BRIDE VALLEY CAR SERVICE



The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £1.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

BVCS simply provides door-to-door transport and cannot be responsible for assisting with clients' medical or mobility needs. Patients with complex transport needs for hospital appointments should contact the NHS Non-Emergency Patient Transport service.

To book a journey please call our voluntary co-ordinator Lesley on 01308 897695 between Monday and Friday.

Calls cannot be taken at weekends.



FROM THE RECTORY

The beginning of June this year marks two significant events. The first of these is the Queen's platinum Jubilee, for which celebration events are being planned in communities across the country. In our own villages there are activities taking place right across the Bride Valley and these offer us a great opportunity to meet friends old and new and bring communities together.

This is the first time that any British monarch has celebrated a Platinum Jubilee, and after 70 years on the throne very few of us will even be able to remember anything other than living in Elizabethan times.

The Queen's reign has been marked by almost unimaginable changes in society and in the world. Her coronation was credited with kick-starting the television age, now screens are just about everywhere. Her first Christmas broadcast in 1952 was only on the radio, her latest in 2021 could be watched on Tik Tok or heard on Amazon Alexa!

The Queen has been a constant presence in an ever-changing world and it is testament to her humility and service that, though scandals may have rocked her family and a great number of her governments, the Queen herself remains an inspiration to many.

Though the majority of her coronation was shown on television, there was one moment that was deemed too sacred to broadcast (even if that is a decision that you can't imagine television executives making today!). This was the moment when the symbols of her status – the crimson robe, the diamond diadem, the coronation necklace – were removed, and the Archbishop of Canterbury anointed the new Queen with holy oil.

The Queen has spoken since of how this moment was the most significant one of her life, as in humility she was dedicated to a life of service and called to follow the example of Jesus who himself gave his life for others.

It seems very fitting to me that the other significant celebration taking place on the first weekend in June is the feast of Pentecost. This is when we remember the gift of God's Holy Spirit to the Church, that Spirit of love and service which binds all people together and fills each and every one of us with the guiding presence of God.

The early Christians, after receiving the gift of the Holy Spirit, dedicated their lives to one another. As the book of Acts puts it:

"All the believers were one in heart and mind. No one claimed that any of their possessions was their own, but they shared everything they had. God's grace was so powerfully at work in them all that there were no needy persons among them." Acts 4.32-34

As we approach this weekend with its multitude of celebrations may we all be inspired – whether by the Holy Spirit, by the many years of humble service of her Majesty the Queen, or both – to dedicate our lives to the service of our fellow humans, in our own communities and around the world.

Our Night Sky in June 2022

Jupiter will be rising in the East about 0230, followed by Mars, but Venus will be lost in the dawn sky. This is the month of the shortest nights, so you have to be pretty dedicated to wait for a dark sky, which does not last long!

The James Webb telescope has been sending back some astonishing pictures, even before it has fully cooled down its instruments to just short of Absolute zero. It will then be able to peer through dust clouds to image what objects lie behind in the infra red part of the spectrum. On March 11, the Webb team completed the stage of alignment known as "fine phasing." At this key stage in the commissioning of Webb's Optical Telescope Element every optical parameter that has been checked and tested is performing at, or above, expectations. The team also found no critical issues and no measurable contamination or blockages to Webb's optical path. The observatory is able to successfully gather light from distant objects and deliver it to its instruments without issue.

While the purpose of the first clear image was to focus on the bright star at the centre for alignment evaluation, Webb's optics and NIRCam are so sensitive that the galaxies and stars seen in the background show up. At this stage of Webb's mirror alignment, known as "fine phasing," each of the primary mirror segments have been adjusted to produce one unified image of the same star using only the NIRCam instrument. Although there are months to go before Webb ultimately delivers its new view of the cosmos, achieving this milestone means the team is confident that Webb's first-of-its-kind optical system is working as well as possible.

Over the next six weeks, the team will proceed through the remaining alignment steps before final science instrument preparations. The team will further align the telescope to include the Near-Infrared Spectrograph, Mid-Infrared Instrument, and Near-Infrared Instrument, and Near-Infrared Imager and Slitless
Spectrograph. In this phase of the process, an algorithm will evaluate the performance of each instrument and then calculate the final corrections needed to achieve a well-aligned telescope across all science instruments. Following this, Webb's final alignment step will begin, and the team will adjust any small, residual positioning errors in the mirror segments.

