BRIDE VALLEY CAR SERVICE



The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £1.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

BVCS simply provides door-to-door transport and cannot be responsible for assisting with clients' medical or mobility needs. Patients with complex transport needs for hospital appointments should contact the NHS Non-Emergency Patient Transport service.

FROM THE RECTORY

On 21st March we will be asked to take part in a national census, this happens every ten years and it's a unique way of finding out about us all and the community we live in. It's got me wondering what it is exactly that marks a community out. This also stems from the way I've witnessed how people have supported one another and been there for each other during the last twelve months, since the beginning of the pandemic. Of course, this won't be the sort of information that's captured through the census.

We cannot choose our neighbours, those we live alongside and in the recent past we have not always needed to get to know them anyway. We may have chosen to live as independently as possible.

Up until recently, this country and other so-called developed parts of the world, have been accused of living with an individualistic mind-set, needing to appear better than everyone else, judging others by the values of one's family and society at large. So many people in our society seemed to find themselves in a perpetual battle to succeed, to get a good job, to get promotion, to receive honours and recognition.

We live in a competitive world. There are other people though who, because of health problems, education, their family or social background, do not succeed to the same degree. They feel humiliated, are often considered inferior, and harbour in their hearts a great deal of anguish. Constantly focussing on ourselves or on our own group puts a strain on our relationships with other people and often leads to fear, violence hatred and other forms of division.

This clearly needs to change and over the last year I think we have been living through the start of that change. Throughout the Bride Valley I have seen communities coming together, some have told me that they've never seen this level of neighbourly support before. Others say it reminds them of wartime, when people worked together for the common good, in support of everyone and in particular the most vulnerable. Nationally we have also been hearing stories of communities pulling together at this uncertain time.

We are certainly getting better at being interdependent. And of course, this works both ways, we have to be willing to help others, but also willing to be helped and for some that is the hardest thing. As we move towards Easter, a time when we remember how Jesus came into the world for each and every one of us, laying down his life to save us. as Christians we often have to go against the ways of the world, to be counter cultural. This year more than ever, as we emerge from Lockdown and the effects of the pandemic, let's think together how we can continue forwards in the neighbourly way we've learned afresh together. Jesus is our example.

As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you: abide in my love. This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. Greater love has no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends. (John 15:9,12-13)

Some of us had started the current book - “Further Accidental Adventures of the 100 Year Old Man” by Jonas Jonasson - translated from Swedish. Our Night Sky in March 2021

Mars remains prominent in the southern sky during the night, and is close to the bright red star Aldebaran, the eye of Taurus the Bull. However, it continues to fade from its earlier brilliance, but will still be easy to see.

You might just be able to see Saturn and Jupiter as they become morning planets, but they are soon lost in the dawn glare. Orion remains the Constellation of the night, and is always worth viewing through binoculars.

Japan’s mission to bring asteroid dust back to Earth has succeeded. The Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency (JAXA) confirmed on 14 December that a capsule from spacecraft Hayabusa2, which landed in an Australian desert last week, contained black grains from asteroid Ryugu.

Hayabusa2 collected the samples over a year and a half on Ryugu — a small asteroid shaped like a squashed sphere, covered with giant boulders. Ryugu is a C-type, or carbon-rich, asteroid, which scientists think contains organic and hydrated minerals preserved from as far back as 4.6 billion years ago. The samples could help to explain how Earth became covered with water. Scientists think it came on asteroids or similar planetary bodies from the outer regions of the Solar System.

Hayabusa2 has now begun its 11-year journey to its next destination - a fast-rotating asteroid. To reach it, the spacecraft will fly by another asteroid and swing past Earth another two times, a further example of the extraordinary capabilities of the space engineers and navigators who have to work in both time and space within minute tolerances.

Superfast Broadband

FULL OPTICAL FIBRE UPDATE

Hello everyone. We thought you may be interested in getting an update on our progress, which it has to be said, has been rather slow.

Dealing with BTO (BTOPENREACH) has not been easy, with ongoing difficulties communicating with them (ironic for sure), unanswered correspondence and obstructions. Initially they wanted the organisers (us) to have a Legal Entity and to be responsible for any shortfall in the cost over the vouchers. Not surprisingly we said no. Fortunately BTO have now changed their mind and said we can now individually sign in to an online page pledging our vouchers to BTO. At the time of writing this has yet to be set up. One can speculate as to how long this will take.

How much will full fibre cost? As far as we understand it there are two answers! First the cost of installing the cables down the street and into your home. If we can sign up enough people then there will be enough vouchers to fund the scheme for FREE.

