From the Rectory

Dear friends,

We are blessed to have owls in our community: 'older-wise-leaders'. An owl asked me if I would write something in the BVN about 'people who bear grudges.' It reminded me of the 'Candlemas' story and the declaration of a Biblical owl called Simeon who declared: "Now I am ready to die in peace". If we're bearing any grudges, or if we feel others are bearing grudges against us, we will not be living in peace, let alone dying in peace. Search online for: 'research bearing a grudge'. You will find that holding onto anger and resentment can affect our physical and mental health, for example contributing to anxiety and depression, headaches, insomnia, heart disease, stomach problems, high blood pressure and weakened immunity. This is

because bearing a grudge is to carry stress. Stress robs us of peace in our body, mind and spirit.

Of course, we can bear a grudge against people we think bear a grudge against us, but often the only person suffering is us. If we hold onto the emotional pain, we may feel justified and, in the right, but ultimately, we are the ones who continue to suffer. Somehow, we need to find a way to let go, to free ourselves from the chains of bearing a grudge. It can be a lifetime's work. If we don't feel we have had justice or acknowledgement of our hurt, we may not ever feel able to let go. Some people call this 'unforgiveness.' The opposite is 'forgiveness'. Search on the internet for: 'research forgiveness' and you will discover the psychological and physiological benefits of being able to let go of resentment, unforgiveness and rumination on past hurts and emotional pains. You will discover new life, and better health.

When I reflect on all this, I often wonder why more people don't come to church. Every Sunday we take time to confess our 'sins' that is our emotional wounds and pain and be open to the power of forgiveness for ourselves and others. We confess, not because we deserve condemnation, but because we deserve love. It has taken me decades to let go of the unforgiveness I have held against people who have hurt me in the past. The truth is that all these people probably don't give it a moment's thought, and the ones I have confronted in the past have claimed it never happened or even blamed me. Sometimes the person we need to forgive most is ourselves; empathising with ourselves, letting go of past guilt, shame and regrets.

Personally, I have found the opportunities to kneel in church, powerful opportunities to take steps on my journey to no longer have intrusions in my mind of bitterness and unforgiveness. I have offered my pain to the power of sacrificial divine love, received holy communion with that love, and then tried to take steps for more peace for myself and others. It's the journey towards Easter and resurrection new life. Anyone can join the journey at any time. Ash Wednesday is a good time to start. The end game is being able to say: "Now I am ready to die in peace."

BRIDE VALLEY CAR SERVICE


The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £2.00 per journey).

Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

I am delighted to share the report from our Ofsted inspection which took place on Tuesday 10th December 2024. The inspection process in schools is rigorous and wide reaching with a huge amount of work going on behind the scenes. I am incredibly proud of our school and really pleased that our report recognises the significant work that has happened over the past few years, especially on the curriculum and our school vision and values.

The outcome of the inspection was: Burton Bradstock Church of England Voluntary Controlled School has taken effective action to maintain the standards identified at the previous inspection.

Through discussions with children, parents and carers and staff the inspectors recognised the importance that we put on ensuring that the school is happy and welcoming for all pupils and the high expectations we have for children's behaviour. They said:

- 'Pupils are proud to attend this happy and welcoming school.
 Pastoral support and pupil well-being is high on the agenda. This
 means pupils feel listened to and well cared for.'
- Pupils are well mannered and courteous.

The strength of teaching and our curriculum were recognised:

- The school has created an ambitious and well-sequenced curriculum.
- The local area is integral to the curriculum.
- The school is a calm place to learn.

For children with SEND, the inspection team took into account responses from parents, observed children in lessons and spoke with leaders. The report states:

- The school is ambitious for each pupil.
- Pupils with SEND are well supported to successfully learn the curriculum.

Our ethos and vision also shone through:

- Pupils live out the school's vision statement, particularly of 'doing justice'.
- Pupils know how to support their own well-being

The exceptional practice in Early Years is also recognised. Inspectors said:

- In early years, staff encourage children to make predictions about how to make shapes and 'have a go'.
- Children from early years are highly inclusive of each other and show maturity.

In feedback to leaders, governors and trustees they also mentioned:

- The strength of our whole staff team
- How well modelling was used to support pupils
- That it was a 'joy' to be in EYFS!
- That the school had prioritised the 'core subjects' and this was helping children to develop their subject knowledge in these areas.
- The positive environment in all classes.



Our Night Sky in March 2025

Venus will be setting shortly after Sunset, but Jupiter and Mars will be setting much later, and both will be prominent in the southern sky for much of the night.

NASA's team operating the Parker Solar Probe have confirmed that it survived its scorching journey through the Sun's Corona, at 430,000 mph, having received a signal from its beacon transmitter that it is operating normally and able to transmit scientific details of its encounter.



The Bride Valley Book Club

We had varying degrees of knowledge about the American Civil War which forms the background to Karen Jov Fowler's book "Booth". Most of us enjoyed this novel woven around the true story of the Booth family. Booth Senior and three of his sons all worked as actors with varying degrees of success. However, readers begin this novel with the knowledge that in 1865 John Wilkes Booth will murder Abraham Lincoln in a New York Theatre just after the end of the civil war. There is a feeling of "the elephant in the room" as we follow the family's fluctuating fortunes and how John Wilkes Booth becomes an embittered supporter of the Confederacy -



obsessed with getting revenge for the Southern States' humiliating defeat.

