

From the Rectory

Dear friends,

What harvest are you reaping this year? Here at the rectory, we've had rhubarb, blackberries, elderberries, mulberries, apples, plums, mint and crab apples. We also have an abundance of tasty nettles. I tried eating raw nettle leaves as a 'superfood'. I've not crunched any crab apples, but look forward to the figs. This month we are celebrating Harvest in our churches: giving thanks for the plentiful food available to us, for farmers and all who provide it; remembering in our prayers those who are struggling to get food and any struggling to run the farms that too often we take for granted. We will also be gathering food to give to local food banks. Please do come along and help make a difference.

We are fortunate at the rectory that our harvest from the garden has not taken any work on our part – it is all a wonderful free gift of creation and those who have tilled the soil before us. However, I am challenged to reflect personally on the seeds I am sowing in my own life, in my family life and in the lives of those I meet. Am I through my words and actions sowing seeds of kindness, acceptance and hope? Am I rooting out any harmful weeds of unforgiveness and selfishness? If not, why not? What holds me back from being generous and gracious giving freely to others?

We've been reflecting on this in our church Bible readings recently. Jesus challenges the religious leaders and the 'haves' to spend less time pointing the finger, criticising, judging, plotting, keeping up self-righteous appearances, and more time changing inwardly to reflect God's heart of compassion towards the 'have-nots'. We have sung: 'Freely, freely you have received, freely, freely give.' As a result, I've been reminding myself of the need to be intentionally grateful; to acknowledge all the free gifts of goodness around me in the beauty of creation and daily accept the free gift of divine forgiveness. From a place of humility and gratefulness, I can then sow seeds of generosity in what I say and do to contribute to a harvest of love for others, as well as for myself. What about your harvest?

In the August BVN it was noted that the Benefice was looking at the ways into church! We hope our entrances were welcoming and we welcomed you all in to have a look at our churches and to take a photograph of a church door.

Sue Lang took the photograph used for the front cover of this BVN, and notes that the door is 17th century. It bears the nail studs RN, which refers to Sir Robert Napier. The Napier family were, for several generations, owners of the manor in Puncknowle, which the church served. They were responsible for some reconstruction of the original 12th century church in the 17th century. The 17th century lock is still in use!

The donations will be shared between the BVN and this year's charity which is **Heart Response**, based in Puncknowle, a registered UK Christian charity

that primarily supports the ministries of the Good Samaritan Church, Ocna Mures, Romania. The Romanian church was birthed in 1990 following the overthrow of the socialistic/communist party of the time. It was evident that there was a tremendous need among the poorest of the gypsy people and something needed to be done to help them. Various ministries were therefore established, some of these ministries included an orphanage, gypsy children feeding programmes and elderly support work.

Heart Response regularly sends money for different projects in Romania. Over the past year it has been able to fund a day trip to the zoo for over 40 very poor gypsy children, it's sent money for a medication fund, which was used primarily by the elderly who struggle to pay for their prescriptions, and it also approved a grant request for two mission teachers' salaries, these ladies work in the gypsy children feeding programmes and work with up to 500 children on a weekly basis, many of which do not attend school.

BRIDE VALLEY CAR SERVICE

The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £2.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment. We are inspired by this verse from the bible and how it shapes all we do. We all believe that fairness, kindness and

being humble are the key to flourishing for all. The links between this and our school values of Happiness, Friendship, Hope, Love, Courage, and Respect are clear.

I write this at the end of the first full week and the school is now back into full swing. It has been a joy to see the children after their holidays and to welcome our new families. We still have 4 classes at Burton; EYFS including preschool (The Nest), KS1 (Robins), Lower KS2 (Kingfishers) and Upper KS2 (Owls). Across the whole school we now have 95 children.

Since starting back, we have been extremely busy across the school with all classes starting their new topics and learning and going out of school either for welly walks, visits to the leisure centre, forest school or to the library. Spending time in our local community is such an important part of our curriculum and the children thoroughly enjoy getting out and about!

Owl class has been taking part in a project with Thriving Wild, Oops Wow Messy Art and the National Trust team at Hive Beach, looking at the impact of climate change on our coastline. For their first session they looked at 'chain reactions' and created their own Rube Goldberg machines which showed how our need for new 'things' impacts on our climate.



Robins Class enjoyed having a go at orienteering in our local park and playing field this week. The children worked in teams to find each checkpoint by reading a map. At each checkpoint they collected a sound. Then they looked at the sounds and worked out what they spelt.



