven times closer to the Sun than any spacecraft.
- Over seven years, the spacecraft will complete 24 orbits around the Sun.
- At its closest approach, the spacecraft will come within about 3.9 million miles (6.2 million kilometres) of the Sun.

I hope to bring you details of this heroic spacecraft in later issues

The Bride Valley Book Club

The Power by Naomi Alderman

This novel caused quite a stir when first published a few years ago. It is set in an alternative present and fits into the dystopian fiction genre - it has elements shared with more famous novels such as 1984 and Brave New World plus countless others, such as Atwood's The Handmaid's Tale, which follow in this tradition. This novel reverses the male v female dynamic when adolescent girls acquire an ability to channel a strong electrical current from their fingertips. This power can be used defensively or aggressively and it is passed on from teenagers to older women. As this phenomenon spreads globally, it results in civil unrest and in previously repressive (to women) parts of the world - full scale revolution occurs and women develop the upper hand politically and militarily. Alderman tells her story through a handful of key characters, all of them female except a young male photojournalist from Nigeria. Initially it seems that this enormous upheaval will be a force for positive social change but before long it becomes clear that this is a false hope. There was a mixed response from us as a group but it resulted in a lively discussion. Alderman was mentored by Margaret Atwood during her writing of The Power and we could detect her influence throughout.

National Coastwatch

National Coastwatch are pleased to report a very good year. During the organisation's 30th year the Anniversary Flag (see September issue for local details) was successfully delivered to Trinity House, London and received by HRH The Princess Royal, the organisation's royal patron, in September. The objective of raising the NCI profile nationally was achieved through the use of various forms of novel transport both old and new on land and at sea being reported on radio, television and in the press. Photographs of the Anniversary Flag passing through West Dorset can be found on Facebook by searching NCI Lyme Bay. Follow the page now to view future postings as they occur.

Locally, NCI Lyme Bay, situated at Hive Beach, has reported a much quieter year with 8 incidents recorded, as at the end of November, compared to 15 for 2023. Unfortunately, it has not been a good year for wildlife with 3 of the reports to HMCG involving dead dolphins being washed ashore in the area.

NCI Lyme Bay's satellite station at Charmouth similarly reported a quieter year with 12 incidents, down from 22 last year.

There are concerns, though, for visitors to the coast being ill prepared and not taking into account the conditions at sea, especially the wind direction. An offshore breeze can give the impression of a calm sea, but the further offshore you go not only can the sea become rougher but the wind can blow water users further away from the beach. A number of the incidents at Charmouth have involved paddleboarders, kayakers and wind surfers. Fortunately, on these occasions all persons have been returned safely to the shore.

The West Dorset Singers' next concert

dates from 1840 and opens with the resounding "Let everything that has breath praise the Lord!" Sure enough, the choir follows this instruction. Parry's 'Blest Pair of Sirens' was written a little later in 1889 by the composer of 'Jerusalem'. Recognised as "one of the outstanding English choral works", it's splendidly Victorian and featured in Kate and William's wedding in Westminster Abbey in 2011. The completely contrasting third piece, Poulenc's 'Gloria', dates from 1961. Poulenc was both devout Catholic and dedicatedly sinful party-animal. These didn't sit well together in the church's eyes and his music is similarly full of contrasts. He sincerely hoped his compositions might speed his final journey to heaven but worried that it might be to hell. As a part monk, part playboy, his music mixes deep spirituality with the sounds of jazzy dance hall bands. The choir, under its Musical Director Matt Kingston, is accompanied by a professional orchestra and soloists and the concert starts at 7pm. Bride Valley Gardening Club

What's in a name.....?

Although we won't be meeting together until March, I'm sure many members will be making the most of any decent weather to be out in their gardens, maybe lingering to admire an early snowdrop or even wondering about the name of something.



