From the Rectory

Dear friends.

How are we going to win the Nobel Peace Prize? It's a serious question. What are we doing individually and collectively to make peace, prevent more violence, conflict, wars, trauma, injury, loss of life. Even if we think the Nobel Peace Prize is beyond us, are we working towards any kind of peace prize in our own lives, our families and our communities?

Every Remembrance Sunday many of us say: 'We will remember them'. An increasingly small number will have had any direct relationship with the names read out on the 'Roll of Honour'. So, what and who are we remembering? If we are old enough to remember the terrible pain and trauma of loss, then we could or should be doing everything we can to ensure that no one else suffers the same pain and loss. If we are old enough to remember the impact on families and communities of sons and daughters, husbands and wives, fathers and sons not coming home from war, then we could or should be doing everything we can to prevent others suffering in the same way.

'Never again' was the cry after an estimated 40 million people were killed in World War 1. 'Never again' was the cry after the Holocaust of World War 2. 'Never again' was the inscription on graves in Kigali that I visited after the genocide in Rwanda. I reflected recently that if I had not survived a direct mortar attack on 29th January 1992, or a bomb attack on 1st May 1992 in Northern Ireland; or been killed on 'Sniper Alley' in Sarajevo in 1995; or killed in anti-piracy operations in the Gulf of Aden in 2008; or killed by a hidden IED (improvised explosive device) on patrol in Sangin, Afghanistan, in 2010, I would not want my family to stand for two minutes in silence to remember me.

First, they would never be able to forget anyway. Every day they would be remembering me. I am never able to forget my British Army and Royal Marine colleagues who are now dead. Secondly, I would not want them to be silent. I would hope that my children would speak out, and use my death as a motivation to action, to find and build peace for themselves, humanity and creation. Two minutes of prayer for peace each day? Two minutes to make peace with or for someone each day? Two minutes each day to reflect on

what is robbing them of peace and accept forgiveness and healing love? Two minutes on the journey to transform hurt into hope. After his death Jesus said 'Peace be with you' to his traumatised disciples and gave them the gift of forgiveness. It's never too late to start working towards the Nobel Peace Prize, starting with us.

All the donations will be shared between the BVN and this year's charity which is **Heart Response**, based in Puncknowle, which is a registered UK Christian charity that primarily supports the ministries of the Good Samaritan Church, Ocna Mures, Romania. The Romanian church was birthed in 1990 following the overthrow of the socialistic/communist party of the time. It was evident that there was a tremendous need among the poorest of the gypsy people and something needed to be done to help them. Various ministries were therefore established, some of these ministries included an orphanage, gypsy children feeding programmes and elderly support work.

Heart Response regularly sends money for different projects in Romania. Over the past year it has been able to fund a day trip to the zoo for over 40 very poor gypsy children, it's sent money for a medication fund, which was used primarily by the elderly who struggle to pay for their prescriptions, and it also approved a grant request for two mission teachers' salaries, these ladies work in the gypsy children feeding programmes and work with up to 500 children on a weekly basis, many of which do not attend school.

The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £2.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

National Trust run Climate Change workshops for Burton Bradstock school children

Workshops designed to deliver information about climate change to young people in a positive and empowering way have taken place at Hive Beach and Burton Bradstock School this term. These workshops are amongst the first of their kind for the National Trust and the charity is grateful to the children who took part in the sessions for their enthusiasm.

The National Trust, in partnership with Oops Wow Messy Art and Thriving Wild, worked with children in their final years at Burton Bradstock Primary School, which is close to Hive Beach - a place which is seeing the effects of climate change. The children are taking part in four sessions designed to empower them to look at climate change solutions using storytelling, creative activities and group discussions.

During the recent beach session, the children used materials found in the landscape, such a chalk, clay and charcoal to create their own paint to decorate homemade semaphore flags. They then sent messages which focused on being thankful for positive environmental changes we make



to our lives today. In the last workshop a domino rally was created which demonstrated how small changes, made by ourselves now, can have big impacts. We broke the children into 5 groups:

Group 1 each made a small domino (made from cereal boxes) and they drew illustrations onto the box representing what change they could make to help the climate (eg cycle more, plant more trees)

Group 2 had one bigger box which represented the community (this showed that individual changes we make can positively impact our community and help our local area).