The second cost is the ISP's (internet service provider) monthly fee which everyone pays for their internet. You will be able to choose which ISP you'd like (from a limited list which may not include your current one); you will also be able to opt for a higher internet speed up to 1,000 mbps. I currently get between 16-26 but would like 300. Higher speeds will cost more, but the level will be your choice.

We initially had 57 addresses register their interest from Long Bredy, Litton Cheney and Kingston Russell. BTO have now identified over 350 properties that could be included.

Puncknowle, Swyre and Burton Bradstock are also busily catching up (courtesy of Jackie & Louis) and they have also submitted their initial numbers to BTO.

We understand there is an option of radio broadband. We have investigated this but we prefer a system that is permanently hard wired with fibre directly to our homes without the reported vagaries of weather or interference and with the option of choice of different ISPs.

Lastly the current voucher scheme ends in March, but apparently another starts in April although there's no info about it at present. Hang on in there and get talking to people as the more on our list the more BTO will want to connect us.

A phone meeting next week has finally been suggested by Openreach, so hopefully there will be more clarity after that.

If these were 'normal' times this article would be inviting members and visitors to our first meeting of the year in March and we would be preparing for our AGM in April. Sadly we can't do either this year but being gardeners, we will be positive about the coming months!

Over 70% of our members paid their subs in 2020 for which we were most grateful, but of course we were unable to hold meetings. This income allowed us to cover annual expenses including membership of the Gold Club (which covers discount cards, talks and shopping visits) and the RHS, newsletters and other incidentals. Jobs to Do in March

Prune hardy fuchsias, bush and shrub roses, buddleia and late-flowering clematis.

Lift and divide overgrown clumps of perennials and herbs.

Take stem cuttings from new growth on pelargoniums, salvias and fuchsias.

Plant summer-flowering bulbs.

Start off your sunflowers in plugs indoors and begonia tubers in pots or trays of compost.

Sow hardy annual seeds.

In the vegetable garden sow short rows of beetroot, broad beans, carrots, lettuce, peas, spinach and radishes; plant onion sets, shallots and first early potatoes if the conditions are good enough.

Protect vulnerable young plants with fleece or cloches if cold weather is forecast.

Clear weeds from the base of fruit trees and add mulch to lightly feed and preserve moisture.

'Fledglings' is also open in accordance with the present government guidance. It is a real tonic to see the pre-school children rush in every morning, happily oblivious to what is unfolding in the wide world. There may be more hand-washing and the layout of the rooms a little different, but they seem as excited as ever about the chance to hear stories, play outside on the diggers and run around in our wildlife area. Staff have been excellent in managing the guidelines from government, whilst still ensuring that our very youngest children get a wonderful introduction to pre-school. Their 'trips' out (around the village) are a big hit with the children, especially when they are able to have a quick chat with passers-by or residents of Litton. As they come tumbling back into school (usually a mass of wet wellies, hats and high-vis jackets) it is lovely to hear their enthusiasm for all that they have seen out and about. Many have told me of horses they have seen, chickens they have met and one young boy assures me he saw a dragon in the woods, but it was quite shy and may have flown away now.

As we broke up for half-term, we sent each of our families a little 'thank you' bag for all their efforts over the last few weeks in keeping their children engaged and focused on their Zoom lessons and other activities throughout the day. Like all schools, we really do appreciate how incredibly difficult it is for families to juggle work and home life, whilst simultaneously acting as tutors to support their children with what staff are offering online. Hopefully, this state of affairs won't be for too much longer and we can look forward to the children returning in the spring/summer.

Further thanks must also go to Ryan Hobby of Colfox for organising a wonderful set of virtual school athletics competitions. Of course, the children cannot compete next to one another in a real event but through his excellent organisation, hard work and scrupulous timekeeping, our children did manage to 'compete' with other pupils across local schools by measuring and timing their running, throwing and jumping in a mini-pentathlon event. Well done to both Lyra Webb and Arlo Toms for winning medals in the boys' and girls' individual events!

As we go to print, details will likely be announced soon about how we are set to return for the spring. All we can hope for is a clear plan, as much notice as possible and some warm weather. We look forward to running our Forest School Fortnight when the children do return as it will enable us all to work outside for much of the day, as safely as possible with one another, and away from a Zoom screen for at least a fortnight. Burton Bradstock CE School



As I write this report, we are on the final day of the first half of the Spring term. At the end of the Christmas holidays, it was announced that schools would only be open for children of key workers and vulnerable families and the vast majority of our pupils found themselves learning remotely via their online platforms. At the start of the term, pupil attendance in school varied from 9% to 20%, depending on the needs of parents on different days of the week. As we end the half term this has risen to 20% on some days and up to 32% on others. As a school we understand how challenging this time has been for parents who are facilitating the learning at home as well as juggling other things such as work and younger siblings. Yet, despite this, we are utterly delighted with the way that our families are engaging with the online learning and how amazing our children are.

