From the Rectory

Dear friends,

How are you feeling about the New Year?

I was running around 'St Mary's Parkrun' on Saturday in Bridport. It was hard work. It's always hard work. Each time I run it I feel like my heart is going to explode. It's a physical battle as well as a mental one. I always go off too fast, then hang in there until I might be able to produce a final sprint. It would not be hard work if I ran at a slower pace. It would be easier if the course had less twists and turns, uphills, and changes of direction. My average heart rate running the 3.1 miles (5km) was 171bpm. In the last four minutes I was running at 193bpm. 19 minutes 31 seconds of hard effort. It's an incentive to train better, to run faster, just so it can be over quicker. As I ran, I tried to distract myself from the desire to ease off and slow down. I counted down from 59 seconds, to make another minute go past. I thought about the 'ABC' of running: attitude, breathing, cadence. ATTITUDE: I told myself, "You've got this Andrew." BREATHING: I regulated my breathing, focusing on exhales. CADENCE: I checked my stride pattern to increase effectiveness and speed.

We're running into yet another New Year. We can't control that. But what's your 'ABC' for 2026? We can control that.

ATTITUDE: I don't know where you are in the race of life. I don't know whether you are on a course which involves twists and turns, up hills and changes of direction. But I'm wondering if you can say to yourself: "You've got this. Whatever the New Year brings you'll get through this. At some point, if there's pain, it will pass." From a psychological view point it's better to address yourself in the third person. "You can do this Andrew" rather than "I can do this." I get through marathons imagining my children cheering me on from the sidelines or waiting for me, jumping up and down at the finish line. In Christianity we talk about a 'great cloud of witnesses' (Hebrews 12:1), that is faithful ones from the past. You may feel on your own right now, but who can you hear as a voice of encouragement, maybe from your own past, letting you know "You've got this!"? In my years in the military when I was feeling at breaking point, I would remind myself of the apostle Paul's: "I can do all things through Christ who gives me strength." (Philippians 4:13). Later in life it became: "I can do all things though love which gives me strength."

Start with ATTITUDE. Ask the sun (Son) for inspiration, listen to the encouragement of the birds, hear the waves willing you on, give it to the everlasting arms of divine love and tell yourself: "Whatever 2026 brings, you've got this, you'll get through it, you're going to be ok."

BREATHING: I'm sure you know about breathing, but how much do you focus on the exhale, letting breath out, rather than gasping to get breath in? The exhale is crucial for activating the body's relaxation response, shifting from 'fight-or-flight' to 'rest-and-digest'. Hyper-ventilation is linked to anxiety and panic attacks. No fault of our own but a response to environment, Focusing on the exhale, and extending it, as if you are blowing out candles on a birthday cake, signals the brain through the vagal nerves, lowering heart rate, blood pressure, and muscle tension, while promoting deeper sleep and overall calmness. A full exhale empties the lungs and makes way for fresh oxygen. Practice your exhales: holding for four seconds, and you will be better at managing stress and improve your mental well-being in 2026. It's built into church tradition in the reading of the Psalms. 'Inhale scripture, exhale prayer' is more than that. There is a pause at the colon in our traditional prayer books; for rhythmic breathing through recitation which brings both physical and spiritual calm. Oh, and see all that ill-feeling. unforgiveness, resentment, bitterness or anything which makes your breathing shallow and your heart tense - breathe it out, pray it out, and let it go. Give it to the wind, to be carried on the clouds, and leave it there. It will return as tears, to water the earth, and bring new life.

CADENCE: It's a marathon not a sprint. You've likely heard that before, but are you living by it? Check your pacing, and your stride pattern. If right now it feels like you're going uphill, then shorten your stride and slow it right down. It's a long climb I know, but you will reach the top. At the top look back and see how far you've come; how much you have persevered, and overcome. Smile, relax, enjoy the view and then some downhill. Pacing can be particularly important with grief. Run your unique race. Go at your pace. The course might go round in circles, then uphill, downhill, back the way you've come. At some point you will get to a junction, and you'll be able to choose the best path, and feel more in control. Check ATTITUDE, check BREATHING, adjust your CADENCE to suit where you are right now. Keep going. You're going to be OK.

With my prayers for this New Year. You've got this,

Bride Valley & Chesil Help Our Planet (HOP)

There will be a meeting of Bride Valley & Chesil Help our Planet at 6.30pm on 29th January at St Mary's Church, Burton Bradstock. Would you like to 'Help Our Planet' through activities in and around your village? Do you have knowledge, skills and experience to share?

All are welcome to the meeting to consult our local community about how we can come together to take action to 'Help Our Planet' (HOP). This will include thinking about events, supporting our schools to run HOP clubs/activities and local action to support wildlife and our environment. HOP was founded by Burton Bradstock resident Professor Philip Howse OBE and others, influencing 'COP' discussions on climate change and the Amazon, and holding regular talks at Sladers Yard, West Bay.

Our Night Sky in January 2026

Saturn will_be setting in the West at about 2200, while Jupiter will be well up in the sky all night, as will Orion. A great time to be out with binoculars to see the nebula in his sword, hanging from his belt. You can also see Betelgeux and Rigel, the two brightest stars in the constellation, and Sirius, the



Dog star, following his master, and twinkling in the low atmosphere with all the colours of a sunlit diamond.