Kingfisher Class painted self-portraits using water colours inspired by Quentin Blake. They are now on display in the hallway for the whole school to enjoy.

The Nest had a wonderful first welly walk of the year revisiting old friends including 'the fossil house', 'the tree with eyes'.



I look forward to writing again next month and updating you on our first church service of the year and our vision for spirituality across the school.

The sun has shone and all the children have returned to school full of energy ready for this new term! It has been

wonderful to see all the little ones in particular come in to school so confidently. Our Reception class has 18 new children in it this year and we are thrilled to see them settle so well and enjoy all the activities and new experiences that starting school brings with it. Thank you to all our Reception class staff and all parents for making this start of term such a happy and positive experience for the children.

Both the little ones and the older classes have hit the ground running with archery lessons, football coaching, guitar, drum and keyboard lessons as well as a creative writing workshop with Bridport company 'The Bank of Dreams and Nightmares'. The staff are busy running "after school" clubs from Messy Church to Jewellery Making and from Football to Art Club. Our Choir has also started up again and we hope to add Netball and Tag Rugby to our list of clubs shortly too.

As you will have seen, the newly installed solar panels are up on LATCH, and we are delighted to see them working in this new term. Again, a huge thanks to all who were involved in gathering support, writing letters, making applications for funds and those Governors and Villagers who ensured the installation went so smoothly in the holidays. They really are fantastic and a brilliant example of what can be done with everyone working together. On a similar note, after some upgrades to our boards in school, we are awaiting the installation of our EV Charger in the front car park in the coming months as well. More details to follow on this shortly from Mr White and the Eco-Committee. We hope to be able to extend use of this fast charger to local residents when school is shut - more details to follow in due course.

Sadly, over the summer it has become very clear that our swimming pool is in need of repair. Now drained, it will need some repair to the floor, a new liner and some other smaller maintenance work. The TSA and school have been saving over the last few years for this eventuality and we are in discussion with other local groups to raise the remaining funds required. We will likely need to raise a final slice of the overall cost from some fundraising activities and we will be advertising these in the new year. Our local pool company, Cresta Leisure, have been out on site with me over the summer and they have kindly agreed a works timetable to ensure the children will be swimming again in summer '25 as usual! We are glad to hear that our leavers from last year have settled in well into their new schools and we wish them all the best as they start Year 7. This year we have 101 pupils and it is the first time we have been over 100 for 20 years which is lovely to see. We hope all those who have started with us this year enjoy being part of Thorner's and can now begin to add their own chapter to this 335 year-old story. It is a real thrill to know that a school that was founded in 1690 can still 'hit a century' in 2024!

A Message from Dorset Council: Check if you are eligible for Pension Credit

The Winter Fuel Payment is an annual payment to help you with heating costs during the colder months. The Government announced in July 2024 that, from this year onwards, to be eligible you must have reached State Pension



age and also receive a qualifying means-tested benefit e.g., pension credit, universal credit or income support.

The last possible date to make a successful backdated claim to receive the Winter Fuel Payment is 21st December. Applications for Pension Credit can be made on the <u>How to Claim</u> page on GOV.UK or over the phone by calling 0800 99 1234 (Monday to Friday 8.00am to 6.00pm). There is also a <u>Pension Credit toolkit</u> to help spread the campaign message to your audiences.

Our Night Sky in October 2024

Saturn rises in the east about 19.00hrs, just after Sunset, followed by Jupiter at 21.00hrs Both will be visible during the night, with Jupiter being by far the brightest object in the night sky. You might just catch Venus before she sets shortly after the Sun.



I talked about Gravitational waves in the last issue, and this present information about how some are caused, is further explanation how SOME

waves are caused; however, there are countless millions of galaxies containing too many stars to imagine, and all of these will contain supernova stars which themselves produce waves. In fact, scientists reckon that our Universe is full of ripples of waves, continually passing through us, formed by such explosive events from the very beginning of time. The following is an explanation of how some waves are formed.

Two black holes orbit around each other and generate space-time ripples called gravitational waves. As the black holes get closer, the waves increase in frequency. Within a rotation, the black holes merge completely. One lower-frequency wave, ripples out after the merger.

Perhaps they will give you a gentle night's sleep as they gently nudge you up and down!


Bridport & District U3A Invites You to Come Sing with Us!