Group 3 had an even bigger box which represented government. They drew pictures and messages on this for our politicians, the idea being that communities can influence politics.

Group 4 had an even bigger box which represented BIG companies and this



had illustrations to show how government needs to put pressure on big companies to encourage them to make positive changes for our world.

Group 5 was the EARTH (and their box was the BIGGEST), this box was full of illustrations of animals and represented a better place once big companies have made positive

environmental changes which will help the earth be a better place. We then knocked the small domino so it set off the rally, making a wonderful visual representation of how one small change can create a brilliant and positive chain reaction. The sessions were creative and fun and enjoyed by everyone.

Liz Flight, from the National Trust said

"We believe there is an opportunity to engage children in the issues of climate change in a positive and empowering way. Climate change can be a scary subject, but if dealt with correctly we can find ways to ensure everyone knows that even small changes will make a positive impact." And



Adam Gough, Head Teacher at Burton Bradstock School said: "Living by the coast, the children are rightly concerned about a changing climate and the effect it is having on our local community. They have witnessed an increase in cliff falls, high tides and flooding in our local area. By engaging with the children in a fun but informative way, we have been able to develop a message of hope for the future if we all do our bit."

The children have been incredibly busy and the autumn term was packed with harvest festival celebrations, apple juicing, cross-country races, 11+ exams, cooking lessons,

class trips and open days. At our Harvest Assembly, Litton, Chesil and Bredy classes treated us to some wonderful songs and poems which they performed to a packed hall of children and parents. The older class of Eggardon then shared their research into food banks and the growing need for all to support their crucial work and several parents took part in our 'Bake Off' Bread challenge - in which they kneaded and fashioned superb loaves in a record time! Thank you to all staff and parents who supported our food bank collection on the day - this wonderful contribution will make a difference to those in need in the coming months.

The children also took part in our annual apple juicing day in which the children picked apples from our Forest School area - mashed them into a 'pomace' using our scratter (or 'mangler-wangler' as the children call it) - and then pressed the pulp in our cider press to create delicious apple juice for all to try! It is lovely to see the children experience this process from start to finish and appreciate just how much hard work is required to produce one cup of apple juice. We were also delighted that each class has been cooking so much during the harvest week with crumbles, pies and tarts being made by each class during the week. Thanks to our new oven - the smell of baking filled the school each day.

Our preparations for all of these activities were momentarily halted at the start of the month by a phone call from the Office for Standards in Education - letting the school know that they would be inspecting us on the following two days. Although anticipated, many thanks still to all our staff, governors, children and families for doing so much to get over to the inspectors what Thorner's is all about at such short notice. A copy of their report will be out in due course and placed on the school website.

In important news, new pupils have been elected House Captains for the year and a slew of trips have taken place ranging from watching War Horse at the Southampton Mayflower Theatre, trips to Bridport Library and Museum, a tour of the Bovington Tank Museum as well as a visit from the National Landscapes Team in our wildlife area and a well-deserved end of term themed disco organised by our brilliant TSA (Thorner's School Association Parent Group). One of these new House Captains, Jesse Boughton-White, led the school team brilliantly at the annual Colmer's Hill X-

Country race finishing third in the boys' race. Well done to all the runners who managed to get round the typically muddy course! We also wish good luck to those of our pupils awaiting their 11+ results this week and congratulate all those children who have received their summer 'Reading Challenge' certificates this month - it is lovely to celebrate books in this way and all credit to those who completed the challenge across the holidays.

Lastly, although we almost feel guilty about mentioning it so early, we look forward to starting auditions and rehearsals for the children's nativity and whole school Christmas production in the next few weeks. We also think ahead to our Christmas church service as well as our now regular series of assemblies with Rev'd Andrew - as we approach Advent. We are trying something different for this year's production, rather than the traditional Christmas plays (Dickens et al.) and the children can't wait for the music to start as well as the important jobs of set and costume design to whirr into action as we head into December!

