From the Rectory

Dear friends,

How many times should we forgive a person who has wronged us?

This was a question raised recently in our Bible reading in our churches, where someone asked Jesus this question. I made clear in my talk that I disagreed with a literal reading of Jesus' answer to the above question. Forgiveness is a complex issue, and there are no easy, one-size-fits-all approaches to it. Thinking about the possibility of forgiveness, a better starting point might be to ask:

Why should I forgive another person who has wronged me? or

How can I forgive another person who has wronged me? or

What is forgiveness?

We should never be told that we must forgive another person, even though there are places in the Bible where it seems to state that, and this might be considered the 'Christian' thing to do. If someone is being abused or continually harmed it would be wrong to just tell the victim to forgive the other person. The harm needs to stop; there needs to be justice and a change in behaviour. The victim must be kept safe, physically, psychologically and spiritually, not just be told to 'turn the other cheek' and forgive. Forgiveness is not about forgetting. Forgiveness is not about excusing or condoning wrong behaviour. Forgiveness is not always about reconciliation and people having to restore relationships. Some relationships are harmful. Safety and security are the priority and not forgiveness.

However, forgiveness can help us move forward to break the chains of victimhood, or move beyond negative and harmful feelings like bitterness and resentment or ongoing anger and rage. Forgiveness can be a release and a way of letting go which is good for us. For example, forgiveness may lead to healthier relationships, improved mental health, less anxiety, stress and hostility, fewer symptoms of depression, lower blood pressure, a stronger immune system, improved heart health and greater self-esteem. Hardness of heart can literally harden the arteries. Always being angry can lead to an over-production of cortisol and over stress our bodies. We may need to practise forgiveness to help ourselves find peace, in body, mind and spirit.

Forgiveness is a process, and rarely an event. It can take time and very often it is something we do in our own head. The person who harmed us may be dead. The

person who harmed us may be completely unapproachable or not safe to approach. Jesus's answer to the how many times should I forgive question was 'seventy times seven'. If I wanted to forgive someone who harmed me in the past, just to deal with the negative feelings in my own head then it might take me 490 times to really let go and not be always holding it against that person. If I'm constantly holding it against them then I am not free; I keep myself as a victim. It might take me nine years or more if I was to try and forgive that person in my head once a week. That process needs to involve confronting the pain, not hiding from it. That process involves working through the anger and rage, but in a safe way, finding a new outlet and creating positive energy and change. That process will involve grieving the loss of what was lost or taken from me. That process will involve practising kindness and self-compassion towards myself, empathising with myself and maybe forgiving myself and any guilt and shame I was made to feel. I may be able to empathise with the person who harmed me or I may just need to literally smile in my own mind and make clear they have no hold over me. I am going to live my best life.

Forgiveness may work differently for you. It's your choice. It's your journey. Revenge can often seem sweeter, but in the end, it just causes more pain. I take a lot of comfort from the words of the crucified Jesus, hanging on the cross: 'Father forgive them, for they know not what they do.' Forgiveness isn't easy. Even Jesus struggled with it. He asked God to help him. You can pray: 'God please help me to forgive.' You can also pray: 'God, please forgive me.'

Bride Valley Book Club **The Black Angels by Maria Smilios**

Most of us enjoyed *The Black Angels* by Maria Smilios, which tells the story of black nurses who were recruited, mainly from the southern Jim Crow states of America, to care for patients with tuberculosis in the middle decades of the 20thC. These arduous and dangerous jobs had been rejected by white nurses resulting in a staffing crisis - and it was the lower status and poorly paid black nurses who answered the call. The hospital where they worked was Seaview on Staten Island, New York. It should be remembered that TB, the disease of poverty, reached epidemic proportions until a cure was found in the early 1950's. In the first half of the 20thC alone 5.6 million died of TB in America.

This book is painstakingly researched, its acknowledgements, footnotes and index stretch to over 70 pages. The author, who has a biomedical background, used extensive oral testimony from nurses, survivors and their families. Smilios tells this story against a wider socio-economic background of systemic and institutional racism, public health policy in the face of an emergency and the study of disease and the vaccines which sought to control it. The nurses made an heroic contribution (and sacrifice in many cases) in America's medical history - but so few people know about what they did. Everyone who had completed the book was admiring of the author's purpose - to tell the story and celebrate the black women who had done so much and been appreciated so little. Some of us thought it very well written but there were a few misgivings about the style adopted by the writer who personalised her characters and added non-essential details to bring them alive. We speculated on whether it should have been written as a straightforward social history - and agreed to disagree on this point. Some of us had stories to tell of friends and past family who had been affected by tuberculosis - this was an educational and enlightening read.

Our Night Sky in September 2026

Saturn will be rising in the East, and a telescope will now show it's famous rings turned towards us in their full glory. Orion will wake from his slumber rising in the east about 11.00pm and will become a familiar sight in the winter skies. Mars and Jupiter will rise in the East about 2.00am and will be a prominent sight until dawn. Venus continues to hide behind the glare of Sunrise.

In what could be a ground-breaking discovery, scientists report they may have detected the first direct evidence of dark matter. The potential detection came from the LUX-ZEPLIN experiment, in the form of a single suspected interaction between a Weakly Interacting Massive Particle (WIMP), one of the leading hypothetical particle candidates for dark matter, and an everyday particle.



Dark matter has been a headache for scientists because, despite accounting for 85% of the mass in the universe, scientists have no idea what it is. The only way we know it is there is by its gravitational effect on matter in the Universe. Dark Energy continues to be a headache for astronomers, who hope for a similar ground breaking discovery.

Roadside Boundary Hedges

Over time, a number of roadside hedges have gradually extended beyond boundary walls and banks into the highway. During the past 18 months, we have received several complaints that these overgrown hedges are restricting motorists' forward visibility, creating a potential danger for pedestrians as well as other road users. We would therefore like to ask all residents to check their roadside hedges and, where necessary, cut them back so that they remain within their property boundaries.

The areas of greatest concern at present are the lower part of Shipton Lane and both sides of Annings Lane as far as Northover Close.

At this stage, we are not contacting individual residents regarding specific hedges. Instead, we are relying on the goodwill of everyone in the village to recognise the

importance of maintaining clear sightlines. Cutting back overgrown hedges not only improves safety for pedestrians and motorists but also provides better visibility for residents when entering or leaving their own properties.

The Rectory
St James the Least of All

My dear Nephew Darren,

I am afraid we will never agree about the appropriate length of sermons. Your 50-minute exposition on the theology of St Paul concerning women wearing hats in church is, I am sure, of real interest to you. But as your sermon slowly unfolds, I suspect it will prompt quite a different concern



among your congregation. Have they set the oven timer to come on too early?

Whenever I even hint that a matter of theological importance may be about to appear in one of my sermons, an expression of benign incomprehension comes over my congregation. You know the look - you see it on golden Labradors whenever they try and work out what their owners are telling them.

There are certain sure signs that should warn you when you have preached for long enough. One is when members of the congregation reach for their prayer books to try to work out for the umpteenth time how the date for Easter is calculated.