A potentially record-breaking ultramassive black hole in the Cosmic Horseshoe galaxy, and a "naked" black hole in the early universe that exists without a host galaxy. These finds are challenging existing models of how black holes and galaxies form and grow. Black holes form when a star larger than about 3 times bigger than our Sun, runs out of fuel which had prevented it from collapsing under its own gravity. If it does not collapse and rebound in a Supernova, it can collapse under its own gravity into a black hole from which not even light can escape.

You are earnestly advised not to go near one, otherwise your New Year would most definitely be spoilt

The Bride Valley Book Club Review "Prophet Song" by Paul Lynch

Prophet Song - a Booker prize winner from a few years ago - is a dystopian novel set in an imagined alternative present of the Irish Republic. After a democratic election an ultra-right-wing government is voted in and the Guardai form a military wing of state security secret police. The story follows one family - Eilish, a scientist, and her husband, Larry, a trades union official. Incrementally the state suspends the rule of law and human rights, people are arrested and then "disappear". The Judiciary and the Press are intimidated and opposition is suppressed. The country descends into a totalitarian state run by the paramilitary. Flags are flown to indicate allegiances, service is refused in local shops and employment contracts are torn up. Eilish and Larry have four children and the novel focuses on the family's plight after Larry fails to return from a demonstration and their eldest son joins the rebels. Eilish struggles to keep what remains of her family and home together. Civil war breaks out and Eilish, partially in denial, fails to grasp opportunities to leave her country - to get out while she still can. Many of history's war-torn scenarios are played out - arrest and detention without trial, state sanctioned torture and murder, street barricades and the building of walls, bombing and snipers - and ultimately traffickers who put families in boats exploiting their misery and desperation. We felt this was a very prescient but disturbing book - a heart-breaking read.



A Very Cornish Vet, Back Along By Quentin Blacke

Our pet ewe, Tosh, so called because she was given to us as an orphan lamb in a Toshiba carton on a winter's morning in 1972, was somewhat poorly. Financial constraints at the time precluded a vet's visit, so I did what many Cornish folk did then which was to take her to see Mr D, the next best thing – he'd sort her out!

Getting Tosh in to the back of the old Volvo estate, was no mean feat; big, woolly, smelly and reluctant were only part of the problem, (Tosh, not me), but we did it and toddled off to the remote, unmade, country lane where Mr D., MRCVS held court. As usual the queue of vehicles filled the lane, for this was a rather unique 'drive-in' vets, a one man surgery without any of the frills associated with a normal practice. No reception or waiting-room, no pharmacy, just an old shed and a rather ramshackle country cottage, which was strictly off limits to clients.

By the time a car attained the front of the queue, Mr D. had not only interviewed the occupant, but also treated him to a few minutes of banter and the 'joke of the day', for the vet, a tall, stooped gentleman in his late sixties was also an inveterate entertainer (no pun intended). A bit like an old-fashioned pub landlord with an endless supply of corny jokes.

Before each pet was examined, Mr D. had also repeated the performance with several cars up the line. That is why a visit would literally take hours, many seasoned clients taking sandwiches and a flask of coffee to survive the ordeal.

His patients were small animals, cats, dogs, rabbits, birds etc. who were examined insitu or taken in to the hut for a closer look.

Inevitably, out would come a syringe and a packet of pills for ongoing treatment, all of which looked suspiciously similar, but seemed to do the trick. Those needing surgery or more serious treatment, were carted off in to the cottage from which they sometimes 'escaped' into the surrounding countryside. As a result, there were often Lost Cat or Dog posters pinned to neighbouring trees or anxious owners calling out the names of their missing pooches or moggies.

His charges were quite random and ridiculously cheap, 'Call it a fiver,' he'd say for example, and that's why people travelled from all over Cornwall to see him, including breeders with whole litters needing vaccinations or neutering.

On this day, I watched, getting nearer and nearer, until he reached my car window. 'What's wrong with your dog?' he asked. 'She thinks she's a sheep,' I replied, and, as if on cue, Tosh let out a mighty baa! 'I don't do farm animals,' he said, taken aback. 'Then the joke's on ewe isn't it!' I laughed.

Parish Council – Next Meeting 7.00pm Tuesday 13th January 2026 – LATCH

At this meeting we will decide the amount of the Parish Precept for 2026/27. Inevitably decisions being made at national and local government level will affect funding for town and parish councils, i.e., us. The message being received indicates rural communities will suffer at the expense of metropolitan and urban regions. If we want something, that in the past has been provided by the state or unitary authority, it will need to come out of parish funds.

