BRIDE VALLEY CAR SERVICE



The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently ± 1.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

BVCS simply provides door-to-door transport and cannot be responsible for assisting with clients' medical or mobility needs. Patients with complex transport needs for hospital appointments should contact the NHS Non-Emergency Patient Transport service.

FROM THE RECTORY

We are all different and I'm sure you know that. We are individual people and also across the Bride Valley we have different communities, not just where we live, but also within our circle of friends. I admit that I find it fascinating quite how different each individual village is too.

The Church of England has asked us as individual church communities to engage in conversation about issues of human sexuality and I'm attending the sessions which have been put on in our locality (also known as our deanery).

Principles of pastoral practice for how the Church of England can live well together within the parameters of its current position on marriage and the different deeply held convictions that individuals and churches hold on these matters have been developed. The outcome of this work has been the production of the Pastoral Principles for living well together, regardless of our differences.

Basically, the Pastoral Principles identify six 'pervading evils': prejudice, silence, ignorance, fear, hypocrisy and power. These 'evils' hinder our personal growth as Christians, hurt other people, and create barriers that stop our churches from growing into Christian communities of welcome and belonging. They are the opposite of the fruit of the Spirit. It is easy to see these 'evils' in others; the hard work is to see them within ourselves.

Recently I had to take my severely disabled daughter, Lia, to a hospital appointment. Because of her learning disabilities Lia exhibits behaviour which is 'different'. She was bouncing down the hospital corridor (we've nicknamed her 'Tigger'!) and although she doesn't have any speech she will happily vocalise quite loudly. She often flaps her hands about, actually this type of behaviour led to the syndrome she suffers from being called 'Happy Puppet Syndrome' for many years. She is a happy, contented individual and I may be biased, of course.

The thing is, because of the pandemic I haven't been out with Lia for a long time and I'd forgotten the response we often get when we're out and about with her which we've always had. Some people smile and understand, but

often people appear afraid (fear) and don't understand what's going on with her (ignorance). We get 'looks' and 'tuts' and stared at. This can be upsetting, but over the years I've got used to it and I've come to realise that it's not their fault, they actually don't understand and they don't know Lia, or possibly anyone like her. If people ask me then I'm happy to tell them all about her. I think she's a wonderful human being and that as a family our lives have been greatly enriched by her presence, even though caring for her different needs has not always been easy.

We may all be very different people, with different lives and opinions on a lot of things but my ongoing prayer Is that our differences do not get in the way of our personal growth as Christians and we will continue to grow into Christian communities of welcome and belonging.

Isaiah 43.4 reminds us of God saying: 'You are precious in my sight, and honoured, and I love you. God is saying that to you, for sure, but he is also saying that to the person who is completely different to you and has different views.

Bride Valley Gardening Club



Although a lot of the work during November seems to be preparation/ protection for winter there are some jobs which are looking forward to the spring. Planting tulip bulbs, hellebores and lily bulbs are some of those jobs.

Rejuvenate perennials by lifting and dividing them.

Bring prepared bulbs, such as hyacinths, into a well-lit area for flowers at Christmas.

Fill gaps with winter bedding e.g. pansies, wallflowers and polyanthus.

Begin winter pruning, including fruit trees, climbing roses and hedge renovation.

If you are going to lift your dahlia tubers, wait until the frost has blackened the foliage then cut back the stems to 4-6", lift the tubers and dry them, before storage, by upending them onto their stems for at least 2 weeks.

Protect potted alpines from the rain, as they struggle to survive in cold wet conditions. Keep the crowns of plants clear of soggy leaves otherwise they may rot.

Weed beds then mulch them to keep weeds at bay.

Garlic can still be planted to benefit from the cold weather.

Plant new fruit bushes, trim cane fruit to 25cm to encourage new shoots from the base.

Plant or divide rhubarb crowns.

Before lighting bonfires check they are clear of sheltering wildlife; clean out bird boxes; regularly clean bird feeders and bird baths. Make a bug shelter using twigs, fir cones and hollow stems placed in boxes, bottles or tied in bundles to provide a safe over-wintering home for beneficial insects.

THE BRIDE VALLEY BOOK CLUB



The Quickening Maze by Adam Foulds

We had mixed views on this month's book - some of us felt more connected to the characters and location than others. We discovered that two of our group had close links with High Beech, Essex, the setting for this novel.

Foulds is first and foremost a poet and this shows in his lyrical writing. The book focuses on 19th century Epping Forest and an early therapeutic residential community for the mentally ill. Foulds brings together the proprietor, Matthew Allen and his family, the "nature poet" John Clare and Alfred Tennyson, later to be poet laureate. Tennyson is there to support his brother, Septimus, who appears to be suffering severe depression. The narrative voice shifts between these characters - including at times Hannah, the daughter of the proprietor.

