BRIDE VALLEY CAR SERVICE



The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £1.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

BVCS simply provides door-to-door transport and cannot be responsible for assisting with clients' medical or mobility needs. Patients with complex transport needs for hospital appointments should contact the NHS Non-Emergency Patient Transport service.

FROM THE RECTORY

What will 2022 bring us, none of us can know for certain, my favourite New Year poem is this:

And I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year: "Give me a light, that I may tread safely into the unknown!" And he replied: "Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the Hand of God. That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way." *Minnie Louise Haskins* 1876 – 1957

As we begin this New Year I would like us as a Christian community this year to have a focus on prayer.

Ever since I was a young teenager I have been amazed at the power of prayer over my life, from short arrow prayers to longer conversations with God: prayer is such an integral part of my relationship with a God who knows me inside and out.

In 2022 I would like to go deeper and invite you all to join me.

A friend of mine wrote this:

"Prayer is the lifeblood, lifeline and life-language of faith. We often forget the privilege we have in drawing closer to God in prayer. Prayer which frames a cry for help, guidance or wisdom. THE BRIDE VALLEY BOOK CLUB



The Mermaid and Mrs Hancock - Imogen Hermes Gower

We were all impressed with "The Mermaid and Mrs Hancock" but there were misgivings about the final stages of the novel. There was general agreement on the sheer detail and skilled knowledge the author brought to her portraval of 18th C London. The worlds of Jonah Hancock, a Deptford merchant, and Angelica Neal, a courtesan and much admired member of the demi-monde, collide. The novel begins with the return of one of Mr Hancock's captains minus his ship but in possession of a strange creature he asserts is a mermaid. Angelica is at a crossroads in her life. Her aristocratic patron has inconveniently died leaving her without support and considering whether she can freelance, even possibly marry or return to the protection of her previous employer, the notorious Mrs Chapple. To compensate for the loss of the ship, Mr Hancock is persuaded to exhibit the "mermaid" for money and this leads to it becoming the star showpiece in an erotic floor show at one of London's most expensive and exclusive houses of ill repute run by Mrs Chapple. This sets the stage for the meeting between Jonah Hancock and Angelica.

Although the tone of the novel is often wryly comic there are genuinely sad and distressing interludes which remind us that life for women navigating 18th C London was not easy or safe. The author brings to life the sounds and smells of London ; the dismembering of whale carcasses at Greenland Dock, the fragrant sweet shop visited by Angelica and her friend, body odour and the details of the clothing worn with its complex fastenings and embellishments. Jonah Hancock, widowed and childless following the death of his son, is immediately smitten with Angelica. However it takes various twists and turns in their fortunes before Angelica agrees to become his wife. She jests that her price will be a second mermaid, the first one now decidedly deceased and decaying. We are given quite a detailed description of the first mermaid but when the second mermaid makes its appearance it has a much more opaque and other worldly presence. This is where the novel moves into a magical realism genre. The mermaid becomes more of a symbol - possibly suggesting the dangers of interfering with natural law. The Hancock household move to a more glamorous house in Blackheath which has a decorated subterranean grotto/folly in the garden. The mermaid is initially accommodated here before she starts to exercise a malign and

oppressive mood over the house's occupants. We mostly felt unsatisfied by the ending of the novel - it did feel as though the author had shifted gear into a different kind of novel. This was a compelling historical romp but with several ingenious twists.

The Book Group sends seasonal best wishes to everyone who reads the BVN - and to those who do the clever editing each month - and to those volunteers who deliver it through our letter boxes.

The Library is **OPEN** on Monday & Saturday afternoons 2.00pm to 4.00pm and on Wednesday mornings 10.30am to 12.30pm (**but please note it will be closed on Monday 3rd January which is a public holiday**)

During the continuing Covid-19 pandemic remains to ensure the safety, comfort and confidence of our customers and our volunteers. We are allowing up to four people at a time into the library, and encourage social distancing.

Our Night Sky in January 2022

We will be losing Saturn by 1700 and Jupiter by 1900 at the middle of the month, both setting in the evening sky, but you can enjoy all the winter constellations after sunset, with Orion striding across the southern sky, followed by his faithful Dog star, Sirius, sparkling like a diamond with multiple colours caused by the turbulent atmosphere near the horizon.

For new readers, do look at this beautiful object through binoculars, as well as sweeping along the Milky Way arching across the heavens at this time of the year.

We are blessed in Burton Bradstock with dark skies, thanks to the wisdom of the villagers in keeping outside lights to a minimum. Mars and Venus will be making an early morning appearance about 0700, but will soon be lost in the dawn sky.

NASA's Double Asteroid Redirection Test (DART), the world's first full-scale mission to test technology for defending Earth against potential asteroid or comet hazards, was launched last month on a SpaceX Falcon 9 rocket, and will impact a known asteroid that is not a threat to Earth. Its goal is to slightly change the asteroid's motion in a way that can be accurately measured using ground-based telescopes. DART will show that a spacecraft can autonomously navigate to a target asteroid and intentionally collide with it – a method of deflection called kinetic impact.

The test will provide important data to help better prepare for an asteroid that might pose an impact hazard to Earth, should one ever be discovered. LICIACube, a CubeSat riding with DART will be released prior to DART's collision to capture images of the impact and the resulting cloud of ejected matter.