Yellow-legged Asian Hornet's nest found in Swyre

On 17th November 2025 this Yellowlegged Asian Hornet's (YLAH) secondary nest was found in Swyre and destroyed by the National Bee Unit. The YLAH is an invasive predator that poses a threat to both honeybees and other pollinators and thus, to the local ecology. YLAH queens will be hibernating now so your local bee group, the West Dorset Beekeepers' Association (WDBKA) will be running a





trapping and awareness raising campaign from February 2026 when the queens start to emerge. We will be encouraging as many local people as possible to set specially designed traps in gardens and fields throughout the parish. The more queens that are killed, the fewer nests we will have to deal with. Locating and destroying YLAH nests is both time consuming and requires specialist equipment and clothing. There will be more information about obtaining and setting traps in the February BVN and on local Facebook groups. In the meantime, the WDBKA website

www.westdorsetbees.org.uk and our Facebook group has up to date information.

In November 1978 John and Juniper Greener moved into Langebride House, Long Bredy. This move started Juniper's long term love affair with the house, garden, village and the Bride Valley. Juniper was also active within all the churches within the valley. She was also a founding member of the Healing Centre held at the Friends Meeting House, stalwart of the Dorset Health Trust and the patient energy behind the Dorset Children Centre and Joseph Weld Hospice (now known as Weldmar). John died in 1994 just months after the hospice opened; he was one of the 3 founders and chairman.

The garden at Langbride was always one of Juniper's loves, opening it to the public especially in early spring when the garden sung of anemones, croci and many other early spring jewels. Come Along Inn

Thank you to all who attended last November's opening. It was certainly very cold outside but a warm atmosphere inside the hall was created by your

presence. During the evening the six charities that would benefit from any surplus made through the year were announced with each receive a donation of £500:

- 1) Dorset and Somerset Air Ambulance who offer a rapid response emergency service to people of the two counties. Whilst we all hope we shall never require their services living in a rural situation, often isolated, it could be the difference between a satisfactory outcome or not.
- 2) ReadEasy. With 2.4 million adults in England unable or barely able to read, ReadEasy's vision is for all adults in the UK to have the literacy skills to fulfil their potential and live life to the full. Whilst they are a national organisation the donation will go to the local branch at Bridport.
- 3) National Coastwatch are manned solely by volunteers, they support the Coastguard, RNLI and land-based emergency services by reporting and monitoring incidents at sea and shore. They will also give safety advice to anyone interested.

Our donation will go to the local station at Burton Bradstock and Charmouth.

- 4) Bride Valley Car Service, this is a service for people living in the Bride Valley who are unable to drive to their medical appointments.
- 5) Dementia Friendly Exercise Class, this is a class that runs at the Bridport Leisure centre providing contact and exercise for people with dementia. It is run by Ruth Cullingford and two other ladies who have to raise funds to pay for the tutor and facility hire.
- 6) TwoLittleBirds, is a charity set up by the parents of two teenagers who took their own lives. The aim is to raise money to support children with mental health issues and avoid a similar outcome.

Making these donations will bring our total donations since the beginning of the Come Along Inn to just over £14,000.

When asked what he had most enjoyed about living and working in the valley, Phil replied that the peace and tranquillity, coupled with the friendliness of the community, and the wide variety of work has kept life constantly interesting. What he won't miss quite so much is many tins of the Buckingham Green paint that he has applied to village doorposts and window frames for generations! Ehiphany, 6th January – Where did the Wise Men come from?

On 6th January we celebrate Epiphany – the visit of the Wise Men to the baby Jesus. But who were these Wise Men? No one knows for sure. Matthew calls them 'Magi', and that was the name of an ancient caste of a priestly kind from Persia. It wasn't until the third century that they were called kings – by a church father, Tertullian.

Another church father, Origin, assumed there were three – to correspond with the gifts given. Later Christian interpretation came to understand gold as a symbol of wisdom and wealth, incense as a symbol of worship and sacrifice, and myrrh as a symbol of healing – and even embalming. Certainly, Jesus challenged and set aright the way in which the world handled all three of these things. Since the 8th century, the Magi have had the names Balthasar, Caspar and Melchior.

Magi from the East – it isn't a lot to go on. The Magi had originally been a religious caste among the Persians. Their devotion to astrology, divination and the interpretation of dreams led to an extension in the meaning of the word, and by the first century the Magi in Matthew's gospel could have been astrologers from outside of Persia. Some scholars believe they might have come from what was then Arabia Felix, or as we would say today, southern Arabia. It is true that in the first century astrology was practised there, and it was the region where the Queen of Sheba had lived. She of course had visited Solomon and would have heard the prophecies about how one day a Messiah would be born to the Israelites and become their king.

Matthew's gospel (chapter 2) is clear that the Magi asked Herod: 'Where is the One who has been born king of the Jews? We saw His star in the east and have come to worship Him.'

So, it is possible that in southern Arabia the Queen of Sheba's story of how a Messiah would one day be sent to the Israelites had survived. Certainly, there are a number of other early legends that connect southern Arabia with Solomon's Israel. To many people this makes sense: that the ancient stories of a Messiah, linked to later astrological study, prompted these alert and god-fearing men to the realisation that something very stupendous was happening in Israel.

They realised that after all these centuries, the King of the Jews, the Messiah, was about to be born. One more interesting thing that gives weight to the theory that the Magi came from southern Arabia is this: if you study any map of Palestine as it was during biblical times, you will find that the old Arabian caravan routes all entered Palestine 'from the East'.



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








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