Staff have been providing the same learning for pupils who are learning at home as the ones attending school. New learning has been taught through recorded videos, either produced by the staff or uploaded from the website, and children are given follow-up, independent tasks to complete online or in the work packs that were sent home at the start of the term to consolidate their learning. The children have been able to share their work with their teachers by completing the tasks online or submitting a photo or video. All activities that are completed and submitted are responded to by the staff each day – far exceeding the Government's recommendation of once a week. We are extremely fortunate that all of our pupils who are at home are able to access their remote learning online.

The children have been receiving daily Maths and English lessons as well as lessons on a range of foundation subjects through topic work. Staff have also been uploading daily videos of themselves reading books for the children to listen to and Collective Worship videos and Good Work Assemblies are shared each week, in order for staff and children to be able to connect during this time.

Children's Mental Health Week took place this half term and as a school we promoted this by setting various tasks throughout the week for the children to take part in. The theme this year was 'Express Yourself' and the children were able to express themselves in lots of creative ways. Owl Class (Year 5 and 6) have put together a video to showcase this, which you can view at <https://vimeo.com/508393685/5869cb444e>

We also had a 'NO SCREEN DAY' in the last week of the half term. For the day, none of the activities involved the children logging on to their devices – a welcome break after all the online learning! They had so much fun and learnt new skills through playing board games, building dens, baking, building small world playsets, creating models...the list goes on!

Portesham Surgery News

Our staff feel very privileged to be part of the momentous effort to turn the seemingly relentless tide of bad news in the last year into a more positive future. It is really starting to feel that the traditional spring “opening up” of daffodil buds, windows, blue skies, flinging off the hats and scarves, open smiling faces (albeit behind masks!) is now within reach.

It is hard to believe that this time last month we were just starting our first vaccination clinic at the Atrium Health Centre in Dorchester. We have combined with eight mid-Dorset practices to run the clinics, and have already vaccinated over 10,000 patients in just four weeks. By the end of the current week (19th February) we will have vaccinated around 1,000 of our own patients.

Many of our staff have worked at the clinics and it has been a really positive and sometimes emotional experience for staff and patients alike. The local community has been very supportive with so many volunteer marshals working in freezing conditions to greet you in the car park, and individuals and businesses bringing in contributions of cakes, coffee and cuppa soups to keep us going. Thank you to the army of volunteers and staff who have so far made these clinics run very smoothly and allowed us to provide the first vaccine dose to a huge proportion of our population in such a short space of time.

We are currently inviting our Group 5 patients aged 65 - 69 and, depending on vaccine deliveries, hope to have completed those vaccinations by the end of next week.

"Spare doses?"

Some of our nine mid-Dorset practices have seen posts on social media encouraging people to attend the vaccination clinic without an appointment towards the end of the day, to chance getting a “spare” dose. Whilst we occasionally do have doses “spare”, these are usually because people have not attended for their booked appointment and so are very limited in numbers.

We ask that patients DO NOT attend the clinic without a booked appointment as you will be turned away. To ensure all doses are used, we have a list of patients who were due to be invited in the next wave of invitations. They will receive a call from a member of the vaccination team to invite them in at the end of the day for these additional doses.

Arrival Times

We are asking that patients who have booked appointments do **not** arrive before their provided time slot. This slot is 10 minutes in length, meaning you are free to arrive at any point within the 10 minute window. Our clinics have been planned to allow for social distancing and efficient crowd management, and attending without an appointment or earlier than your booked slot risks an increase in queues and risks social distancing being difficult to maintain.

Invitations

All GP surgeries are sending their invitations by text message to your mobile phone, but there are a number of **scams** in circulation. The invitation text message will be followed by a second message confirming your appointment as soon as your booking is confirmed. The invitation now includes our telephone number to help identify it as genuine, and does not ask for any personal information other than confirmation of your date of birth. Note that if you don't have a mobile, or don't respond to the text, **we are telephoning every patient** on the list and making sure every eligible patient has been given the chance to book an appointment before we move on to the next group of invitations.

Letters offering appointments at mass vaccination centres have been sent out by NHS England to patients living within 45 minutes travel of the new centres in Bournemouth and Yeovil. If you have not yet had your invitation from us, the mass vaccination centre is an alternative you can consider, or you can wait for your invitation from us to have it locally – keep checking our website www.porteshamsurgery for updates on when this is likely to be.

Like everyone, we are longing for the restrictions to be lifted and life to return to normal, but in the meantime it is important that we all keep following the guidelines to keep each other safe. And keep smiling, because every day the news is a little better and we are closer to the spring we all deserve.

