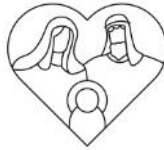
We are very busy once again and we are pleased that more of our drivers are happy to return. It is a wonderful service for the Bride Valley and we are extremely grateful to our volunteers.

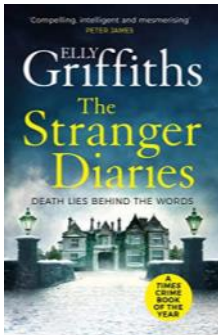

THE BRIDE VALLEY BOOK CLUB



This month's book was *The Stranger Diaries* by Elly Griffiths - a suitably Gothic whodunnit with supernatural elements for this time of year.

Clare Cassidy teaches English at a school in West Sussex. She is hoping to write a biography of RM Holland, a Victorian writer of Gothic tales who used to live in the school.

When a colleague is found murdered with a quote from Holland's most famous story *The Stranger* by the body and Clare finds someone has written in her personal diary, she realises the event has direct links to her.

At first the police view Clare as a suspect but as the violence mounts, her position becomes much more precarious. The story is told by three narrators, Clare, her teenage daughter and the police officer leading the murder investigation.

Most of the group found this a compelling page turner and a good choice for Halloween.

We enjoyed the intercutting of *The Stranger* (a macabre story in the style of MR James) with the present day events. The novel's pacing was good until the end, which some of us found rather rushed and unsatisfactory.

Despite some misgivings among the sceptics, the majority of the group found it enjoyable and are possibly up for reading some more Elly Griffiths.

Bride Valley Gardening Club



We did it! We managed to have our Gardening Club meeting on 18th October in LATCH. This was our first evening meeting since we closed our sessions for the winter 2 years ago. Chris Lovell gave us an enthusiastic talk about species bulbs, with a whistle-stop tour of the Mediterranean showing us the bulbs growing in their natural habitat.

That was our first and last meeting for 2021, details of the new Gardening Club calendar of events, starting on March 21st 2022, will be published in the BVN next year.

Jobs to do during December and January

Deadhead winter flowering pansies to prolong flowering; mulch around hellebores with bark chips to help keep leaves clean. Finish clearing beds and cover bare soil with a layer of well-rotted compost or manure. Clear leaves away from woody stems and perennials to prevent a build-up of moisture.

Clean pots, trays and plant supports with mild disinfectant; clean, oil and sharpen tools. Keep checking stored fruit and vegetables for signs of decay.

In January sow chillies in a heated propagator. Sow early carrot varieties, leeks, onions and summer cauliflowers under cover.

Sow some of the slowest growing annuals (e.g. petunias, impatiens, begonias and salvias) in modules and place them somewhere warm to germinate.

Continue to winter prune apples and pears.

At the end of the month begin chitting potatoes (encouraging them to sprout) by standing them upright in an egg box in a cool, light place. They will be ready to plant out in about six weeks.

Use cloches to warm the soil for early seed sowing.

Continue to ensure that birds have food and water, especially in frozen conditions.

At the November meeting we had a talk and tasting from Baboo Gelato who are local producers of Gelato and sell their products locally. They came to the area in 2015 and started up their business after much experimentation. Why the name Baboo? After Annie's Russian grandmother.

Only real ingredients are used in the process, fruits in season and all their milk is sourced from a farm in North Perrott where the cows are robot milked which ensures a steady milk supply. Gelato differs from ice-cream in that it has more milk and less cream in the mix. As the process uses seasonal local fruits where possible for their flavouring it means that the supply of particular flavours vary over the year. They also make ice-cream especially for dogs which is very popular. All packaging, pots and spoons, are compostable and their use of anything plastic is kept to a minimum.

We were then invited to try out the latest flavours which will be sold over the next few months— Pear sorbet, Ginger, Humbug and Brandy— all very tasty and members had a variety of opinions as to which flavour was their favourite. To finish off the evening we were all invited to try the chocolates that they also make. Filled with different flavours of gelato and sorbet and covered in chocolate these were definitely a treat for a special occasion.

An excellent evening where we all learnt a lot about the processes involved in the making of Gelato from Sam and Annie who are so enthusiastic about their products.

We welcomed some new members to our meeting and we hope they enjoyed their first taste of WI!!!!!! Our December meeting is our Christmas get-together with music, games, a quiz and festive food.

Our Night Sky in December 2021

Venus will be setting in the south west by 1700 in the middle of the month, followed by Saturn at 1900 and Jupiter at 2100, so make the most of these lovely planets while you can. To compensate, all the winter constellations will be up by 1900, with Orion being the last to rise in the east. For the early risers, Mars can be seen in the south east about 0700, but will soon be lost in the dawn sky.

Scientists have found evidence that a region of northern Mars called Arabia Terra experienced thousands of "super eruptions," the biggest volcanic eruptions known, over a 500-million-year period. Some volcanoes can produce eruptions so powerful they release oceans of dust and toxic gases into the air, blocking out sunlight and changing a planet's climate for decades. By studying the topography and mineral composition of a portion of the Arabia Terra region in northern Mars, scientists recently found evidence for thousands of such eruptions, or "super eruptions," which are the most violent volcanic explosions known.

Hurling water vapour, carbon dioxide, and sulphur dioxide into the air, these explosions tore through the Martian surface over a 500-million-year period about 4 billion years ago. Scientists reported this estimate in a paper published in the journal *Geophysical Research Letters* in July 2021.

Each one of these eruptions would have had a significant climate impact — maybe the released gas made the atmosphere thicker or blocked the Sun and made the atmosphere colder. After blasting the equivalent of 400 million Olympic-size swimming pools of molten rock and gas through the surface and spreading a thick blanket of ash up to thousands of miles from the eruption site, a volcano of this magnitude collapses into a giant hole called a "caldera."