DART's one-way trip is to the Didymos asteroid system, which comprises a pair of asteroids. DART's target is the moonlet, Dimorphos, which is approximately 530 feet (160 meters) in diameter. The moonlet orbits Didymos, which is approximately 2,560 feet (780 meters) in diameter.

Since Dimorphos orbits Didymos at much a slower relative speed than the pair orbit the Sun, the result of DART's kinetic impact within the binary system can be measured much more easily than a change in the orbit of a single asteroid around the Sun.

The spacecraft will intercept the Didymos system between Sept. 26 and Oct. 1, 2022, intentionally slamming into Dimorphos at roughly 4 miles per second (6 kilometers per second). Scientists estimate the kinetic impact will shorten Dimorphos' orbit around Didymos by several minutes. Researchers will precisely measure that change using telescopes on Earth.

Their results will validate and improve scientific computer models critical to predicting the effectiveness of the kinetic impact as a reliable method for asteroid deflection.

I will keep you informed about this fascinating experiment later this year.



Our Churchyard

Substantial work needs to be carried out to repair the walls surrounding the churchyard. Work carried out in the churchyard is funded separately from the church. Money needed for churchyard maintenance is raised by donations or fundraising .

Anyone living in the village - religious or not - is entitled to be buried there if they wish. They do not have to have worshipped in the church or be a regular church-goer anywhere.

We have volunteers who help with routine maintenance of the Churchyard but none of us is getting any younger so the more people who help, the less onerous it is for the rest of us. Grass is usually cut or strimmed each fortnight between April and October. If there were 6 more volunteers to add to the existing rota, that would be just one mowing for each volunteer.

The churchyard belongs to the village and, as such, is part of our heritage. Visitors come to see family graves or enjoy the peaceful surroundings and wild flowers which are there in summer. It is not just a 'dead space'. It is not feasible to allow it to be grazed by sheep as some churchyards are and because it is frequently visited and still used for burials, letting it go wild is not a practical option.

Any help with maintenance, fundraising or donations would be very welcome to keep the churchyard looking beautiful on behalf of past, and for future, generations .



A busy month, as the December talk was early, we have two talks to report on.

Firstly, November's talk, "A Cruise Along the Jurassic Coast", by Steve Belasco, was very well attended, and fascinating. Steve explained that The Jurassic Coast begins at Orcombe Point in <u>Exmouth</u>, Devon, and continues for 95 miles to <u>Old Harry Rocks</u>, near <u>Swanage</u>, Dorset, and that it Represents three geological time Periods called the Triassic, Jurassic and Cretaceous. Rocks that offer an almost complete record of that entire time are spread out along the Jurassic Coast, a bit like the pages of a book, this is the only place on the planet where this occurs, and why it has been designated the UK's only World Heritage Site.

Next we had December's talk, "Christmas - Pagan or What?" by Susan Moores. Susan's talk, ably supported by the amazing graphics and slides that David created, talked of the history of ancient and modern festivals of light at the winter solstice, and of pagan and pre-Christian myths and how they were adopted into the Christian calendar influencing the way that we celebrate the Christmas season today. As always, Susan's talk was highly entertaining, informative and to a packed house. The audience were then treated to mulled wine and mince pies to round off a delightful Christmas meeting.

On to 2022, our next talk takes place on Friday 14TH January, and is entitled "Celebrating Dorset in Traditional Stories and Song", by Tim Laycock. Tim has been playing and singing at folk clubs and festivals for over 25 years using mainly the concertina, melodeon or guitar to accompany himself. His repertoire is drawn from a great collection of traditional folk songs, sea shanties, ballads and music hall songs. Many of his songs and stories are inspired by his native county Dorset, giving them a West Country flavour.

Generous donation helps Golden Cap Estate to blossom, a note from Anthony Parsons

The National Trust has welcomed a donation to plant and maintain two blossom hedges on the Golden Cap Estate.

The planting of the hedges has been made possible by a donation from the Golden Cap Association and increased with a legacy from Derek Parsons, former Chair and President of the Golden Cap Association, and former well known Burton Bradstock resident who died in April 2020.



Over the next 3 years the National Trust is hoping to plant 1500m of native species blossom hedge, located along historic hedgerow boundaries on the coastal downland between Seatown and Eype. The work to plant the hedge near Seatown will start on Wednesday 1st December with volunteers from the Association helping National Trust staff and volunteers The hedge will form part of a network of hedges and will be planted with hardy, blossoming species such as Blackthorn, Hawthorn and Crab Apple and will be visible from neighbouring villages, the South West Coast Path and the A35 Dorset to Devon trunk road. A second hedge will

be planted at Thorncombe Beacon.

Countryside Manager Leo Henley Lock said: "We are delighted that this project has been_made possible by the generous donation from the Golden Cap Association and the legacy left by the late Derek Parsons. Hedgerows form an important part of our landscapes, connecting habitats and wildlife, whilst playing an important role in mitigating the future impacts of climate change."

Chair of the Golden Cap Society Mike Nicks said: 'The Committee and all the Members of Golden Cap Association are delighted to donate to the local area National Trust for the planting and maintenance of two blossom hedges on the Golden Cap Estate. I feel it incumbent on all of us to help in a practical and physical way to help slow down the rate of climate change, and along the way to help our wildlife, whether it be animals, birds, insects or flowers to flourish for years and centuries ahead. The legacy from Derek Parsons is a very welcome addition to the Association's donation and I know how pleased his family are to support such a worthy and important cause which will also be enjoyed by future generations.