We mostly felt that the book was beautifully written but agreed that plot wise not that much happens. John Clare is in partial recovery from earlier bouts of psychosis. He has already had some success as a poet and has relative freedom compared to other inmates who are more seriously ill and incarcerated. However he feels very constrained and disappears into the forest and spends time with some Romany gypsies temporarily encamped.

It is from this point that Clare's mental health goes into a downward spiral and he takes on multiple other personalities rendering him delusional. There are no happy endings in this re-creation of real events when two of our most well known poets were in such close proximity but did not - as far as we know - meet.

Tennyson becomes the romantic focus for Matthew Allen's daughter, Hannah. For her marriage is a way out - a route to the real world away from the environment of the asylum. Tennyson is not interested in her - or indeed women in general. Somewhat comically Hannah is admired and tentatively courted by another visitor to High Beech - something of which she is initially oblivious. Tennyson invests heavily in one of Matthew Allen's money making schemes, new wood turning machinery which will industrialise a process previously done by craftsmen. Allen, who is enlightened in the management of his private asylum, is a naive entrepreneur and ends up bankrupting his family and the asylum. Some of us were unsure about the "long arm of coincidence" which forms the basis for the book's blend of truth and invention. The tragedy of Clare is painstakingly described and we get many glimpses into the distressing world of the mentally ill. Perhaps today we might recognise Clare's symptoms and attribute a specific diagnosis of mental illness. Foulds has richly imagined this moment in time but he is almost emotionally detached in the final stages of the story.

John Clare returns to his home and family but never recovers his sanity or vocation as a poet. Matthew Allen is ruined and the enlightened experiment of High Beech Asylum is closed

Our Night Sky in November 2021

Venus is still hanging in there on the western horizon, setting at about 1900 at the middle of the month. Followed by Saturn and Jupiter setting at about 2200 and 2300 respectively, so these last two will still give us pleasure until very late evening.

Meanwhile, the winter constellations of Taurus and Orion will be rising in the east, the latter showing up at about 2100, and marching across the night sky all night. Mars will just be visible in the east before sunrise, but it will be hard to see in the dawn sky.

US space agency scientists were so excited by the Martian rock sampled by their Perseverance rover last week they got the robot to take a second sample. Nasa's Perseverance rover was sent to Jezero Crater on Mars precisely because it looks to have had a habitable environment billions of years ago. Satellite images suggest a lake was once present in the 45km-wide bowl. There are what appear to be extensive river and delta sediments in the west of the crater. The period in which this water environment existed could now be greatly narrowed by the rock samples just acquired.

The donor slab, nicknamed "Rochette", is sitting on the floor of Jezero and as such is expected to represent the oldest layers in the crater. If the minerals in the samples can be dated, they will provide a "no older than" age for the lake. Perseverance drilled its first finger-sized core on 6 September, repeating the procedure a couple of days later. The scientists believe the targeted rock is volcanic in origin, meaning it can be accurately dated. It also contains salts, which are indicative of water alteration, and that raises the possibility of life. Or, at least, the potential for past life.

Life cannot always be associated with water, but since it has never been found where water does not exist, there is always the hope that life will be found in such places as the salt oceans of the moons of Europa, and Enceladus, as well as any other satellites that harbour oceans beneath their surface ice.

The exploration of space has never been more exciting!

The DORSET LOCAL ACCESS FORUM is recruiting new members - NOW!

Do you believe it's important to have the opportunity to get outdoors to picnic, play, socialise, relax keep healthy?

- Owners, occupiers and managers of land esp with open access or PRoW;



After a glorious September, it definitely feels autumnal now we are in October! I have been so impressed with the children over this past half term. Their attitude to learning has been fantastic and they have all worked exceptionally hard. It seems as though our new reception cohort has been in school for much more than 6 weeks, they are all very settled and thoroughly enjoying school life.

Since the beginning of September, it has been good to be able to get back to some of the more normal school activities. Collective worship in Key Stage groups has been happening in the hall and it was lovely to be able to hold our Harvest Festival in the church recently although unfortunately without parents. Staff have set up a range of extra-curricular clubs such as football, dance and choir and it has been wonderful to see children enjoying this side of school after not being able to for so long.

Our new school website launched on Monday 18th October. A school's website is a key tool in keeping parents informed on what is happening as well as advertising our school within the wider community. A huge thank you to Julian Piper who maintained our old website; this was a very time-consuming task which he volunteered his time and expertise to free of charge! As a school we are currently reviewing our vision statement and motto. The children, staff and governors have been discussing all the things that makes our school great. 