The Bride Valley Book Club

The Exhibitionist by Charlotte Mendelssohn

The exhibitionist in this novel is ageing and fading artist, larger than life personality, Ray Hanrahan. Ray has delegated to his eldest daughter, Leah, the organisation of a oneman exhibition of his work, his first showing in many years. The novel explores his family and the diverse ways in which he dominates them into a state of paralysis. Anchoring them in North London is the family home, a large but decaying Victorian villa. Quite early on it is clear the novel is hurtling head on for this "show" to be a humiliating car crash tents Ray's much younger (and much more



talented) wife, Lucia, is also an artist who subjugates her growing success to the needs of her overly opinionated husband who is given to temper tantrums and now reliant on prescription painkillers. It seems that as Lucia is increasingly sought after for prestigious art commissions (which she tries to ignore) - Ray's star is declining and the Art "establishment" has long ceased to take him seriously. Leah is overly devoted to her father and they delude themselves that this show" will kickstart his career. Their younger daughter, Jess, has escaped her dysfunctional family to a teaching job in Edinburgh. However, she is in danger of being drawn back into the family by her boyfriend who has fallen under Ray's influence. Lucia's son, Patrick, is also part of this toxic family. He suffers from extreme anxiety and struggles to assert himself against Ray's wishes. None of the characters are honest with each other and they are all caught in stormy cross currents as the novel gallops towards the debacle of the private view.

This novel did divide us - incomplete segments of dialogue and exaggeration were amongst the complaints. However, some of us enjoyed the black humour which tipped over into pathos. Those of us familiar with this part of North London enjoyed the local references and a few of us had even met paler versions of Ray in our past lives. At least one of us wanted to visit the Hanrahan house and give it a thorough tidy!

Cilla's November Checklist - Divide congested hardy perennials such as asters and chrysanthemums. Lift & divide gladioli, store corms to plant out in spring. Insulate vulnerable perennials with thick layer of mulch/garden compost. Sow sweet peas individually into deep pots. Plant tulips in borders & containers. Pot up lilies for next year. Bring prepared bulbs such as hyacinths into a well-lit area for flowers at Christmas. Sow broad beans & peas under cloches. Protect tender herbs by bringing indoors/covering with fleece or cloches to keep them cropping. Finish planting garlic cloves outside. Before lighting bonfires check they are clear of sheltering wildlife; clean out bird boxes; regularly clean bird feeders and bird baths.

Carved in sonorous Latin around the inside of the dome in St. Paul's Cathedral is the epitaph of its designer Sir Christopher Wren: "Si Monumentum Requiris Circumspice" ("If you seek his memorial, look around you"). Now that Charlie McCormick has left the village, much the same could be said of the quite exceptional Harvest Thanksgiving decorations in the Church on 22nd September. Yes, of course there was teamwork involved, but all concerned would concede that Charlie's, as usual, was the pre-eminent contribution, and his displays of flowers and vegetables feature in many photographs. As said in the last edition, his and Ben's time in the village will not easily be forgotten.

They typically marked their final evening here with a blog (and yet more photographs) extolling the wonderful sunset. Within a few hours that had

been exceeded by a rare sighting this far south of the aurora borealis (more Latin!), i.e. the northern lights. Several villagers took fine photographs, but the ones forwarded from 300 miles further north by Carol & Rod McCaskill, formerly of Foxholes Farm Cottage, not surprisingly showed the lights to even better effect in the Lake District.

There was another sad "si monumentum" moment in October, with the death in Somerset of Judy Yates at the age of 80. The current fine condition of the walled garden area here is partly due to her. It had been derelict for years when she and her husband Chris first began to tackle it in the late 1980s, and they later retired from separate banking jobs in Dorchester and moved to Gardens Cottage to be closer to the project, eventually opening it to the public as "The Scented Garden", by which time it contained part of the national lavender collection. They left the village in 2008 with the garden transformed, and Liz Eaton and her team of volunteers would admit that much of the groundwork had been done when they took it over and continued its renaissance and popularity. Judy remained an indefatigable gardener almost to the end, and we send all sympathy to Chris in his loss.