Do you know the names of the plants in your garden? If you do, or think you do, are they the names you learnt as a child – a local name probably or one handed down by friend or family? If you don't, where do you turn to find out? I remember the insignificant rectangle of garden from my own childhood. A narrow border on each side, grass between and a path down the middle: the narrow beds filled with blocks of just a few varieties and colourful only in summer. I picked up the names – rose, daisy, daffodil but not a lot more, reluctant to be too inquisitive in case there was work to be done!

It was only when we had our own overgrown patch that I discovered the diversity of plants about which I knew next to nothing. I don't know how it came to be in my possession but I became the proud owner of a book that was to become my plant 'bible'. 45 years later and on to my second well-thumbed copy of the Reader's Digest Encyclopaedia of Garden Plants and Flowers (still available, used) it is still my desert island winner. With it I set about identifying the humble assortment of plants discovered beneath the weeds. Looking at the pictures, trying to match them up opened a whole new fascinating world – mostly of Latin! Thousands of plants including ferns, mosses, lichens etc have been given Latin based names since in the 18th century the Swedish naturalist Carl Linnaeus pioneered a botanical naming system. So, self-taught and pronouncing many of them incorrectly I began to learn botanical names. I have never regretted learning the names this way rather than adopting the more frequently used common names which so easily lead to confusion.

As I've progressed, both in experience and in study it has stood me in good stead. A common response is often "Oh I can't be doing with all those fancy names" and people often think of it as showing off but it is the only way we can be sure we're talking about the same thing. In any country, from books to nurserymen the same botanical name identifies the same plant. For instance the Harebell is known in Scotland as the Bluebell (both names refer to Campanula rotundifolia) and some, such as Arum maculatum have as many as 90 common names recorded – how confusing that is.

So next time you identify a plant or examine a plant label, read the botanical name as well. Don't be put off, learn its proper name - and if you remember it, try it out on your friends!

West Dorset Beekeeping Association

For 132 years members of West Dorset Beekeeping Association have been meeting to share their craft. The charity draws its members from across West Dorset and provides free advice and support regarding all bee-related queries to members and the general public. In the spring and summer members of the association are regularly called on to collect swarms and identify bee colonies that appear in local gardens. It's surprising where they choose to settle ... air bricks, post boxes, nest boxes, compost bins and chimneys are all popular.

The association has its own teaching apiary in Netherbury. Student beekeepers help to look after the bees and the honey harvest is sold to raise funds to maintain the colonies and provide equipment. There are bee-suits available to loan and both full members and friends of the association are free to visit when the apiary is open. In fact everything is provided except for wellingtons and a pair of rubber gloves! A monthly E-newsletter keeps everyone informed regarding the club events.

A key part of the club is the promotion and sharing of knowledge. Good beekeepers never stop learning and the bees always have something new to share. If you are looking for a new hobby the WDBKA annual course for new beekeepers is a popular, cost effective route into beekeeping. The next course is due to start on 4th February 2025. Seven evening theory meetings at the Christian Fellowship Hall in Bridport are followed by three tutored sessions in the club apiary. Cilla's January Checklist – Sow slowest growing annuals (e.g., petunias, impatiens, begonias and salvias) in modules, place somewhere warm to germinate. Protect camellia flowers from frost with fleece. Sow chillies in a heated propagator. Sow early carrot varieties, leeks, onions & summer cauliflowers under cover. Continue to winter prune apples and pears. Begin chitting (encouraging to sprout) first-early seed potatoes by standing them upright in an egg box in a cool, light place, they'll be ready to plant out in about six weeks. Use cloches to warm the soil for early seed sowing. Continue to ensure that birds have food and water, especially in frozen conditions.

My dear Nephew Darren,

Since you were the one to ask this parishioner of yours to act as PCC secretary, you have no reason to complain about the minutes of meetings she produces. Since you are also the chairman, you naturally bow to their request.

Just in the way that church rotas bear no resemblance to the people who actually turn up to do the jobs, minutes of meetings need not bear too much resemblance to what actually happened, especially if what did happen is inconvenient for you.

After all, democracy is all very well - provided a benign dictator is in overall control.