Calderas, which also exist on Earth, can be dozens of miles wide. Seven calderas in Arabia Terra were the first giveaways that the region may once have hosted volcanoes capable of super eruptions.

Once thought to be depressions left by asteroid impacts to the Martian surface billions of years ago, scientists first proposed in a 2013 study that these basins were volcanic calderas. They noticed that they weren't perfectly round like craters, and they had some signs of collapse, such as very deep floors and benches of rock near the walls. Further investigation used images from MRO's Compact Reconnaissance Imaging Spectrometer

for Mars to identify the minerals in the surface. Looking in the walls of canyons and craters from hundreds to thousands of miles from the calderas, where the ash would have been carried by wind, they identified volcanic minerals turned to clay by water.

On Earth volcanoes capable of super eruptions — the most recent erupted 76,000 years ago in Sumatra, Indonesia — are dispersed around the globe and exist in the same areas as other volcano types.

Mars, too, has many other types of volcanoes, including the biggest volcano in the solar system, called Olympus Mons. Olympus Mons is 100 times larger by volume than Earth's largest volcano of Mauna Loa in Hawaii, and is known as a "shield volcano," which drains lava down a slope.

Arabia Terra so far has the only evidence of explosive volcanoes on Mars, but it is hoped that Arabia Terra will teach scientists something new about geological processes that help shape planets and moons.

Mars continues to provide exciting new information from the many orbiters and surface vehicles operating there, and I hope to tell you about more of them in 2022.

Meanwhile, a Very Happy Christmas to all our readers.

Advance Warning - Closure of Whiteway

Whiteway is due to be closed from Monday 13th December until Wednesday 5th January to enable an electrical supply to be connected to the emergency services phone mast located halfway up Whiteway.

We have asked for closure only to be activated when actual work is being carried out and/or the road is unusable but you should be aware that access to and from the village from the A35 during closure will only be via Long Bredy Hut Lane and Chalk Pit Lane.

Full Fibre – Rural Gigabit Initiative

We have yet to hear the outcome as to which area in Dorset is to receive full fibre broadband directly installed by Openreach courtesy of the government – everything is on hold for the moment. More in January's BVN but it is hugely possible full fibre can still come about by completion of the voucher pledging scheme we started in September – we await word from Openreach and Dorset Council. Watch this space!

Village Cafes

The first Village Cafe for two years was held on the 6th November, with exploration of the School Discovery Area, information about beekeeping, insulation, eco-affairs.... and much talk plus coffee and home baked cakes. Thanks to everyone who came, helped, and donated. We have sent £160 to Sea Shepherd, £50 for the Discovery Area and £50 for the school.

Artsreach at LATCH - The Syrian Baker

The Syrian Baker drew a capacity crowd to the LATCH on Sunday 17th October. On entering, the audience found itself in a quite different place—a welcoming Syrian meeting-place with ten tables dotted around the central acting area. Coffee was served in small cups, and draped lights created a café or meeting-point inside a bazaar. Writer Kevin Dyer took the story from interviews with Syrian refugees in Britain. With just three actors to weave together the story of Amina and Jamal, we saw childhood friends in Homs who later married but then became victims of the civil war. A portable bread-oven joined the action near the end when Jamal returned to his city, bidding the audience to stay behind to enjoy both his bread and the Syrian cakes and biscuits baked by our own village helpers. Pinar Ögün (Amina), Boodi Kabbani (Jamal) and Mohsen Ghaffari (Karim) were superb, seamlessly making the story come alive both across the years of experience and also across the miles separating war-torn Homs from London – a sanctuary that will finally be left behind.

From donations raised after the show the sum of £100 was sent to the Hands Up Foundation, a charity which exists to support health and education projects in Syria.

The next Artsreach drama is called *Hefted*, which will be performed by the Multistory Theatre Company at LATCH on Saturday 29th January 2022.

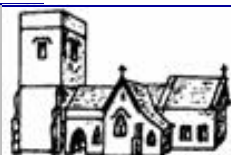

Come Along Inn

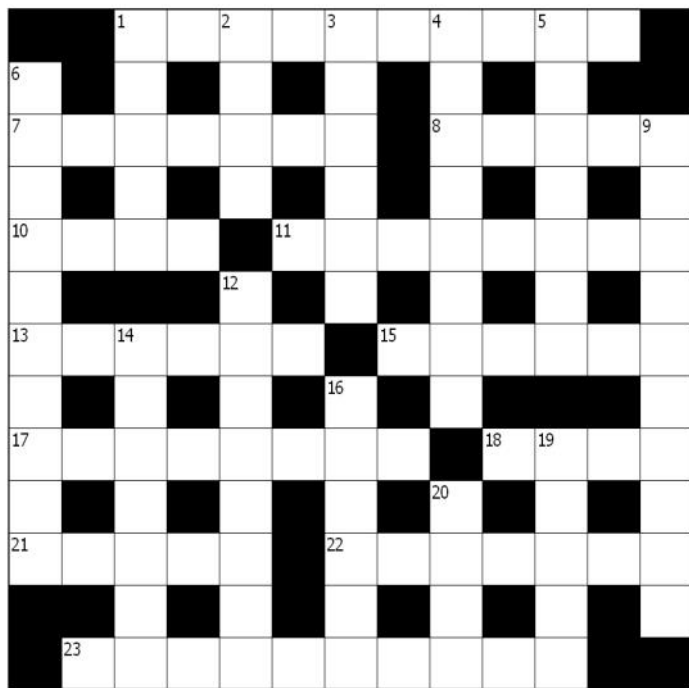