Bride Valley Garden Club - Wildflower Wonders

If you've been to several of this year's talks, chances are you may have heard Julian Sutton (Desirable Plants, Totnes) in April when he was tolerant enough to sit through our AGM and then go on to entertain us with his talk



'Twelve Shrubs'. More recently you may have heard that he's coming back again – much sooner than anticipated!

Earlier this summer I received the sad news that our October speaker Bob Gibbons was very unwell, so much so that he advised me to have someone else on standby in case he couldn't make it. Knowing Julian sufficiently well to share this with him I asked if he might be this person and he generously agreed although we both hoped it wouldn't be necessary. Regrettably I've had to call in this favour and Julian will again be our speaker, this time at our next meeting on Monday 21st October.

Bob was an exceptional man in many ways; as an internationally renowned photographer, author and wildflower expert around the world. He would have introduced us to some of the wildflower wonders of the world – he wrote a beautiful book with this title – and I suspect he would have focused on the stunning floral displays of the NW United States. I was lucky enough to go on one of Bob's small wildflower tours which included Oregon State and Julian also shares a love of this part of the world and the amazing flora it offers. It seems fitting that his talk will be 'Oregon Matters', based on the wonderfully diverse flora of the American State he knows best and why plants from this part of the world are so important to gardeners.

Bride Valley Book Group Review

Companion Piece - Ali Smith.

We were uncertain what to make of Ali Smith's "Companion Piece". Several of us enjoyed it but found the overall structure and narrative a challenge. Ali Smith is an acquired taste and her style is very distinctive. We did wonder whether this was a "companion piece" for her recent seasonal quartet, certainly some of the same issues crop up in this (much slimmer) novel. We

reflected on the various set pieces in the novel but felt that these did not always join together to form a whole, and some of us found this very frustrating. There is a contemporary story, linked by the (fictional) intricate wrought iron Boothby Lock, to a Middle Ages story about a female blacksmith and her exclusion from society. This narrative is also linked by two plagues, one historical and one (Covid) contemporary. The portraval of the later stages of Covid lockdown were immediately recognisable; being unable to visit close family in hospital and having to rely on a nurse's phone bulletins - and the fear and nervousness experienced when confronted by anti-vaxers and people who cheerfully refuse to don a mask. Ali Smith often tries to put her finger on aspects of current social malaise and early in the novel we hear about a character stopped at border control and detained without their passport and phone in a windowless room - a kind of post-Brexit feverish nightmare. We did not all agree on what we found humorous but I laughed at the pushy twins who invaded the narrator's home speaking in preferred gender pronouns and social media acronyms. Some of us enjoyed the recurrent word play and sections of fine writing in the novel. We had a lively discussion about what Ali Smith was trying to achieve but, overall, we found it a novel of parts - which ultimately did not cohere into a whole. Perhaps this was Smith's whole point - puzzles do not always have one clear undisputed solution.

Cilla's October Checklist - Cut back herbaceous perennials, leave seed heads for the birds this winter. Divide fibrous-rooted perennials to increase stock. Clear Alpines of fallen leaves & protected from wet with open ended cloche/recycled plastic container. Sow sweet peas in greenhouse or frame. Plant cyclamen/spring bulbs (except tulips - wait until November or early December). Tender perennials, e.g., fuchsias & pelargoniums, can be potted up & protected over winter. Lift & store tender summer bulbs & tubers. Clean greenhouses. Plant garlic & sow hardy broad beans & peas under cloches. Add organic mulches of well-rotted manure & compost to any cleared areas. Sow green manure on bare vegetable beds to deter weeds. Bring pots of herbs under cover to maintain crops during the autumn.

Road Safety

Dorset Council has rejected the application by Burton Bradstock Parish Council for a new pedestrian crossing on the B3157 near the public toilets. Dorset Council has withheld the details of the survey it carried out when making the decision to reject the application. It has offered a meeting with the Parish Council to discuss alternative means of improving the safety of pedestrians when crossing the coast road.

Dorset Council has also rejected the Parish Council's application for speed indicator signs on the B3157 at the eastern and western entrances to the village. The results of speed surveys paid for by the Parish Council showed that less than 15 per cent of vehicles were travelling at 35 mph or more within the 30 mph zone, and less than 15 per cent of vehicles were travelling at 46 mph or more in the 40 mph zone, which are the thresholds Dorset Council has set for qualifying for speed indicator signs.