Remember, all this is taking place a million miles from Earth. I never cease to be astonished by the brilliance of the scientists and engineers responsible for this amazing technology.

MAY Review



Reasons to Stay Alive by Matt Haig

Some of us decided straight away this was not a book for them for a variety of reasons. One or two of us found the subject matter upsetting, some of us started it but gave up - but enough of us did finish it and took away helpful and interesting things from it. We did wonder if this was a book you would actually recommend to someone suffering from depression and whether it would be of more help to someone who was supporting a friend or family member.

Personally I thought Matt Haig was trying to give us an honest account of what happened to him - quite suddenly - on the island of Ibiza - when he was in his early twenties - working a summer job alongside his girlfriend. Whether the all night partying and general hedonism played a part in triggering his depression - we just do not know. He describes his childhood and adolescence acknowledging his 'thin skin' and lack of confidence. Was the foundation for his depression innate - or did the environmental Ibiza lifestyle "cause" the mental illness? However he leaves us in no doubt that this was a very serious mental health interlude. Haig becomes suicidal and has to exit the island with his girlfriend and return home to be cared for by his parents. The author was lucky to be surrounded and supported by his family, friends and his girlfriend. He describes things which were helpful to him but also acknowledges that what worked for him might not be right for other depression sufferers. He very much gives the impression that he has learned to live with depression, a condition which ebbs and flows, for him it never completely goes away. There is no magical cure - and whilst medication works for some people - it did not really work for him.

Some of us felt that "Reasons to Stay Alive" was veering towards the style of a self help book especially when he used lists. Given that most of us knew or had supported someone with this condition we did agree that we lack the vocabulary to talk about depression. Indeed some sufferers benefit from so called "talking cures" whilst for others this is almost impossible to contemplate.

Biddy wrote "This topic is extremely important as suicide is responsible for more deaths in young people under the age of 35 than any other cause. More women suffer from depression but men are three times more likely to

take their own lives. Matt Haig says ' If I can prevent one unnecessary death it is worth it'. Depression can lead to isolation and feeling bad about oneself - but is a common condition and it is important for sufferers to know that they are not alone - many famous and creative people have endured depression. Self care is vital, short term activities and social contact can help but therapy can provide longer term help in working through feelings and problems. "

Jobs to do in June

Plant out pot-grown dahlias and cannas; tender summer bedding; half-hardy annuals and tender perennials in containers.

Sow foxgloves in pots.

Support young sweet pea plants; train clematis and climbing roses.

Cut back herbaceous perennials early this month to make them sturdier and stockier. If you have several plants leave some uncut to stagger flowering.

You might like to give some of your houseplants a holiday by putting them outside in a shady spot for the summer – succulents, however, need a lot of light.

Keep sowing salad vegetables and French beans.

Plant out runner beans against supports, courgettes, pumpkins, squashes and sweetcorn. Plant out brassicas and protect them from birds and caterpillars

Sow annual herbs like basil, parsley and coriander. Make more rosemary and sage plants by taking cuttings.

BRIDPORT MUSEUM CELEBRATES ITS 90TH BIRTHDAY!

The Opening of Bridport Museum

Bridport Museum and Art Gallery was founded in 1932 in one of the town's oldest buildings, known as the Old Castle. It was an innovative step for a small industrial town in rural West Dorset. Many much larger places did not have a civic art gallery or Museum in the 1930s. Bridport's good fortune was based upon what the Bridport News called 'Mr Codd's munificent gift' of the building and a collection of his own work together with the civic pride of the council who were willing to fund the conversion of what had been the Conservative Club into a gallery and museum space.

On a Saturday afternoon in May 1932, a large group of Bridport's great and the good gathered for the official opening; to hear the speeches, to see some of the donors and to explore the new gallery and museum. The ceremony took place in the main room on the ground floor which had been set out to house the museum and which already contained 'many objects of interest to not only the archaeologically minded but to the laymen in general'. Later that day the art gallery and museum was opened up for free to the public, although not to children. From then on, admission was charged to adults and to accompanied children.