In 2020, grants were made to young people in higher and further education, and as Christmas gifts to older residents on limited means or who live alone. Grants were also made for the renewal of the turnstiles and gates in The Rocks, and to Thorner's School and the White Horse to support them during Covid-19 restrictions. 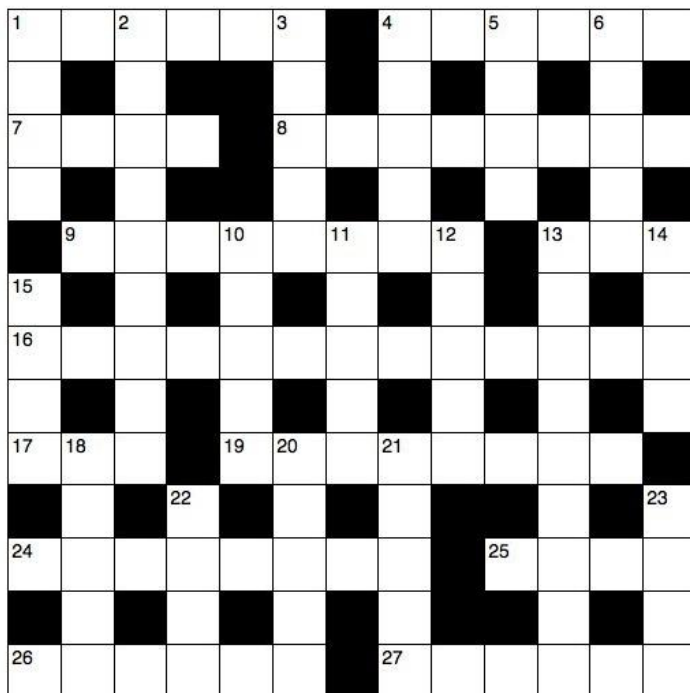

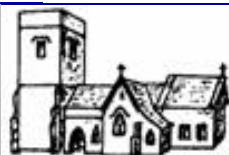

It's possible that the role of clerk is not well understood. The clerk is the engine of an effective parish council. Michele was its principal executive and advisor for the Burton Bradstock Parish Council. She was also responsible for the administration of its financial affairs. As such, Michele was the Financial Officer of the Council and responsible for the careful administration of its finances.

Michele was the Council's only employee. Her role was to ensure that the Council as a whole conducts its business properly and to provide independent, objective and professional advice and support. The Clerk advises the Council on, and assists with, the formation of overall policies, producing information required for making effective decisions and their constructive implementation. The role demands extensive knowledge of the local authority regulations and the Council's Standing Orders.

All Council meetings are open to the public. They are led by the Council's chairman and advised by the Clerk, who is there to ensure that the business is conducted within the law. The Clerk is required to give clear guidance to the councillors, including the chair, even when the guidance may be unpalatable. The clerk has a key role advising the council, and the councillors, on governance, ethical and procedural matters.

The clerk is not an elected officer and can only make decisions which the council's elected or co-opted members delegate to her.

We are so sorry to say goodbye to Michele. It's unlikely that she will lose touch with our community. She is a true professional, and continues work for several other local councils.

We welcome Lesley Windsor as our new Clerk, and wish her well.

Well, at last some good news – our lovely bench that we bought to commemorate the Centenary of the WI has finally found a resting place! It has been a long, and very testing, time to reach the conclusion of this project and has demanded a lot of patience!

Our original plan was for it to be placed somewhere in the region of Hive Beach, potentially in the corner of the field just past Bindbarrow so that people could sit and admire the view or have a rest after walking up the hill from the beach. Unfortunately the style of bench we wanted did not fit in with NT stipulations and to purchase one of their preferred benches was far too expensive for us. (We did learn something interesting, however, whilst meeting with the NT representative namely that there are commemorative plaques underneath some of their benches! Have a look, or a feel, next time you sit on one - we never knew that!!)

Our next idea was to have it installed at the bus stop opposite the end of Beach Road as, all too often, we see people sitting on the ground whilst waiting for the good old Jurassic Coaster to come along! Once again our hopes were dashed. The council's estimate to have it properly installed was, again, far too expensive, costing more than the price of the bench and involving carriageway closures, barriers, traffic lights..... not quite what we had expected! We even tried to find some other more competitive quotes but came up against a brick wall each time regarding the cost.

Unexpectedly we were suddenly approached by the Parish Council who needed a new bench for the Playground area. "Yes!" we said enthusiastically, especially as they also offered to pay to have it properly installed for us. There did follow some further discussion between the committee, the PC and WI members as to whether it could go in the new shelter or keep to the original plan but eventually, as you may have seen, two matching benches have been moved from the play area to under the shelter and our bench now sits proudly opposite the new gate.....