The death of Syd Brown, formerly of Orchard Cottage and then 2 River View was recorded a few editions ago, and if anyone noticed a small gathering in the Churchyard at the end of October, it was his ashes being buried with those of his parents and his late wife Janet.

As usual, Remembrance Sunday falls on the second Sunday in November (the 10th) with the service commencing at 10.45am.

We plan to carry out a litter pick during November once the vegetation has died down, and before winter really sets in. Please stand by to help. Premier Crew members will be contacted by email and information on when and where will be placed on FB.

Dog Owners - Neospora Caninum is an invariably fatal disease – Your Part in its Eradication

Failing to pick up after your dog, allowing it to wander unchecked in fields with livestock, and failing to have it regularly checked out for worms and other infections, probably means <u>you</u> (not your dog) could be responsible for a farm animal having to be put down due to being infected with Neospora Caninum, caused by ingestion of dog poo. Your dog can also be infected with possible dire consequences.

How to avoid this happening? Pick up, bag it and bin it, plus regular vet checks.

The Parish Council together with other local councils and administrations, and in conjunction with local farmers, will be campaigning in an effort to get the message out there, and putting in place further measures to assist local residents in disposing of their pick-ups. You are reminded – bagged up dog poo can be placed in your household rubbish – the preferred scenario for one and all. Please do so.

<u>The Law</u> - Anyone who fails to clear up after their dog can be issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice of up to £100. If the case goes to court this could cost the owner or person in charge of the animal up to £1,000.

The law states that being unaware a dog has fouled or not having a suitable bag is not a reasonable excuse.

The Rev Dr Gary Bowness continues his tongue-in-cheek letters from Uncle Eustace



My dear Nephew Darren,

I suppose it had to come, but combining parishes is now firmly on the agenda for our villages. I had always wondered what the first Earl of Stowe was trying to prove, building a church here in 1347 to accommodate 800 people when the total population has never exceeded 250. In the short term - which in this village is measured in centuries - it seems to have been to house the tombs of his 13 successors. I now realise it was to make uniting with adjoining parishes in the $21^{\rm st}$ century more difficult. Clearly the first Earl had formidable foresight. None of our neighbouring churches seem too keen to share their reserves to help maintain our cathedral-sized building.

The threat of the closure of St Herve the Bard has, inevitably, caused outrage - not so much from its regular congregation of three, but from all those in the village who would never think of attending. People do so *like* to have a church not to go to.

The church of St Bregowine, built by a wealthy parishioner in the 19th century because she did not like the high church practices of

the parish church of St Iwig, is refusing to re-unite, even though the two churches stand only 100 yards apart, in a village with a diameter of 300 yards. If only they could get over the trauma of seeing the incumbent putting water in the wine on Easter Day in 1894. (Although it must be conceded that the Bregowinians were equally affronted that when the daughter church opened in 1895, they found that the Iwigers had provided no brass troughs at the end of the pews for umbrellas. That they have subsequently refused to install them has only compounded the offence.)

Meanwhile St Plegmund is in discussions with the Church of South India as a way of avoiding uniting with anyone. Should it happen, I will be interested to see what travelling expenses the new incumbent claims. It will be difficult to tell when the present incumbent resigns, as he has not been seen at a clerical meeting for the last 30 years. Some of my colleagues suspect he is mythical, that a bloodless coup took place in the 1980s and that the church is now entirely run by the Mothers' Union.

The church of St Maximus of Constantinople in our nearest town has rather grandly offered to take all of our churches under its wing, but as a parishioner has pointed out: how could we possibly consider joining with a parish that fought on the other side at the Battle of Bosworth in 1485.

In the meantime, we will serenely carry on, as we seem to have done for the past six centuries; parish mergers and reductions in numbers of clergy seem to be of less interest than debating the suggestion that we change the brand of coffee served after Services.

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