The ceremony was attended by aldermen and councillors as well as officers of the council (the Borough had a surveyor, electrical engineer and accountant) together with men and women of the town's influential families (Colfox, Gundry, Palmer as well as the Misses Reynolds) and visitors such as the Mayor of Weymouth. The latter responded to his cordial reception in the 'wild and woolly west' by saying that they in Weymouth were always ready to learn as they hadn't yet achieved their own art gallery and museum. He hoped that the museum opened that day would be the success hoped for. Amidst laughter he said, "Your Mayor talked of filling it. Well, if you want a few old fossils ... but there, I suppose you have plenty of your own."

The Mayor welcomed everyone to 'this most unique occasion'. One significant absence was Percy Codd, a long-retired Captain in the Royal Engineers and amateur artist, who had given the building to the Council on condition that the necessary alterations were made so that it could be a gallery and museum. He was represented by a fellow resident of Bath, Mrs WH Hildebrand (and her daughter), who had also loaned paintings to the new gallery to augment the more than 100 pictures that Codd had donated to form the nucleus of what was felt to be 'a charming collection'.

The most famous paintings on display had been loaned by the son of the Pre-Raphaelite painter William Holman Hunt, who had recently come to live in

Walditch. Codd had also compiled a catalogue of the approximately 150 exhibits in the crowded art gallery which was located in the upstairs rooms of The Old Castle.

Gallery of paintings hung upstairs in the Museum



Speeches focused on thanking the man who had made possible this initiative. Codd although 'a gentleman more closely identified with the town of Beaminster' where his father was vicar for many years, had made a magnificent gift to Bridport and had been instrumental in attracting gifts and loans of paintings from others. It was also felt to be most gratifying that one of the most ancient, and certainly

one of the most picturesque buildings in the borough should be forever the property of the town. It had been feared that when The Old Castle was put up for sale that a modern shop front would take the place of its old mullioned windows. It was now hoped what was inaugurated that day would be the nucleus of a local museum 'on a line with that most satisfactory one at Dorchester'. Major Gundry commented, 'Although the museum exhibits were not numerous they would probably result in other residents and people interested in the ancient borough contributing articles which would prove of intense interest to their descendants'.

With the speeches over, the company proceeded on a tour of inspection through the building, afterwards returning to the main downstairs room where they were guests at tea with the Mayor and Mayoress. The catering was provided by Mr ER George of the Cafe on East Street. And so began the story of Bridport Museum......

News from Portesham Surgery

Merger with Prince of Wales Surgery

Most of our patients should by now have received word of our plan to merge our surgery with the Prince of Wales surgery. If you've missed your letter, email or text, and haven't been into the surgery recently, we just want to confirm that the main purpose is to give both practices more strength in numbers, particularly in GPs. As many of you know we have been through a particularly tricky few months because of sickness, when at times we have been close to closing the surgery because we haven't been able to find locums to cover our GP sessions. Between our two surgeries we will have six partners, four salaried GPs and several regular locums which should help us over any future difficulties and secure the future of both practices.

There are lots of other advantages too. For example the Prince of Wales surgery has mainly male GPs which will balance our very female team of partners and salaried GPs. We will have a wider pool of nurses to draw on with different areas of expertise, and a bigger team of admin staff to help support the ever-increasing GP workload.

From your point of view you should see very little change. Both sites will continue with the same opening times offering appointments with the same staff as now. You may be offered an appointment at the Prince of Wales site if it is sooner than at Portesham, but it will be your choice whether to travel or wait for an appointment here. The merger has to go through a formal approvals process but we should have confirmation by the end of June. We plan to arrange an information session after that to give you more information and answer any questions you may have.