The Booth family Initially settle on a remote Maryland farm. Ten children (six survived) are born in a bigamous marriage and Booth senior is notably absent for much of the year touring as a Shakespearean tragedian. No one in the family is really a farmer and they rely on help of ex-slaves to make the farm turn a meagre profit.

Fowler assimilates her own meticulous research with existing scholarly work on the family itself, the dreadful civil war and the issue of slavery over which many thousands of lives were lost. However, she fictionalises many gaps by imagining the thoughts and feelings of various family members. This novel has a complex canvas - it moves around various locations in America, crossing the isthmus before it becomes the Panama Canal and to London - all the while the undercurrent of tensions are described which erupt into civil war. John Wilkes Booth is the only member of the family to support the Confederate cause and he is presented as being manically unstable by Fowler. The assassination of Lincoln becomes a national tragedy for America and a personal enduring one for the Booth family.

At about the time this entry is read, we shall have said, or be saying, farewell – or au revoir we hope - to Anne Lambton, who departs No. 2 Yewtree Cottages for a new home in Corscombe, near Yeovil. She has divided her time between London and here for nearly eight years, but she and her diminutive canine companion(s) have been familiar sights when in the village, and she has been a supporter of a good number of Littlebredy events. We wish her well in her new home, and hope to continue seeing her from time to time.

Although nothing dramatic will mark the occasion, the end of March will witness what may well be the single most significant event in the life of Littlebredy for over 225 years. It will still remain one of the last virtually intact "estate villages" in Dorset, but about half the land area and most of the residential properties will pass out of the ownership of the Williams family, seven generations of whom have held the Bridehead Estate since 1797. It is not for this writer to comment on the overall quality of the stewardship during that time, but we must all hope for a continuity which will respect the sense of community here, whilst acknowledging that various changes are bound to come.

One small visible manifestation will be that at about the same time, signs will appear at the entrances to the Bridehead amenity grounds, giving advance notice that the permissive access to the lakeside and waterfall which many hundreds, if not thousands, of families have enjoyed "for quiet recreation" ever since Sir David Williams, Sir Philip's late father, opened the grounds to the public in about 1960 will shortly have to be withdrawn. Many people will be disappointed at this, but it is understandable that the new owners of Bridehead should expect vacant possession of what is after all part of their private garden when they assume ownership of the house and its surrounding lawns and grassland at the end of June. Final severance of the Williams family from the rest of the estate will not then follow until the autumn of 2026, by which time we hope that many friends and neighbours will have been made welcome at Philip and Catherine's new home in Martinstown, so not too far away.

Greenways, Shipton Gorge

In early February a small group of us planted up some hedging whips - including Hawthorn, Guelder Rose and Dogwood - along existing hedge lines in Smacombe Lane, to both thicken and provide diversity. Also some Wild Honeysuckle has been planted in strategic places where walkers will smell the flowers. Spotted in the wood, were Scarlet elf cups, Sarcoscypha coccinea, bright spots hidden in the woodpiles. Thousands of yellow Hazel catkins are ripening with the pollen being dispersed on the breeze,

foxes are barking and tawny owls have been seen. We will be doing some maintenance

work in the wood on Wednesday 5th March at 11.00am – midday. If you would like to come along and help, that would be wonderful. This is a members' only event but we can sign you up on the day and there is no charge to join.



Most of the trees in the Orchard have now been pruned, we just need to wait until early spring to see how they have fared over the winter. Meanwhile we can enjoy the primroses and daffodils in the borders and around the trees

No councillor receives any form of remuneration whilst serving.







Cilla's March Checklist - Lift & divide overgrown clumps of perennials & herbs. Prune bush/shrub roses, hardy fuchsias, buddleia & late-flowering clematis. Take stem cuttings from new growth on pelargoniums, salvias & fuchsias. Plant gladiolus corms & start dormant canna rhizomes into growth.

Start sunflowers in plugs, begonia tubers in pots/trays indoors. Sow short rows of beetroot, broad beans, carrots, lettuce, peas, spinach & radishes; plant onion sets, shallots & first early potatoes if conditions fair. Sow hardy annual seeds. Protect vulnerable plants with fleece/cloche if cold weather forecasted.

On the perils of parking near church



The Rectory, St James the Least.

My dear Nephew Darren

I cannot be wholly sympathetic because your church car park is now inadequate, only having space for 100 cars. Your solution of advising members of the congregation to park in the adjoining supermarket car park may not have been wise. The maximum time people can stop there is 90 minutes, and as your services often reach that length, returning to find their cars clamped may not make you universally popular – although it may give your congregation the opportunity of practising Christian forgiveness.

Since the medieval architect who built St James the Least of All was not overly concerned with car parking, the only space we have is along the road by the church. Inevitably, it gets blocked, which causes us all immense satisfaction when those not attending church but intending to have a morning shopping, find themselves unable to get out of the village until Mattins is over.

While he rarely attends church on Sundays, he is always there the week before - I suspect praying for heavy rain, so he can make a fortune charging to tow out with his tractor those who have got stuck. Perhaps the greatest act of witness your church could perform would be to get everyone attending church to park on the ring road, bringing the entire town to a halt until your Sunday morning Service is over.