Supporting our Unpaid Carers

A carer is anyone who looks after a family member or friend who has a disability, mental or physical illness or who needs extra help as they grow older. Caring's impact on all aspects of life from relationships and health to finances and work can be significant. Whilst many feel that caring is one of the most important things they do, its challenges should not be underestimated. Caring without the right information and support can be tough. It is vitally important that we recognise the contribution carers make to their families and local communities, workplaces and society, and that

Health Champions

Many of you will have seen a message from us in April inviting you to become a "Health Champion" for the surgery. We had a fantastic response and have already held three successful meetings where we introduced the idea of health champions, whose role is to extend the scope of the GP surgery out into the community. We are looking at the gaps in need, where patients may be coming to the GP because they don't know where else to go for help, and coming up with ideas on how to reach out based on our new volunteers' interests and passions.

We have chosen three initial projects to get started, and will be adding more as we identify new needs and hopefully as more volunteers come forward with ideas.

Wellness Garden

Our volunteers will be developing an area of the surgery garden as a tranquil place for patients (and staff!) to go to talk, relax and reflect. Patients who may not have their own garden might enjoy coming to do a bit of weeding or planting, patients bumping into old friends at the surgery will have somewhere to sit and catch up, and our care coordinators and social prescribers (see below) can use the space to talk to patients outside of the medical environment of the surgery. Walk and Talk

Many areas already have health walk groups but as far as we know there is very little in Portesham or the Bride Valley. We have some experienced walk leaders in the group who are meeting at the end of May to plan the first route in early June which will start in Portesham and be a gentle stroll accessible to all. Community Buddies

The third project is looking at how to support people in the community who may need a bit of extra help at a time of bereavement, isolation or a life-changing medical condition. We are lucky to have some experienced listeners in the group who plan initially to offer short-term listening (by telephone, zoom or face-to-face depending on preferences).

If you are interested in helping with any of these projects or want to find out more so you can benefit from them, check our website or contact Jackie or Kendal at the surgery.

Care Coordinators and Social Prescribers

Jackie and Kendal have been working as social prescribers at the Surgery for the last two years. Their role is to offer support to our patients with non-clinical needs, and signpost them to other services and organisations which can help (such as accessing care at home and finding a cleaner or home help).

Our care coordinators Mel and Kate are new to us this year. Their role is to support patients with their clinical needs, for example when patients are discharged from hospital and need a package of short or long-term support at home.

If you, or someone you know, needs this kind of support from us, please do not hesitate to get in touch.

Can you help?

We have an increasing number of patients who struggle to get to the surgery for appointments, particularly from Portesham, Abbotsbury and the surrounding area not covered by the Bride Valley Car service. Some patients are paying regularly for expensive taxis or just don't know who to ask for help. If you know if any community schemes or would be interested in helping, please contact the surgery. Working closely with other emergency services the NCI is now very much the frontline of our personal in shore coastal safety all funded by its own efforts.

Our first talk of the 2023 season is on 16th September when John Stockley will give a talk entitled "A sweeps life".

Burton Bradstock Festival of Music and Art August 2022

A huge thank you to all who supported the Spring Concert on 20 May, which marked the start of the 40th Festival of Music and Art in Burton Bradstock.

It was a poignant occasion as we learned that Festival founder Mary Ryan sadly died in April this year.

Mary, a distinguished flautist, spent much of her childhood in Burton Bradstock. After studies at the Royal College of Music on an open scholarship she was appointed principal flute of the BBC Northern Orchestra in Manchester. She played concertos with both the BBC Northern and the BBC Scottish orchestras.

On her return to London she co-founded the ground-breaking all female wind group, the Portia Wind Ensemble. Working with composers such as Richard Rodney Bennett and Sir Harrison Birtwistle the Portia commissioned many new works which they premiered on the BBC.

Throughout a busy career Mary retained her links with Burton Bradstock and, in 1981, she and her husband, Ronald Gillham, organised the first Burton Bradstock Festival. A combination of hospitality and excellent music soon attracted leading musicians to the village and began a tradition that is still thriving more than 40 years later.

Artistic Director David Juritz said: "I will remember Mary Ryan with enormous affection. Working with her was always a delight, with every rehearsal punctuated by her anecdotes and wry observations. My gratitude for the legacy of concerts she leaves is shared by everyone that remembers her."

A reminder that the main Music Festival takes place from 17-19 August and the Art Festival will run in the Village Hall from the 16-21 August.






